

From the Chapel

God is at the heart of all that exists. If we are attentive, we will hear a call to a deeper awareness of, and a connection with, something greater than ourselves: the Divine. In this respect, the spiritual life and the more general notion of mindfulness are closely connected. The Chapel and worship life of the School are invitations to enter more deeply into the spiritual life. Each week, the challenge is to present the Gospel to the students in an engaging way, which invites them to ponder what they believe and to reflect on life.

A number of students took an important step in their spiritual journey by choosing to be confirmed in the Anglican Church on Tuesday evening 24 September in the Chapel. Adelaide's new Assistant Bishop, Denise Ferguson, presided at the service and confirmed the students.

The confirmation service was preceded by an overnight camp, led by Fr Theo and Rev Ben, down at the School's campsite at Finniss. The boys participated in a number of physical activities, as well as times of study and quiet reflection. Water sports, indoor soccer and an evening campfire were followed by reflections on faith, the Bible, the Church, prayer life, and the Holy Spirit.

In the season of Lent, the School Captains organised another very successful hot cross bun fundraiser, raising funds for the Anglican Board of Mission. This year, they chose to support an Indigenous coeducational institute located in Sydney, named Gawura.

Rev Ben took long service leave in Term 2 and was replaced by the Reverend Stuart Langshaw. He was a welcome pastoral presence in the School, leading Chapel on alternate weeks, taking some Junior School RAVE classes and encouraging everyone.

Part of the School's focus is to give every student a taste of the feasts and symbols of Anglicanism. Some highlights of the School's liturgical year are the celebration of Ash Wednesday, at the start of Lent, and then Holy Week just before Easter. It is a tribute to the culture of respect and courtesy at Saints that the students were so involved in the worship. Many came forward to be anointed with ash on Ash Wednesday and to receive Holy Communion at the Maundy Thursday Eucharist.

The annual Saints' Christmas carol service in St Peter's Cathedral took place on Monday evening 25 November. This was a wonderful expression of music and liturgy.



Sir George Murray Shield



The Sir George Murray Shield was first awarded in 1929 to the House which does the best in schoolwork. The award was based on the boys' cumulative performance in examinations and class rankings. It was awarded every year until the early 1970s when Short House were victorious.

In 2007, the shield was reintroduced but an alternative set of criteria are now applied. The shield acts as the interhouse shield and points are awarded based on performance, participation and service. In 2019, Woodcock House was the eventual winner in what was a tight contest. The House was competitive across all sports and activities and the boys consistently performed to the best of their ability. This is the third occasion in the past five years that Woodcock House has won the shield.






the boys with strategies to build their relationship skills.

Early Learning Centre

During 2019, 70 boys participated in three learning communities led by Ms Gemma Cross, Ms Anne Cowan, Mr Ben Cooper and during Term 3, Ms Olivia Jones. The curriculum and learning experiences planned predominantly from boys' interests, resulted in many diverse projects across the Centre.

The exploration of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspectives in ELC G through songs and Dreaming stories, led them on a journey to a greater understanding of billabongs, Australian flora and fauna and indigenous symbols and connected them as a group of learners.

Highlights of the ELC C year included the finding, harvesting, brining, bottling, labeling and gifting of olives discovered in the grounds of Athelney. During Term 3 they explored the anatomy, behavior and contribution that bees make to our school gardens and the ecosystem. They used devices to capture photographs of plants that attract bees in various locations around the School as well as producing observational drawings and collages. They came to understand that bees do so much more than make honey.

The Soft Plastics project in ELC A was a significant component of their learning this year. Boys learnt to identify plastic used in daily life, its impact on the environment and consider ways we can reduce the use of plastic. Their learning was documented in a short movie and shared with the School community. The voice of some of our youngest learners was a powerful reminder about our shared responsibility for the world we live and learn in.

Part time teachers Stephanie Cabot, Raegan Hill, Olivia Jones and Sheryle Yorston contributed to learning across the Centre. The boys interest and engagement with bird watching and identification, planting and constructing a dry 'creek' in the digging patch and Flags of the World, became rich opportunities for collaboration, co-constructing knowledge and learning.


