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From the Headmaster

2020 was an incredible year for St Peter's College on many fronts. COVID-19 provided an unprecedented challenge for our society and the St Peter's College community rose to this challenge. In the end, 2020 was the most creative and innovative year in the School's recent history. The innovation, creativity and success achieved was as a direct result of teamwork and a determination to ensure a first-class education was delivered, whatever the community circumstances before us.

For our families, the restrictions and shutdowns created enormous strain, emotionally and financially. Many families had their livelihoods overturned and I remain grateful to those stakeholders who responded to my requests for assistance. As a result, the Headmaster's Hardship Bursary Fund was created, and many families were able to access financial

assistance in order to maintain the continuity of their son's enrolment.

Teachers at St Peter's College, like all teachers nationally, bore the brunt of the crisis at work. While our State and Federal authorities were communicating a need for social distancing, working from home and avoiding gatherings, authorities were also demanding that every school remain open and children attend. Teaching staff were on the front line when fear and confusion spread across the nation early in the pandemic. At this time many parents made the decision to keep their child at home while expecting staff to maintain a bespoke program of tuition. For some weeks in Term 1, this created a dual mode of tuition, which our staff worked hard to support, yet was unsustainable. High risk or vulnerable staff were granted flexible arrangements and staff banded together to

find solutions to support our program. An eerie professional distance of more than 1.5 metres emerged between staff and students – something quite unnatural in our School culture. As a community we can be proud that despite the obstacles presented, St Peter's College was one of the few institutions where no full-time employees were stood down during the crisis. I remain grateful to the highly professional team of staff who worked tirelessly under enormous pressure to manage this circumstance.

The brief community shut down saw only nine days of disruption to face to face teaching. Unlike many other institutions, SPSC adhered to the expert health advice and sought to re-invent programs under the new restrictions. A strong emphasis on pastoral care was maintained with daily check-ins with students, at home but dressed in uniform, via the web. Rather



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than simply cancel programs that could not be delivered face to face, these programs were reinvented. One such example was our Music program. Students were sent a digital recording device to record their individual recital. This recital was then professionally mixed by a sound engineer to form an ensemble performance that was distributed electronically to our community. In May, subject to the new public directions, sport and co-curricular programs were reinvented in groups of six students face to face. The long-term influence of training and rehearsing in small groups meant that students could not escape scrutiny. Intensity of effort increased and so did the growth of each individual.

Parents and visitors were required to keep their distance, kiss and drop was compulsory and many performance events took place without a live audience. Parents and friends

encountered many disappointments by not being permitted to be present as usual on campus, the Year 6 Graduation being one event that had to be recorded and shared electronically. Pleasingly, all major events related to the passage of Year 12s in their final year of school were able to proceed face to face as planned.

The performance of our students in such a tough year was outstanding. The academic and co-curricular results were first class. Three perfect ATARs were achieved and the median academic result for the Class of 2020 placed in the top 9% of the nation. There were many outstanding individual achievements.

Amongst all that was achieved in such a challenging year, we remain grateful for the opportunities we each received, for our health and livelihood and for the

collaborative effort through which all challenges were met. The following pages of the Magazine go some way to outline the year that was.

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From the Chapel

At St Peter's College, an accepting, empathetic and incarnational approach in expressing the trinitarian faith of the Anglican Church is critical. A significant challenge for the chaplains during 2020 was to find new ways of proclaiming the Gospel, given some of the restrictions in place due to COVID-19. The anecdotal feedback from students about the use of pre-recorded chapel services was positive. The chaplains used video clips and still images to emphasise particular points in their homilies.

Part of the School's focus is to give every student a taste of the feasts and symbols of Anglicanism. This was much more difficult once the restrictions were in place. A particular highlight of the School's liturgical year was the celebration of Ash Wednesday at the start of Lent before the restrictions were imposed. It is a tribute to the culture of respect at St Peter's College that the students were so involved in the worship. Many came forward to be anointed with ash, which was made from burning the previous year's palm crosses. With the students absent during Holy Week, staff were invited to attend the daily services, which were also broadcast via Zoom.

A significant development for 2020 was the establishment of a new youth group at St Peter's College called Youth@Saints led by the Reverend Ben Bleby. This Friday evening group meets during term time and is open to Middle and Senior Years boys and girls who wish to participate in fun activities and learn about the Christian faith. This program will continue in 2021.

A number of students took an important step in their spiritual journey by choosing to be confirmed in the Anglican Church at the end of Term 3. Archbishop Geoff Smith presided at the service in the Chapel and confirmed the students.

