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


A number of students again took the next step in their spiritual journey by choosing to be confirmed into the Anglican Church on Sunday 23 September. During the service Archbishop Geoff talked about the significant decision the students were making. He spoke about joining the Christian team and used the examples of Christians helping to end slavery in the British Empire, and founding schools and hospitals for the less privileged, to illustrate what had been achieved by Christians over the centuries.

The annual combined Anglican Schools worship for middle years' students took place in St Peter's Cathedral on Wednesday 23 May. This year a new approach meant the students were divided into six groups and had the chance to participate in several different activities including learning songs, a Q&A session with Archbishop Geoff and Bishop John Ford (Diocese of the Murray), an information session on cathedrals, "chalk prayers" at the front of the Cathedral, movement prayers in the Lady Chapel, and "a day in the life of a chorister" in the crypt. The service at the end of the morning saw lively singing and joyful participation.

This year the School community gave thanks to God for the life of Father Alf Stringer. Fr Alf was the Chaplain of St Peter's College from 1974–1983 and then again for a brief time from 1989–1990. His words from the 1989 School Magazine are poignant:

The Chapel, its furnishings, its place in the physical centre of the School, is there to remind us all of the mysteries of life and death – a place where a person might, either in the liturgy of the Church or alone in the quiet, come to realise that God is at the heart of all that remains mysterious and yet unknown to us, and that here, we can experience as much as we are able, His energising presence.

Each house is a family

We are truly blessed to have the House system that we do. Each House behaves exactly like a family. The structure allows for each student in this large School to be seen, heard, known, respected and supported. Each House also gives our students a connection point to the School that cannot be underestimated. This connection begins as soon as a student enters Senior School. While they are in Years 7 and 8 contact is limited, with our Middle Years students joining the House once a week for Muster. The pastoral care for these students is delivered through their Middle Years Mentor, but this contact with the House is important in terms of establishing an immediate identity within the School.

Once the boys move into Year 9, they spend far more time in the House. For the remainder of their time at the School, they will attend Mentor Meetings, House Musters, Chapel, and School Musters with the other members of the House. Accordingly, most students identify very strongly with the House that they are in, with each House possessing a

unique flavour that is largely shaped and formed by the Head of that House. It is the Heads' of House responsibility to get to know each student and their family well and to bring the members of the House together by creating a shared vision, understood values, and student led goals.

In Schools, as in all good organisations, rituals and celebrations matter. It is through the House system that many of these important symbols of what's important to the School are enacted; in one sense the House competitions are our seasonal festivals! Throughout the year, whether it be events such as Community Day, the Battle of the Bands, or the Athletics Carnival, the Houses engage in a range of competitions which are designed to bring the students of a House together. Notions such as participation, team work, encouragement, support and commitment are rightly acknowledged; the House that gets mass 'buy in' tends to do well. In the past, these competitions were often run over many weeks and were true to the pure form of each sport. Unfortunately, perhaps, as School has become increasingly busy and the calendar more crowded, it has become

impossible to honour the original forms of each sport. Nevertheless, through hybrid adaptations the competition is no less fierce and the intensity with which each student endeavours to represent their House to the best of their ability is clearly on display. The passion for the House is etched on the face of each student as expressions of determination, joy, excitement and disappointment are writ large as our boys compete in sport, debating, mooting, and music.


Not much is 'left in the sheds'. The boys simply love their Houses!






In August, the Year 11 students heard from Paul Dillon, who spoke of ways to minimise risk taking at parties and the effects that alcohol and drugs can have on the body.



Pyramid of Cans saw a record number of cans brought in by Da Costa students.




Community Day is always an amazing event for students and their families. Having the event in the Da Costa Dining Hall made the event even more enjoyable.







Farewell from the Head of Junior School

Researchers have found that the most important character strength a person can have is gratitude. I clearly remember the day I was interviewed for the position of Head of Junior School. I had flown in from Sydney the day before and stayed with my father. I could see he was very excited about the possibility of me returning to Adelaide and securing the role at Saints.

Since being offered the position by former Headmaster, Simon Murray OAM, I have had a sense of overwhelming gratitude at fulfilling this important role for the past eight years. To work in one of Australia's great boys' Schools is a daily privilege and one which I take very seriously. I recently spoke to a colleague from a boy's school interstate who visited our Junior School this year. He was struck by the warmth of the School, its staff and boys. In his words he told me, "I have never seen so many fantastic learning opportunities for students in my life."