As part of our Reconciliation Week at Saints, we celebrated our First Nations People by installing the 3.6m totems in the garden between the Pentreath Building and the library.










Junior School Art

Visual Art in the Junior School provided a wonderful learning environment for all the boys. Mrs Cabot, our Reception Art teacher, provided engaging experiences and insight into contemporary art and specific techniques of art making. Boys in Year 1 through to Year 6 explored many topics, specifically designed to build upon skills, techniques and knowledge. The imagination and awareness of the visual arts were unlimited.

This year's highlight was our Artist in Residence program with Aboriginal artist, Sasha Hill. As an artist for over 15 years, Sasha shared the significance of Aboriginal culture, language, history and creativity. Sasha demonstrated her painting techniques and how these are incorporated onto canvas. The boys applied dot painting techniques to canvases with skill and patience. Storylines were outlined in black paint, symbols enhanced with white paint and backgrounds immersed in clusters of colours.

Every boy in the Junior School, from the Early Learning Centre to Year 6, participated in the Artist in Resident program. Drawing from imagery and symbolism. They developed stories and formed their paintings; representing journeys of travel across the land, of animals and of hunting. Symbols of resting places and waterholes represent a unity of togetherness, meeting and community. The Reception boys experienced the creation of artworks on canvas, exploring animals and colours. Our Early Learning Centre boys transformed words into sculptures, capturing imagery from stories and manipulating clay into beautiful expressive sculptures.

Our 2019 Junior School Art Exhibition was titled Journeys and Stories and celebrated the artworks all the boys created with Sasha. The exhibition represented the journey of learning which they experienced and the Aboriginal inspired stories and symbols we shared, to create the artworks. Sasha's guidance of skills and techniques were reflected in the impressive exhibition.








Senior Drama Production

The Caucasian Chalk Circle by Bertolt Brecht

In Term 2, the Drama Centre saw talented Saints boys from Year 9-12 join forces with skilled girls from neighbouring schools to perform Brecht's, *The Caucasian Chalk Circle*. This world renowned play is a parable that explores what happens when the law conflicts with justice. The play compels us to ask who is right and wrong. *The Caucasian Chalk Circle* is a testament to Brecht's ability to energise his political purpose with an unsentimental fairy tale, song, romance, battles, beheadings, dangerous journeys and a high stake trial.

With a beautiful, haunting original score by Eton Williams (Year 10) and a striking, industrial steampunk design, the production successfully reenvisaged a modern classic. The students' dedication and countless hours of rehearsals paid off, with audiences impressed by the high standard achieved by all. Special mention must be made of Sam Harrison (Year 11) for his outstanding performance as Azdak the Judge. Sam handled this challenging role with great skill, providing a nuanced and thoughtful interpretation that left audiences thinking and thoroughly entertained. Mahala Truscott (St Peter's Girls) was mesmerising as the protagonist, Grusha, successfully taking the audience on her journey to save an innocent child with courage and sensitivity. A noteworthy performance was also given by Madison Lacy (Walford Anglican School for Girls) who delivered a sophisticated portrayal of Natella, finding wonderful moments of both comedy and drama.

I would like to thank Mr Paul Fabbro for his unwavering support and assistance throughout the rehearsal process and Mr Scott Russell and Ms Brigid Dighton for turning the steampunk vision into a reality.

To be involved in a drama production is a unique and memorable experience and these students made the most of it. I couldn't be prouder of their efforts.



Year 12 Drama

Hamlet by William Shakespeare

People often use the word courage when describing the tenacity of sportspeople and yet the same word is equally valid when describing the daring of the actor. It takes courage to commit to a role; determination and resolve are essential ingredients of rehearsals; and bravery is necessary when presenting one's art to an audience. This year's Year 12 students proved to have both the talent and tenacity to present Shakespeare's *Hamlet*.