The Confirmation Service was preceded by an overnight camp at the School's Finniss Outdoor Education campus, led by Father Theo and Reverend Ben with the assistance of the Youth@Saints Leaders. The students participated in many physical activities, in addition to times of study and quiet reflection. Water sports, indoor Soccer, a wide game, and an evening campfire were followed by reflections on faith, the Bible, the Church, prayer-life, and the Holy Spirit.

Father Theo took long service leave in Term 4 and the School once again

welcomed back the Reverend Stuart Langshaw. He was an encouraging pastoral presence in the School, leading Chapel on alternate weeks, taking some Junior School RAVE classes, and being a friendly face to everyone.

From the Deputy Headmaster/ Head of Senior School

In 2020, the word 'agility' took on a broader meaning; less about physical movement and far more about adaptation to change. The world over, education has been de- and re-constructed over the past twelve months and, more than ever, we have learnt that the human and relational element of teaching is not only key to the learning process but also essential to the maintenance of our wellbeing. In this regard, I have been immensely impressed by the care and commitment of St Peter's College staff in all teams across the campus, as much as I have the students across all years who have had the opportunity to discover and demonstrate important qualities that will help them to be open-minded and flexible in the future. Change, after all, is a constant in life.

Indeed, 2020 was also a year in which our character strengths were tested daily, and we had to continually remind ourselves to put things in perspective. There were, and still are, people in a worse position than us, and we should consider ourselves incredibly fortunate to be residents of South Australia. Missing out on some of life's small privileges and accepting minor compromises to our usual routines were further unanticipated (but no less valuable) lessons for us all.

Despite lockdowns and cancellations, I have managed to walk most boundary, touch and side-lines, and I have enjoyed connecting with the School community

in this way; not intending to distract, of course, from the showcase of the students' efforts and talents being tested in the pressure of competition. I have also been moved and entertained by Drama productions, Music concerts and artwork, provoked by the intellect of our public speakers and debaters, and exhilarated by students' stories of cliff edges and belays. I note that all these activities give our students the opportunity to simultaneously and paradoxically both connect with, and stand apart from, their peer group. Standing apart and, indeed, standing out is not always something that teenage students are keen to do, but it is certainly something I admire most in young people who are brave enough to embrace vulnerability and put their best efforts on display and on the line.

Mrs Sally Bartz delivered the 173rd Speech Day Address, with a message about the love of learning. Whilst her words were riveting and captured our imaginations, it was the spontaneity and duration of the students' standing ovation following her speech that resonated as strongly, giving a clear signal of the respect for Sally within our School community. The response of the Young House students to Mr Con Sinanis' retirement as Head of House offered another emotional highlight. If we are all about holding strength and love concurrently as our School Prayer encourages us, Mr Sinanis demonstrated

a perfect example to his students in his House Muster Address. What was clear, within his students' silence and attention, was their deep gratitude - another crucial quality that 2020 has cultivated in all of us.

In my first year, a mention must be made of the emotional rollercoaster of the Year 12 week-long farewell. I have not seen a school anywhere in the world that celebrates its leavers with as much appreciation and love. Though I have only been at St Peter's College for a relatively short time, even my heartstrings had lost all their tension by the end of the week. What was clear in this week, more than any other, is that our students do not just come to school to learn, they come to grow, to experience and to 'feel'. In a week of high emotion, Maya Angelou's words resonated: "People will forget what you said, people will forget what you did, but people will never forget how you made them feel". I saw in this week and many others that St Peter's College consistently and successfully strikes this very chord.

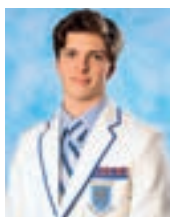

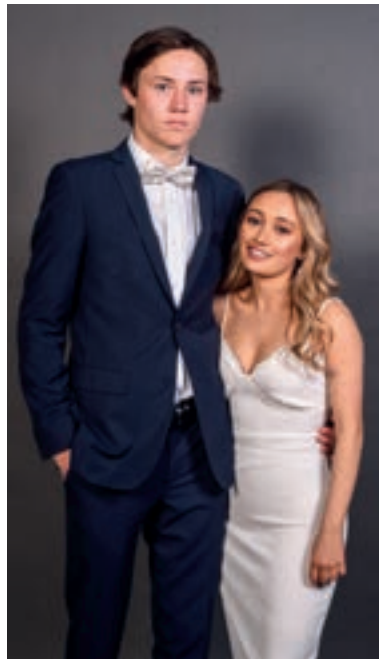

Years 7 to 11 Speech Day Address

Mrs Sally Bartz, Senior School Teacher and Coordinator of History Studies, delivered the Years 7 to 11 Speech Day Address. Mrs Bartz has made an extraordinary contribution to the School over the past 36 years and was fittingly farewelled with a standing ovation following her Address. (Note: this is an edited version of Sally's speech)