I am truly indebted to the support I have received from both Simon Murray OAM and Tim Browning, and successive members of the Council of Governors. Their tangible backing of the important learning, wellbeing and student life initiatives in my eight years here have been greatly appreciated. The result is a Junior School which has grown its enrolment by some 140 boys in that time and placed itself at the forefront of primary education in this state. It is this legacy of which I am most proud at Saints.

I have been blessed with an outstanding leadership team in Sheryle Yorston, David Kolpak, Ceri Slinger and Suzanne Haddy (now Head of Junior School at St Peter's Collegiate Girls' School). People comment constantly on my high visibility around the School. One reason is strategic, the other is that I am incredibly fortunate to have had such quality leaders, who through their effectiveness and efficiency allow me to regularly visit classrooms and attend student life activities, so I can be actively engaged with the boys.

Teaching is such a noble but challenging profession in the 21 century. A school will only grow by 140 students in eight years if current and prospective parents are happy with the staff and the care they can provide for their sons. I see first-hand the

passion the staff have for teaching the boys here at Saints, and the hours they commit both individually and as a member of a team to realise the School's vision to be an exceptional community of learning.

This year brings to a close my 42 years in education, including 33 as a Head at six schools in four states across Australia. L have been fortunate to have worked for ten Headmasters and have learnt much from them, which has helped me grow both professionally and as a person. In that time, there has never truthfully been one day where I have not wanted to go to work. Why? Because I get great energy from being around the staff, students and parents. The students in particular are often extremely funny, without even realising it. Like the young boy who looks at you at the JSFoS breakfast and then says to your wife, "Are you Mr Hine's mum?" No offence taken but a funny moment, duplicated thousands of times throughout my career, which causes you to carry a smile around for the rest of the day. Yes, I will miss the boys at Saints who have given me so much joy and laughter, and who have an inspiring thirst for learning.

The role of a Junior School Head has changed significantly during my 33 years in the role. Some 30 years ago, 80% of Deputies in primary schools in Australia wanted to be Heads in their own right. That figure is now only 20%. This causes me grave concern, as schools need inspirational and strong leaders. I can only hope that teachers can see through the challenges they witness in modern educational leadership and aspire to a role where you get to work with students, staff and parents to build an exceptional learning community.

As I move towards retirement, I have decided to do nothing for a few months, after being involved in education since I was five years of age! My wife and I will then visit family overseas. My first commitment in retirement is to my wife. She has selflessly and generously allowed to give some 60 – 70 hours a week to Saints to allow me to do the job I love. I now want to repay all that time I have been away from home, by spending a lot more time with her. I only hope she hasn't had enough of me being at home by March next year!

It is almost impossible to summarise in a few words what a blessed and fortunate career I have had as an educator. I look back with a degree of pride at my accomplishments and with gratitude for how good life has been to me. Good health, wonderful family and friends, an amazing career, the opportunity to work with thousands of children, staff and parents, and the good fortune to work and then retire in a School which rightfully occupies a place as one of Australia's outstanding schools.

I wish Saints all the very best for the future. I have been privileged to be one of only ten people to have led its Junior School since it began in 1910, and I look forward to hearing of its continued success and achievements with David Kolpak initially, and then Jasmine Taylor at the helm.

It has been a significant year of change and growth for the Year 6 cohort of 2018. Whilst we have seen much evidence of pleasing academic growth for many, we have also witnessed the physical signs of change occur right before our eyes, as our boys begin to grow into young men.

From the very onset of the year, the boys were set a challenge of living up to the expectations of our Year 6 motto which is 'we set the tone'. This has been our collective mantra for the whole year and the teachers have referred to it at numerous times throughout each term when talking to the boys about how to conduct themselves and effectively lead the Junior School.

The academic year has been very busy and at times quite hectic, with the rich array of learning opportunities that the boys have been exposed to throughout. The boys were involved in many activities that have enhanced their learning such as Frank's Lab on Legs, Artist in Residence Program with Sarah McDonald, Anglican Charities Day and the Canberra Tour, as well as be visited by guest speakers Jo Elsom (ABC), Rebecca Knol (South Australian Chamber of Mines and Energy) and Oren Klemich (Organ and Tissue Authority Board).