Shakespeare's play allowed seven young actors to demonstrate a professionalism well beyond their years. Shant Becker (Year 12) accepted the challenge of performing the role of the melancholy Dane and the result was a remarkable performance. His young, brooding, and at times dangerous and volatile Hamlet dominated, in an effortless manner, the stage. He was able to present the vulnerability, "madness" and distress of a prince who has been given a commission he does not want. Shant was not intimidated by the complexity and richness of the bard's words. Soliloquies were delivered with a naturalism and truth that spoke to all.

Henry Allen (Year 12) did not flinch from the task of depicting both Gertrude and Ophelia. As Hamlet's mother, he presented a haughty and assured demeanour; a woman who was not ashamed of her infidelity and was not prepared to tolerate her son's eccentricities and acts of rebellion. His Ophelia displayed an inner strength, as she fought for her dignity against the manipulation of her father and the cruelty of Hamlet. Sodden with water and smeared with mud, Henry's mad Ophelia clenched her father's shroud and educed sympathy.

As Claudius, Thomas Spiby (Year 12) presented a lascivious seducer and ruthless murderer who was prepared to torture his nephew. His soliloquy revealed a tormented sinner entrapped by his dark desires.

Kush Goyal's (Year 12) Horatio captured the frustrations and pain of unrequited love. Few will forget his cries of pain as he wept over the body of his tormented friend.

William Trotman-Dickenson (Year 12) ably portrayed both father and son. His Polonius' was more sinister than comic and his passionate, reckless Laertes provided the play's denouement with a captivating duel.

Kijana Kamau (Year 12) and William Langley (Year 12) demonstrated their versatility by presenting a number of characters. Their Rosencrantz and Guildenstern failed to comprehend the extent of Hamlet's pain and their gravediggers added moments of levity before the tragedy's final moments of devastation.

The production's plaudits were many and each actor demonstrated exceptional talent and undeniable courage.





















Year 11 Drama

This beautiful play, by distinguished Adelaide born playwright, Finegan Kruckemeyer, reminds us that we all come from the same source: the magical energy of creation. Now, more than ever, we must confront our personal darknesses and unite in love, harmony and compassion.

When an epic snowfall imprisons the residents of the tiny village of Kishka, young Theo and Dore Sutton propose that the villagers build a catapult to fling them and six of the village's bravest and strongest out in search of a solution. The catapult hastily assembled, Theo, Dore and the heroes are launched over the snow and into the grandest of adventures.

With design elements inspired by the block colours and imaginative illustrations of Ted Geisel (AKA Dr Seuss), the play was presented in the style of magical realism. Whimsical and humorous, dark and mysterious, heartfelt and sincere, this play truly did weave a fantastical Grimmsian tale that was celebrated by the entire family.

The commitment, talent and investment exhibited by the boys in the ensemble were truly remarkable. I was moved by their willingness to invest wholeheartedly in the project, overcome adversity and challenge and ultimately present an outstanding piece of work. I am grateful to work with such inspiring young men and I am sure we will see some of them grace the stage in the professional context.

Spanish / German

Spanish Ab Initio

Committing to two years of learning a new language from scratch in Year 11 can be a daunting experience but this is exactly what the Spanish Ab Initio students sign up to. The first challenge in learning a new language is to cope with the pace when grasping new topic vocabulary and grammar. Add to that, the rigours of the IB curriculum in which we address international mindedness and embrace Theory of Knowledge (TOK) and Creativity, Action, Service (CAS).

Our students researched and presented on a range of themes in creative online ways, such as Adobe Spark for oral presentations on a Hispanic fact file or iMovie to describe a notable Hispanic person from history. Online resources including Education Perfect, OneNote, Youtube videos and news items in Newsela enhanced the learning experience to practise language acquisition and engage with relevant articles.

In less than 24 months, students learnt to converse in a range of tenses and topics including the environment, festivals and social questions.

Highlights included a quiz night at Seymour College in which our team placed second, the Spanish lunch, the Spanish Film Festival and competing in the Languages Soccer Cup as part of the UN team.

Humanities

The Year 8 Geography students visited Christie Walk Eco Village in the Adelaide CBD. The area was revitalised by a group of socially and environmentally conscientious community members and houses 45 people in medium density housing that is not only highly sustainable but designed to foster a rich community. The students learnt about the various sustainable design philosophies implemented and recycled materials used.