Headmaster, Mr Thorp, Colleagues and Boys,

The Headmaster has very graciously given me this opportunity to teach one last lesson, and to the biggest class that I have ever surveyed. However, it will not be a History lesson; rather it is a lesson about lessons and learning, and why learning is so important to every single one of us here in Memorial Hall today. But I will start with a little reminder about the importance of history in our lives.

How often have you walked into this space, or others in the School, without really looking? We all have a tendency to overlook the familiar, and we often need something to jolt us into a more observational and curious frame of mind.

Year 7s have just had a chance to consider Mem Hall from its historical perspective as a commemorative site, with war service plaques dating from the 1850s to the present day. The names of close relatives of boys currently in this Hall are on these commemorative boards. But the Hall is actually more than this. Some boys seated here will soon have their own names engraved on the academic scholarship boards; and the oldest of those scholarships dates back before the School was set on these grounds. Each personal journey through St Peter's College is part of a great continuum which stretches back to the School's creation in 1847; and even beyond that, to the idea of education and learning as the key to community success and growth, an idea, in the English tradition upon which Saints is founded, that stretches back to the 1400s. As you move through this School from day to day, never forget that you are a living part of that greater history. And never take *any* aspect of it for granted.

Back in the 1990s, I used to allocate my Year 11 English students a school building as the subject for a piece of creative poetry writing. Those boys who were allocated Mem Hall or the Chapel went cheerfully off to gather ideas. Those who scored the Gordon Building as their subject always complained that it was hideous and that there was "nothing to write about"; but invariably their responses were often the most powerful and creative. Why was that so? Well, I believe it was because, for the first time, they actually looked at the building and engaged it in their imaginations as more than just a pile of bricks, the ugly duckling of the School campus. Like it, or not, it is a vital part of the Saints continuum, and actually generates just as much discussion and interest as any other part of the School, even if the questions invariably focus on why it exists at all in the otherwise beautiful "walls and fields" of St Peter's College? Even an eyesore can, and should, promote questions.

Two inspirations make us unique among creatures: they are: curiosity – the force that drives us to ask such questions and to seek answers; and imagination – which helps us to contemplate alternatives and to come up with creative ideas. Together they enable us to confront and solve problems, find solutions, interpret and experience new pathways.

When I was in my early teens, the same age that many of you boys are now, there used to be a program on TV called "Why is it so?", presented by physicist and educator Julius Sumner-Miller. You can still see excerpts of his demonstrations on YouTube – they may be

"old" and in black and white, but I recommend them to you. Every young person who ever watched his program was transfixed; and in my case, I have indelible memories of the "egg in the bottle" experiment used to demonstrate the properties of a vacuum. I looked on, amazed, as the hard-boiled egg got sucked through the neck of the glass milk-bottle after a piece of flaming paper had been dropped inside.

Sumner-Miller did not give us the answer to "Why is it so". The whole idea of the show was that he would provide the evidence, and we, his viewers, his students, would go away and work it out for ourselves. His teaching and learning technique was simple: the answers to any questions you care to ask are actually all accessible to you: all you need to do is study the evidence, be observant and engage yourself intellectually in the process of finding the answers; and curiosity and imagination are vital to this process.

Whatever sparks *your* curiosity can be used to drive *your* personal engagement with learning. It could be wanting to understand what caused the "Big Bang"; or why $F = MA$; or why the Nazis were able to hijack German democracy; or why Steve Smith is such a brilliant batsman; or how the egg got into the bottle. Or why it is that, in all the different images we have around the School that display the buildings of St Peter's College, there is no image of the Gordon Building, even though it is one of the most important occupied spaces of the school?

The process of learning usually requires some assistance, and that is *really* why parents and schools exist; to save you from the inevitable costs of curiosity and imagination riding on the back of ignorance (for example: "I wonder what will happen if I stick this fork into that power-point?" - my brilliant mathematician father tried that once, as did at least two members of the current teaching staff); but a sense of purpose and a sense of achievement are the rewards for knowing that you have done as much as you can to drive that learning process for yourself; and the more you practice using your curiosity and your imagination, the better you will become at learning, and the more confident you will be in your understanding of the world around you and of your readiness to step forward into your future. Keep asking "Why is it so?"