Our Year 6 Canberra Tour was a fabulous experience.



Mr Hill, a Noongar man from South West Western Australia, engaged the boys with explanations of how traditional tools and technologies from a variety of language groups from across Australia were made.

In Term 3, the boys created and performed poetry where Lochie Siow was selected as the Year 5 representative from St Peter's College to perform in the IPSHA Poetry Competition.

Over the year, each class also had the opportunity to work on robotics with Mr Becker to build a Lego robot and program it to perform various tasks.

The final part of the School year saw the boys researching and writing a journal from the perspective of a courageous Australian who experienced duty in conflict or peacekeeping. To support this research, the classes visited Athelney House where they examined historical medals, photos and memorabilia. Then, on Remembrance Day, our students participated in a moving ceremony led by Father Theo McCall. Alexander Nguyen and Hamish Porter were the recipients of the Fred Dyer Award for their impressive journalling efforts.

Throughout the year, there has been significant growth in maturity and responsibility of the Year 5 student cohort, preparing them suitably for leadership roles in Year 6. They are well prepared as they enter their final year of Junior School.



The Year 4 cohort have immersed themselves in their learning for this year and have strived to always achieve their best. The academic program has been well supported by a number of interesting incursions and excursions. The boys have been involved in a wide range of co-curricular activities and it has been pleasing to see the enjoyment and dedication of each boy.

Throughout the year, the boys worked with many important guest educators. In Term 1, we were visited by the Warrawong 2U program as part of our science lessons. The boys were studying biological sciences and the dependence that living things have on their environment for survival and really enjoyed the close up experience of holding snakes, a potoroo, swamp wallaby and a Major Mitchell's cockatoo.

The boys were also challenged by the activities of Frank's Lab on Legs. We had two sessions with Frank, exploring both chemical and physical sciences.

The Year 4 classes worked with Walford Anglican School for Girls on two occasions throughout the year. The Walford girls visited St Peter's College in Term 3 and all students were involved in a yoga session, Lego construction activities and problem solving tasks. During Term 4, we travelled to Walford and enjoyed participating in an engineering task, stop motion movie making and a group problem solving challenge.

A new program for Year 4 this year was linked to our RAVE lessons. All Year 4 boys visited the St Peter's Cathedral and enjoyed learning about the history of the Cathedral and its important connection to our School.

The Year 4 camp was a significant event for the boys. We spent two nights in tents at the Finniss campsite. The boys were involved in a variety of interesting activities, connecting to the learning we had undertaken about sustainability. This visit to the Coorong area was closely linked to our class novel, *Storm Boy* and also to the significant Aboriginal

history of the area. As staff, we saw the impact of this tour on the collegiality and learning of the boys.

It was pleasing to see all of the Year 6 boys work with rigour and challenge themselves to achieve academically throughout the year. This group will now move into Year 5 with a great deal of confidence and to participate in all of the opportunities that St Peter's College has to offer.



Throughout the year 73 boys, aged 3-5, attended the ELC. Whilst the three groups each shared their own learning journeys, there were opportunities for boys and educators to connect and collaborate in different ways. The new 8.00am-5.00pm day provided greater flexibility for families and stability for boys and increased learning opportunities as new rituals were established.

There was high demand for places in the three year old group (ELC A) and 30 of the youngest Saints students began their learning journey at the start of 2018. The boys explored living things and habitats journeying to the ELC frog pond and observing the fish in the Junior School pond. They explored drawing and sculpture as part of their learning about frogs, fish and habitats. Additionally, they developed an interest in facial features and self portraits which culminated with painted clay self portraits.

Tall buildings and cities became a focus later in the year as did interest in block play. A city was constructed, complete with its own lighting system, green spaces and a working fountain. Materials including wire, aluminium foil, Plasticine, paints, markers, paper and playdough were used.

ELC B welcomed 22 new boys who quickly established themselves as a cohesive and collaborative group of learners. The boys looked at the interrelationships between themselves, plants, water and animals. These ideas were explored through story, coding, drawing and clay. The story of 29 000 rubber ducks that fell off a ship and travelled the world deeply resonated with them. This learning culminated in the making of two films: one with an important message of sustainability and the other, *Ducks Overboard*, a feat of craftsmanship, collaboration, and creativity.