During October a group of Year 9 historians travelled to Port Adelaide to explore early Australian colonial settlement experiences. The boys visited the Port Adelaide Lighthouse, South Australian Maritime Museum and the oldest clipper ship in the world, City of Adelaide.

The Year 11 Business and Enterprise students ran a series of business stalls and, working in groups of four, sold a range of food and drink products including pancakes, ice creams and confectionery. The class needed to sell products that would attract their target market and three of the four stalls completely sold out of their products. They made a combined profit of over \$760 in just 20 minutes and the class donated all the profits to Huntington's Disease SA in recognition for Mr Ben Wilson.

St Peter's College Economics students had their tenth annual University of Adelaide Economics Experience and enjoyed game theory activities as well as discussion with current Economics students and a Macroeconomics lecture. Students also attended an insightful lecture by Dr Luci Ellis, Assistant Governor (Economic) Reserve Bank of Australia, who gave a keynote address on monetary policy and current economic conditions. Both were insightful experiences we hope gave our students an idea into the importance of Economics and the potential career opportunities it provides.

Science

Ms Kat Jenkins and Dr Anne Jensen came to the School to talk to the IB students about the Murray-Darling Basin and the significant environmental impact the farmers were having on the basin and the ecology of the river, and the difficulties in dealing with such a lack of water.

In April, we were fortunate enough to be able to take seven 10 inch reflecting telescopes to the Grampians and some astronomy on the Year 8 camp and the students looked at planets, nebula and other galaxies.

In June, we tested all students in Year 7 to 9, and they did exceptionally well, with Casper Cai, Eddie Moss, Ben Northcote, Jacob Sweet, Oliver Hamilton, Darren Nguyen,

Hieu Pham, Max Wang, Will Lawrence, Henry Reynolds, Charlie Wells, Derek Yang, Duc Pham and William McConnel all scoring within the top one per cent of the nation at their year level. A further 40 boys scored within the top ten per cent.

A group of Year 11 students also participated in the Physics Olympiad, which is a very demanding physics competition, with impressive results. Shrey Sinhal and Thomas Gaertner received high distinctions (top ten per cent of all entrants), Alexander Rowe and Nickolas Tolis received distinctions and James Tallent and David Wang received credits.

All boys did well in the long examination and it is worth mentioning that Matthew Goh (YNG '15), who has just been awarded a Rhodes Scholarship to continue his studies in Physics also scored a High Distinction in this competition.





Future Problem Solving

Future Problem Solving (FPS) is an international education program for students that focuses on the development of creative and futuristic thinking skills. Through the imagining of future social concerns, participation in the program fosters the enhancement of such skills as problem identification and the consideration of positive solutions to those problems.

Through thoughtful engagement, FPS aims to give young people the skills to design and promote positive futures for the society in which they live.

In short, students who participate in FPS have an opportunity to think more creatively and positively about complex social issues, develop an active interest in the future, improve communication (oral, written and dramatic) and research skills, think critically, analytically and creatively.

This year, the students had a variety of social concerns to consider. The future scenes included mission to the moon, Mars and beyond, food loss and waste, coping with stress and criminal justice.

St Peter's College successfully participated in one of the FPS options available to students: scenario writing. Our national results were very strong. Darren Nguyen (Year 8) placed third nationally in the Middle Division for his scenario: genetically modified long lasting food. Further to this outstanding outcome, Darren travelled to Queensland to compete in the FPS Australian Finals where he was awarded fifth place in the onsite scenario writing competition.

Special mention must be made of the other students who participated this year without winning a national place. These students include Jeremy Beale (Year 10) and Gunin Singhal (Year 8) who directed their own learning and submitted credible responses to the future scenes given.

Future Problem Solving is a wonderful opportunity for students to imagine the world they would like for their future. As action follows thought, this could be their first step to making their imaginings a reality.