I am finally leaving school, but I'm not leaving learning. I have invested too much time and effort and enjoyment in the practice of learning to ever want to give it up. I will continue my own academic interests into Asian maritime cultural and trade connections since the 12th century – they have already taken me to China and twice to Japan and there are still many unanswered questions to explore; and in case I get complacent about learning, I have just had my piano reconditioned in readiness for a serious return to practice. I may even step back into the Saints world from time to time in coming years.

In the meantime, I wish each of you the very best of learning experiences as you continue to grow through your days at Saints and beyond. May you enjoy every curious and creative step you take, in your own life's journey.

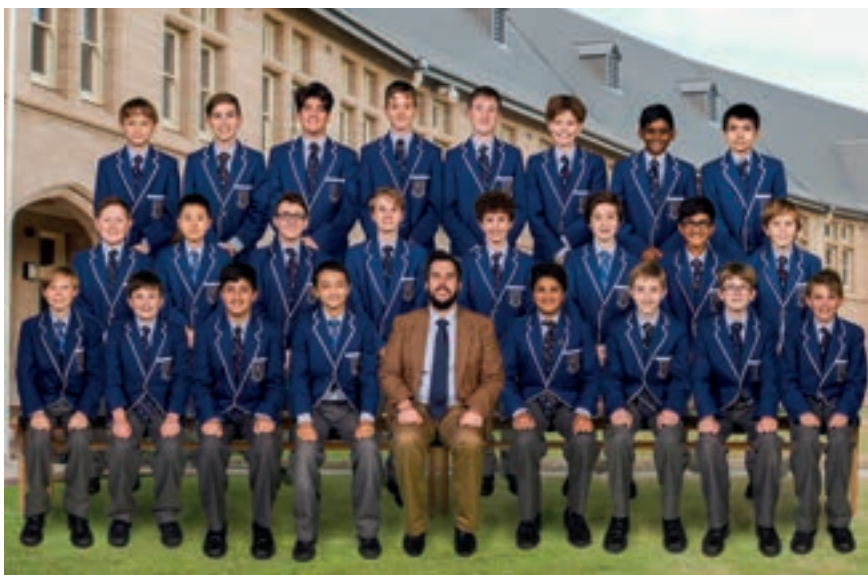

Sir George Murray Shield

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Year 4 Report

Year 4 has been an engaging and challenging year with many exciting activities. The students had the opportunity to participate for the first time in a variety of co-curricular activities including Sport, Chess, Robotics and Mind Lab. Many students learnt a new instrument as part of the Year 4 Class Band program and experienced sleeping in a tent outdoors on the Year 4 camp. A highlight of the year was the Robotics program led by Mr Becker, which they were involved in for two terms. The students were actively engaged during these lessons, where they demonstrated co-operation and problem-solving skills to construct and program a Lego robot. They also gained a greater understanding of gears, cogs, pulleys and sensors.

In Semester 1, the students investigated forces through hands-on application, before exploring scenarios to consolidate their understanding. Year 2 Report

Our Year 2 students made pleasing progress during 2020. As leaders of Junior Primary, they displayed increased maturity in class and in the yard and modelled positive behaviour for the other year levels to learn from.

Many students demonstrated their growing leadership skills, representing their classes and the year group as both SRC representatives and Year 2 Student Leaders.

Term 1 was a busy and exciting start to our year. We welcomed new students to our classes who settled in well under the care of both the staff and existing students. All students quickly adapted to the new expectations of Year 2, and enjoyed new privileges, including visiting the library at lunch times. Our Term 1 learning centred around 'water as a precious resource' with special guest speaker Jason Haseldine, Director of Finance and Administration at St Peter's College, stopping by to answer Year 2 student questions about how we use water sustainably at the School. Unfortunately, our planned excursion to the Botanic Gardens and our 'Wind in the Willows' performance were cancelled at the last minute due to COVID-19 restrictions. This would be the first of many unexpected changes throughout the year for our students. The Year 2 teaching team was incredibly proud of the way the students took on remote learning at the end of Term 1 and were impressed with the enthusiasm and resilience demonstrated throughout this time.

Terms 2 and 3 were busy with preparations for the Year 1 and 2 Concert. Under the guidance of Mrs Carey, the students prepared an impressive number of performances including songs, dances and instrumental pieces. An inquiry into the history of Memorial Hall and our local community was also a highlight of the term. Students enjoyed the opportunity to work with Ms McKinnon-Matthews, our School Archivist, to look at many images and artefacts from the School's history.