ELC C continued on their second year together. The development of visual representational skills and the learning dispositions of critical thinking, craftsmanship, courage and creativity, have been significant threads throughout the year. The processes of critique and effective peer feedback supported the development of communication and skills in visually representing with increased detail, depth and intention. Through intentional teaching, educators have also focused on the character strengths of kindness and empathy, which contributed to the boys' overall sense of wellbeing. Positive language, collaborative play, sense of community and wellbeing have all been important elements.

The end of year celebration was a final opportunity for us to celebrate the youngest Saints boys and their unique competencies and capacities for learning.






As Captain of Boats, Angus demonstrated great leadership, a commitment to serve, and positive behaviours that have both inspired and positively influenced other students around him. In the Boat Club, Angus was able to support and encourage boys in other crews through personal contact and taking a sincere interest in their progress. Angus' modest and approachable manner endeared himself to other rowers, and the impact of the support he provided was very effective.

His sporting ability goes beyond rowing. He represented the School in water polo, and at the highest level in First XV 2017 Rugby and the First XVIII in 2017 and 2018 (runner up Best and Fairest 2018) while still maintaining significant external rowing commitments with SASI in 2018.

Angus was a Prefect in School and Allen House where he had specific responsibility for sport and other co-curricular activities for the House. He was brilliant at managing all of the House's incredibly successful sporting teams and non-sports-based activities in 2018 and received colours for his outstanding service to the House.



Tsering is a highly acclaimed artist who has been an Archibald Prize finalist for the past four years and a semi finalist in the Doug Moran National Portrait Prize. It was little wonder that our students were fully engaged as she taught our Year 9 and 10 cohort skills associated with portrait drawing.

They were taught specific charcoal rendering techniques as they worked with mirrors and a directional light source to draw self portraits. The results were truly exceptional.

An exciting aspect of the Artist in Residence program is always the group project that is produced during lunchtimes. Boys from all year levels were invited to participate, and over a three week period they collaborated with the artist to create a large atmospheric charcoal drawing of Old School House. The drawing clearly demonstrates the boy's artistic skills and their ability to work together to produce an inspirational result.

Tsering was our twentieth Artist in Residence and the success and quality of the work created by the boys during her residency was a testament to her talent and her calm, friendly and professional approach.

Junior School Visual Art

The Junior School Visual Art program immersed the boys in creativity, imagination and exploration. New skills, new materials, specific techniques and experimentation, permeated throughout each boy's learning. Printmaking, painting, drawing, collage, weaving, woodwork, mixed media, sculpture and fabrics; provided each boy with a diverse knowledge of subject matter through a hands on experience. The joy of creating and exploring all areas of the visual arts expanded the imagination of each boy while nurturing their creativity.

The Junior School had the pleasure of welcoming our 2018 Artist in Residence, Sarah McDonald. Sarah is a South Australian artist and for 20 years has worked as an artist and art teacher. The Year 6 boys had the opportunity to experience painting on canvas with palette knives, which none of the boys had experienced before.

Sarah showed the boys how to blend colour with the palette knife, mixing with impasto gel for thickness. The paint was glided on horizontally to create sky and hills as a background. Trees were created in the landscape foreground by applying the palette knife vertically, creating textures representing bark. Short stroked and dabbing techniques formed textures of leaves and grasses.

In Term 3, we celebrated our 2018 Junior School Art Exhibition titled *Impressionism and Post Impressionism, Colour and Techniques of the Modern Masters.* The Junior School art exhibition displayed nine weeks of learning by Reception to Year 6 students, which explored the significance of the impressionist and post impressionist art movement. Students immersed themselves in the worlds of Monet, Cezanne, Seurat, Signac, van Gogh, Pissarro, Renoir, Morisset and numerous others with colour and technique permeating throughout every lesson.

Each student can be proud of the artworks they created this year and the learning they discovered.

The Collaborators by John Hodge

Dictators are fearful of the arts. The dictator believes that freedom of expression is a dangerous weapon that either should function in defence of propaganda or be disabled. If the artist cannot be "educated" then she or he must be destroyed. John Hodge's *Collaborators* tells of Stalin's manipulation and control of the Soviet playwright, Mikhail Bulgakov (1891-1940). Hodge's surreal retelling of history shows how an artist compromises his integrity and then must face the consequences of his actions.