Historical Society

The Historical Society was revived in 2019 by a very enthusiastic committee, comprising James Loftus (Year 10), Andrzej Czechowicz (Year 9), Shreyas Khanna (Year 10) and Toby de Wit (Year 10) who spent the best part of this year constructing a new focus for the Society, based on the School's history and on seminal commemorative events, with the aim of increasing interest and involvement.

To this end, three highly successful tours of Old School House were held, with close to one hundred students and staff taking the opportunity to visit the original Saints building. From the Headmaster's private chapel, pre 1930 boarders' graffiti and 22 calibre slug pockmarks in the firing range on the top storey, to the bread ovens, below stairs servants' quarters and cold stores in the basement, visitors were taken back to a time when the School was a microcosm of life.

Athelney House was also toured this year, with its grand ballroom and marvellous view from the tower of the city and western Adelaide. This tour was very popular with the boarders, many of whom had fathers who had been boarders themselves in the 1970s to the 1990s.

James Loftus organised a commemoration of the 50th anniversary of the Apollo Moon Landing in 1969, which included the showing of an impressive documentary tracing the planning and progress of the landing.

The Historical Society Committee members also arranged with Mr Coventry and Mr Gilmore to lead guided tours for each of the Year 7 and Year 8 classes, visiting the School's many World War I commemorative sites.

Congratulations to the new committee, for their enthusiasm and determination to have history live again at St Peter's College.

Maths@Saints

The Maths@Saints year began when Angus Ritossa (Year 12) and Eric Zhou (Year 12) called a meeting of all interested boys to discuss how things could run in 2019. These young leaders have been invaluable and are always willing to impart knowledge and skills to others with plans to return to mentor the boys in 2020 in Informatics.

In 2019, the Maths@Saints Society evolved to include three branches: Mathematics, Informatics and Maths Help. Due to the tight schedules of the older students, Maths@Saints met in the Horace Matters Room on Tuesday's at lunchtime with Maths Help running on Monday and Thursday at lunchtime. This included a group of Year 11 students mentoring younger boys in the Pentreath. Thursday Afternoon Mathematics Enrichment Sessions (ThAMES) took a hiatus for 2019 but will return in 2020 with visiting speakers and interesting problems to explore.

Informatics has been a focus in 2019, with Angus Ritossa being selected into the Australian Informatics Olympiad Selection School, subsequently winning a Gold Medal in the 2019 International Olympiad in Informatics in Azerbaijan. Alongside this, two teams of three boys participated in the main round of the UNSW ProgComp 2019 with PonyJoe Express, comprised of Angus Ritossa, Eric Zhou and Nicholas Koh (Year 9), achieving a perfect score of 100. They went on to win the Grand Final in Sydney by again achieving a perfect score of 100.

In terms of participation, our top three competitions were: the Hamaan School Mathematics Competition for Society of Petroleum Engineers (150 boys competed), the Computational and Algorithmic Thinking Competition (150 boys competed), the Australian Mathematics Competition (400 boys competed). With this large rate of participation, boys who are good at problem solving are able to shine. In particular, the AMC gives the boys information about the topic areas of strength just in time for end of year exams.

In addition to the timed competitions, Maths@Saints facilitated the introduction of the Australian Mathematics Trust (AMT) Maths Challenge into some of our Mathematics classes from Year 7 to 10. The boys were given a suitable level text from the AMT resources to support finding solutions to some challenging problems over a four week period.

In 2020, the boys in Year 7 to 10 who achieved the best results were invited to sit the Australian Intermediate Mathematics Olympiad. These students included Darren Nguyen (Year 8), Hieu Si Pham (Year 8), Nicholas Koh (Year 9) and Xian Huang (Year 10).




Indigenous Program



The Robotics program, from Year 3 to 6, is an everchanging curriculum.


In 2019, Year 4 classes began using WeDo2.0 and Simple and Powered Machines kits to investigate machines that use gears or pulleys to function. Boys designed, built and coded multispeed fans with a safety cut off device.


In Year 6, the boys explored a unit of work on autonomous vehicles and then followed up with designing, building and coding transport vehicles for a smart city.