In Term 4, we visited Cleland Wildlife Park to consolidate our learning about living things and life cycles. The students enjoyed exploring the Wildlife Park and seeing many native Australian animals in their natural environment. Through this exploration students showed caring and respectful interactions. The Educational program was a wonderful starting point for our investigation on frogs.

One of the highlights for many of our students was the Junior Primary Sports Day. This was their last Palm House Sports Day before moving to Year 3. Students were organised into groups to participate and have fun in a variety of sporting activities. Some of these included the obstacle course, relays, Soccer shooting and mini high jump. The final 100 metre year level sprint races were a great way to conclude the successful day.

It has been a true pleasure to see the Year 2 students make such excellent progress this year, flourishing academically and socially. They have led the Junior Primary exceedingly well and have left a lasting impression on all staff who have had the privilege of working with them.

Year 1 Report

As we reflect on the challenging year that has passed, we do so with many wonderful memories that will never be forgotten. 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Early Learning Centre

A group of 65 enthusiastic early learners and staff were part of the Early Learning Centre 2020 community. Although this year was like no other, the ELC Team continued to provide the stability and predictability important for young children, especially during times of uncertainty. Late in Term 1, we ventured into online education and connecting with children and families via Zoom to maintain learning relationships. Fortunately, this was only for a few weeks and we were able to re-connect onsite in Term 2.

Each ELC boy began as an individual, becoming partners in learning and play, and responsible community members as the year progressed. As students became confident in their surroundings, they looked outwards, sharing stories of family and home culture, strengthening identities and finding shared interests. They built knowledge and capacity for kindness and respect by valuing one another, the ELC and the land it stands upon. Growing Acknowledgment of Country and all that it offered us, perfectly bookended a year in which the boys strove to develop empathy, gratitude and agency to give back and have a very real, positive impact on this land.

ELC A students enthusiastically embraced learning at the ELC and participated in a range of collaborative projects. During one project, the students learnt about species of spiders native to Australia and around the world, and shared their learning with parents through a movie compilation. During Term 4, interest in volcanoes led them to exploring active, extinct and dormant volcanoes. Utilising information texts, art materials and digital media, they investigated shape, colour and form. There was much excitement as the students participated in making a model volcano and a simulated eruption.

Throughout 2020, ELC G students engaged in two significant projects. The first, an exploration of line and shape developed through the language of dance, in particular Vivaldi's 'Winter' and Tchaikovsky's 'Swan Lake'. Leading to sculpture, students used wire and clay to express thoughts, emotions and movement in the form of leaves that moved in the wind, and the lines of the performers as they danced. The second project developed an Acknowledgement of Country that was personal and

meaningful to the class. The children participated in experiences designed to build understanding of local First Nations' perspectives and ways of being and learning around the landscape of Kurna country. The development of a story map supported the children's connection to Country as they investigated and recorded plants and animals local to our School.

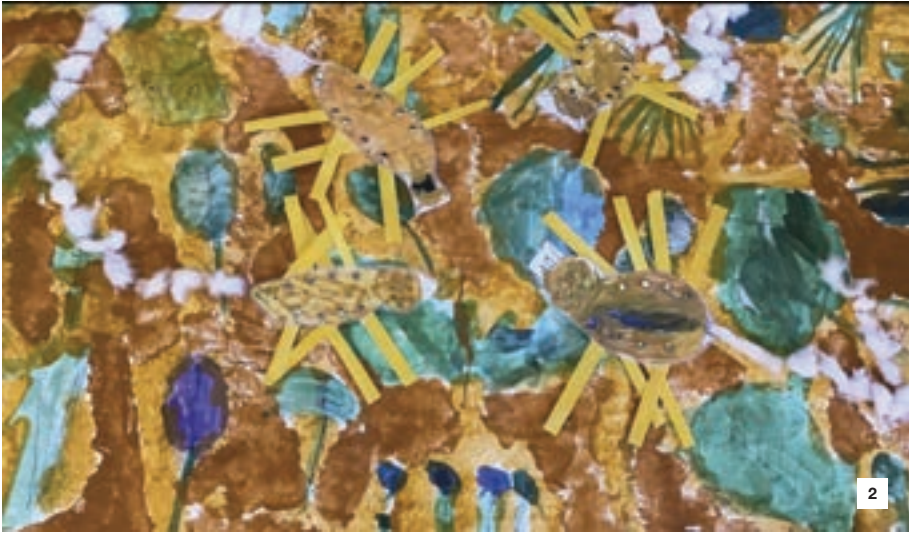
Whilst parents were not able to share this year's Celebration of Learning on site, it was a wonderful end to 2020.