Lachlan Winter's portrayal of Stalin captured the wily monster who seduces, cajoles and deceives in order to assert his power. Winter, with moustache, black boots and pipe in hand, dominated with his stage presence. Connor Kitching's Bulgakov was a fragile, flawed and compromised artist; he successfully captured the man's complexities. His love for his wife was reciprocated and supported by a sensitive and nuanced performance by Julian Hallworth. Hallworth's Yelena never compromised her independence. Christian Mason was Vladimir, an NKVD officer who tortures victims before noon, and spends his

afternoons directing plays. These seemingly irreconcilable actions were made plausible by the impressive skills of a talented student. Alexander Bampton's powerful depiction of Sergei included many memorable moments; we witnessed the young factory worker's idealism slowly crushed by horrific political truths. Stepan, a menacing NKVD officer, was played by Lachlan Painter. With few words and much intense glaring, his threatening nature was made explicit.

Supporting roles were performed Year 11 students and their highly commendable work certainly contributed to the production's success. Of special note were the efforts of Henry Allen and his portrayal of Grigory. Allen's mature and insightful acting captured the tragic intensity of the young author's martyrdom.


Hodge's *Collaborators* reminds us not only of a country's brutal history and its many victims but also of the heroic struggle of individuals who, despite adverse and life threatening circumstances, cling on to principles that define their individuality.














In Term 3, both Year 10 classes took part in Drama Day. The day involved a morning dress rehearsal, then a performance for students and finally, a performance for the School community in the evening. The day is an invaluable learning experience.

We considered the possibility of an interdisciplinary thematic exploration as the basis of play selection. As English teachers, we were aware of the war poetry that was studied in the classroom and thought that Drama Day was a great opportunity to delve deeper into understanding the complexities of conflict. Guilt, shame, suffering, triumph and power reside in the tumultuous landscape of war and we wanted to particularly examine how physical aggression shapes masculinity and impacts on the development of young men.

Students performed The Grandfathers by Rory Mullarkey and Children of Killers by Katori Hall. The Grandfathers tells of young conscripts training to be soldiers, and Children of Killers refers to the children of fathers who took part in the Rwandan genocide of 1994. We intended for the plays to provoke discussion regarding the cyclic nature of inheriting values, attitudes and behaviours in a war scenario. Furthermore, we wished to illuminate the tremendous difficulty of breaking this cycle and establishing a new way of living that is fuelled by a desire to seek a brighter future.

The boys were dedicated, passionate and invested in the process from the first table reading. We were overwhelmed by their mature approach, their ability to unite as an ensemble and put on a terrific show. Their

growth as actors was impressive and their pride in their work was truly moving. They loved performing and developed a unique comradery that is only ever achieved when people are brave enough to express their vulnerabilities and overcome them together.

Overall, their performances were mature, considered and moving.

Ti-Jean and His Brothers by Derek Walcott

Often in life, we seem to get transfixed by wealth and fame and can find ourselves absorbed in menial pursuits that have little to do with what truly matters: kindness, selflessness and love. This year's Junior School production, *Ti-Jean and His Brothers*, by Nobel Prize winner Derek Walcott, resonates with these universal themes.

Ms Jacqueline Cook and I gathered an ensemble of 21 cast and crew comprised of boys from Year 7, 8 and 9. Both Ms Cook and I repeatedly noted what a joy it was to witness the strength in camaraderie shared between the years and the remarkable eagerness, talent and maturity of the boys who participated.

Ti-Jean and His Brothers is a parabolic play, exploring the destructive force of human ego and the power of selflessness and open mindedness. The play was presented in the style of magical realism; a contemporary fairy tale with the battle between good versus evil at the fore. Three brothers try their hand at defeating the Devil in an attempt to free themselves and their mother from poverty. The forest comes alive as all of nature rises to the challenge of this battle. Through frivolity and festivity, the play resonates with magic, while simultaneously exposing the inequalities of our world and ultimately reminding us of what truly matters.

2018 has been a year full of extraordinary music performances, awakening and growth for all boys involved in the Senior School Music program.

A superb highlight for the year was performing Faure's *Requiem* at St Peter's Cathedral. Another impressive highlight was winning the division two, section one Generations in Jazz, City of Mount Gambier National Stage Band Awards as well as personally being selected to receive the Band Directors Award for 2018.