For the second year in a row, we had about 20 boys attend a holiday workshop to improve their coding for their robot as part of the RoboCup Junior Rescue competition. Teams performed well in the state competition and exceeded all expectations in the national competition with two of the four teams finishing in the top ten places.

During Term 3 and 4, 36 Year 4 and 5 boys trained for the RoboCup Junior Sumo competition. Nine teams of two competed near the end of term and they performed well with one team making it to the quarter finals. All up, 60 boys participated in the Robotics co-curricular clubs.





Interschool Athletics Competition

The 2019 Athletics Squad had a great start to the year, dominating interclub competitions in their age divisions during start of Term 1. Badminton

2019 has been an exciting year for the St Peter's College Badminton program with great improvement from players at all levels, as well as increased participation across a range of school and state competitions.

The year began with a holiday training camp open to all current Senior School Badminton students which saw fantastic attendance from boys at all levels of play, allowing them to improve their skills before the first competition.

In Term 1, the program fielded 13 teams across both middle and senior competitions. Though many weeks of competition were cancelled due to poor weather conditions, the program boasted an 87 per cent win rate. Week 9 saw the 29th Badminton Intercol hosted at PAC. The team opened with a 2-2 result in doubles before running away with dominant victories in singles boasting a 7-1 scoreline bringing the team to a 9-3 victory. The weekend after the Intercol saw another four Senior Badminton Teams compete against PAC recording 9-3, 12-0, 12-0 and 12-1 results respectively.

In Term 2 and 3, students of the Badminton program were given the opportunity to continue improving at offseason training sessions. Many students devoted many early mornings to further pursue Badminton.

At the end of Term 3, the First Badminton Team competed in the Open State Badminton Championships where they defeated Marryatville High School 6-2 in the final. Five of the members of this team were Year 10 students, indicating a bright

future for the School to defend this title in coming years. The beginning of Term 4 saw the top middle school players from the Badminton program finish runners up to a strong Glenunga International High School in the Middle State Badminton Championship. Both of these teams should be congratulated for the sportsmanship and level of play that they exhibited during the competition.

In the September/October holidays, the Badminton program held another training camp, this time offering players in the Junior School the opportunity. The other major change for this training camp was the separation of sessions based on skill level which allowed more players to participate in the camp without overcrowding the hall at the same time.

In Term 4, St Peter's College fielded 14 teams across middle and senior competitions. The teams achieved an impressive 63 per cent win rate bringing the final win rate for 2019 to 72 per cent, an impressive feat showing dominance across all areas of the program. It extended its athletic focus by introducing strength and conditioning sessions for a select group of Middle and Senior Year Badminton students. We hope to eventually open these sessions to more players as the sport grows.


Junior School Chess

Training initially focused on basic ball movement and body positioning but developed to include set lineout plays and defensive moves.





He oversaw the recruitment of the new Head of Boarding and the subsequent introduction of staff training and compliance systems. The Boarding House at St Peter's College has continued to thrive as a result.

As Head of Senior School, he focused on enhancing the relatively new Indigenous Education Program that was in place at the School. He raised the profile and increased resources of this important program. He also oversaw the introduction and development of the School's first Reconciliation Action Plan and the positive impact of this initiative will be evident in the habits and practices of the School for many years to come.

After three magnificent and industrious years, he returned to pursue his career in Melbourne. His legacy of leadership will go on to benefit all St Peter's College students for many years. This role also saw him play the lead role in ensuring the School met all of its registration and compliance obligations for Student Learning and Assessment, a task requiring a deep and nuanced knowledge of widely varying curricula.

In 2019, he agreed to take on the role of Director of Studies at St Peter's College, running the mechanics of the Senior School curriculum whilst devising and managing a new, cross campus Learning Sciences team to enhance the ways educational stakeholders use data.

He leaves St Peter's College to become Principal at Tyndale Christian College, Strathalbyn Campus, where his deep pedagogical and technical expertise, combined with his compassionate, principled and faith based relational management skills will see him welcomed into his new community with the same love and admiration as he has enjoyed here.