Additionally, we launched two new jazz vocal ensembles and placed fifth in division one.

Other enjoyable highlights included an outstanding concert at The Gov with guest artist and multi instrumentalist, Adam Page. For the second year in a row, our music festival *This is Me* was a sellout and featured the guest artist and jazz violinist, Julian Ferraretto.

Throughout the year we learnt that musically trained children have better language and communication skills, can focus for longer and are more likely to stick with difficult problems until they solve them. Furthermore, they are able to control their own emotional responses and understand

emotional responses of others and they have significantly better working and long term memory systems. These enhancements then support happier and healthy lifestyles and choices in adulthood, the capacity to both shift and advance in their professional lives and maintain their brain health into later life.

This year also saw the music department move to the Hill Wing which was formally the boarding house from 1965-2002. This move was the first stage of further growth and development in the music department structure. Our move enabled us to hold rehearsals in one central location, which afforded us space to accommodate larger ensembles such as concert Band. The second stage will take place over the 2018 Christmas season and we will see some demolition and construction work being completed in the Hill Wing with the outcome of many more individual music tuition rooms, more rehearsal spaces and a very large space to hold orchestral rehearsal with the possibility of housing an audience for approximately 80 people.


David Quan was successful in winning the SA National Economic Prize and the Adelaide University Economics field trip, where students sat in on a first year lecture and university style tutorial.

2018 has been another very successful year in Mathematics for our boys and staff.



The Year 10 group also had the opportunity to work towards their bronze medallion certificate in the Swimming and Lifesaving Unit.

In Health lessons, the Year 8 group completed a unit on Relationships and Sexuality led by psychologist Dr Tessa Opie. We are committed to providing students with relevant, evidence based knowledge and understanding so that they are able to make informed decisions.

Physical Education Week was held in November this year and the addition of new activities (dance and golf) were enjoyed. Combined with Summer House Sports Day, this created healthy competition between the Houses and promoted lifelong physical activity.

Religious and Values Education (RAVE)

The Religious and Values Education (RAVE) topic endeavours to increase our students' awareness of the spiritual aspects of life and to see them as an essential and necessary part of who they are.

At each year level, we explore the person of Jesus Christ, Biblical texts, philosophy of religion, world religions and stillness. Giving opportunity for our students to engage intelligently with Christianity— and more broadly— religious thinking and to engage carefully and critically with them which builds important life skills. Knowing how to articulate a point of view and to interact with a variety of opinions while honouring and respecting each person is critical.

Positive education

The Positive Education curriculum continues to evolve to ensure our programs are appropriate yet specific versions of the University of Pennsylvania programs that we implemented in 2012.

Our Year 7 and Year 8 mentors and our specialist Year 10 teachers add ideas and lesson plans to grow both our program content and our worldwide reputation for Positive Education delivery. The addition of a visible wellbeing focus in 2018 has ensured that all areas of the School, beyond the Positive Education classroom, have developed modules and tasks which are wellbeing centred.

The Year 10 curriculum includes a venture focus with a task related to the demands of our Pushing the Boundary 21 day journey. The Year 7 and 8 camps will include similar tasks with connections to the Positive Education curriculum next year.

Science

The year started with the Year 12 IB students teaching the Year 7 students about solids, liquids and gases for a whole day. This was one of the highlights for the Year 7 students and the Year 12 cohort began to appreciate the challenge involved in teaching younger boys!

Once again, we had the Year 1 students visit the Senior School labs for a lesson on changes. All the Year 1 boys got to experience making some elephant's toothpaste, then extracted DNA from strawberries and, finally, made some doorbell circuits.

Early in Term 2, the Year 11 IB Biology students went on an overnight excursion to Yookamurra Wildlife Sanctuary. Yookamurra is significant because it contains an area of 1100 hectares, surrounded by a feral proof fence, that is free of all feral predators and herbivores. The students continued a 20 year tradition of measuring the growth of the *Acacia cambagei* trees in the sanctuary as well as learning how the staff measure the ecological health of the Western Pygmy Possum.

In June, students from Years 7 to 10 sat the 2018 International Competitions and Assessments for Schools (ICAS) Science tests, conducted by the University of New South Wales. There was an impressive total of 66 distinctions, meaning they were placed in the top 10 per cent and 14 high distinctions which is awarded to the top 1 per cent of those who completed.

Library

Miller library

A major focus and enquiry for the Miller Library has been the provision of books suitable for the Middle Years students.

Organising a collection by author is logical and the books are easy to locate on the shelves... if you know the author. This means it can be more difficult for a student to find a book about sport, music, a mystery, adventure and so on. To this end, we have created a specific Middle Years section, where the books are grouped based on genre, then by A-Z within each genre, All book spines have genre stickers, making it easier not only for the students to find a book but for staff to reshelve returned books. The students have been very positive about the changes. It is easier for the more profilific readers to find new authors or books similar to what they already read. For the students who do not know what to read, it is much easier to select a genre and choose from a smaller collection.

Junior School library

This year we have been fortunate, with our Author in Residence program, to welcome Boori Monty Pryor who immersed students in a dreamtime experience, Gabriel Evans presented a workshop about the process of illustrating and Jane Jolly related her research techniques in preparation for writing a picture book. These opportunities widened the boys' understanding of literature and engaged them with new ideas and challenges.

The importance of reading and being part of a literate community was recognised through many library events including the popular Book Week activities and its theme Find Your Treasure. Our annual Read Around with Dad was held as a special Father's Day event this year, our 100 per cent participation in the Premier's Reading Challenge and the phenomenal 45,000 books borrowed by our Junior School boys, all reaffirm the importance of being a reader.

A new addition to the Library this year, was the installation of the Library Leaders honour board. The leadership shown by our committee of Year 6 students organised events such as a book swap in Term 4 and a *Star Wars* quiz in Term 2. These leaders showed enthusiasm and organisation through these student led initiatives.

The Library team create an inspiring, welcoming and safe environment that supports all boys in book selection and literature challenges, which is available before and after school, at lunch time and within two Library lessons per week.



Chisomo's 2017 Scenario Stranger in the Mirror, won second place at Future Problem Solving Program International.


This year, the students had a variety of social concerns to consider including spread of infectious diseases, toxic materials, philanthrocapitalism, cloud storage and biosecurity.

The Maths@Saints program exists to provide opportunities for boys and teachers at St Peter's College to engage in such activities and events that convince one of the truthfulness of mathematics. There are many aspects to the program, including the Informatics and Mathematics Societies and the Thursday Afternoon Mathematics Enrichment Sessions (ThAMES).

Once again, the boys performed brilliantly across the board in the many and varied mathematics and informatics competitions over the year. Rather than provide a recap of the results and placings from these

competitions, which can be found in past newsletters, I will, instead, reflect on what I have observed the boys gaining from the Maths@Saints program during 2018.

First and foremost, the rise of informatics. The success of the Informatics Society and its members is due solely to the care, guidance and interest that Angus Ritossa has provided. Having benefitted from the mentorship and friendship of previous scholar, Jack McKinney, Angus offered the same for the other members of the Informatics Society.

Maths@Saints is proud to have supported Angus in his own informatics endeavours, with his Silver Medal in the 2018 International Olympiad in Informatics held in Japan being his most significant achievement to date.

Another key component of Maths@Saints is the Mathematics Society which meets every Tuesday and Friday lunchtime in the Horace Matters Room, where members of the society provide mathematics support for any student who drops in. No student is too young, too old or too advanced to learn from those who give up their lunchtimes to provide assistance with mathematics.

As the final article I ever write for a Saints magazine, I allow myself the indulgence of thanking Jane Hogarth (guardian of the Maths@Saints fund), the staff of the Mathematics faculty for their support of the program, past visiting fellows and especially the boys, whose passion for all things related to informatics and mathematics enables Maths@Saints to be the success it is.



The inaugural European Science Tour started in Rome, where the boys learned about the science and engineering of the Colosseum and the science of the Vatican's artwork.

Saints to Cambodia

Twenty-three students spent an action packed ten days in Cambodia, where they experienced a strong service commitment with a wonderful cultural journey.

Students also taught English lessons in HUSK School eventually delivering their own lessons after collaboration and planning of appropriate activities, games and tasks.

Students embraced the challenges of the tour with good humour. All students participated in circus workshops, a cooking class, a traditional Apsara dance, a hot bike ride and a spirited challenge in the Amazing Race around Siem Reap town.





The boys were confronted with a very hot and unseasonal Autumn day when they competed in the annual Summer House Games and they are to be commended for their efforts.