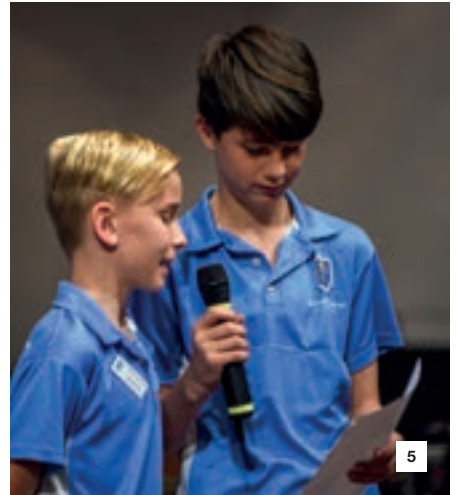

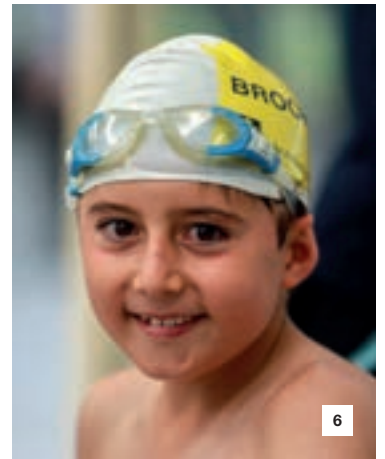
of the House this year. Many individual House members experienced personal achievements, and it was most gratifying seeing students demonstrating pride in their House and working collaboratively.

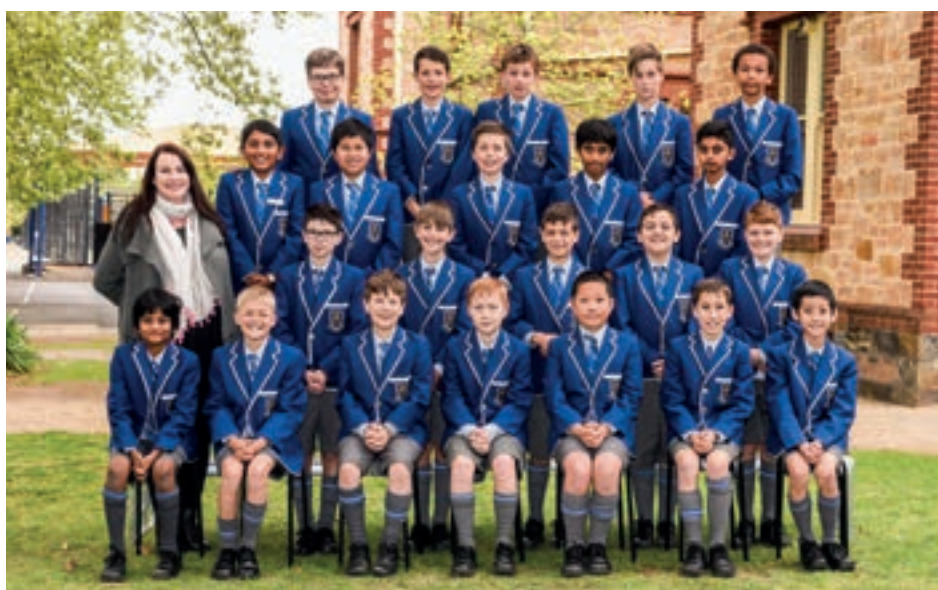

In both Years 8 and 9 he and his team won the grand final of the inter school competition and in both years Shiva was awarded best speaker. Lloyd Wicks, the State Debating coach at the time, recognised Shiva's talent and suggested he trial for the State Debating team. Shiva successfully progressed through successive rounds of trials before being selected in the National Schools Debating Competition as the third speaker for South Australia. This was a remarkable achievement given Shiva was only in Year 9 at the time. Shiva was also selected in his first St Peter's College Intercol Debating team in Year 9.

In Year 10, Shiva debated in the South Australian Debating Association (SADA) Senior A division alongside his older brother Indran. The team won the grand final and Shiva was awarded the medal for best speaker. In the same year he again represented South Australia in the state team and was awarded second place in the national competition. Shiva gained

Despite the challenges caused by the virus, 2020 saw the successful introduction of two new programs to the Art curriculum. Digital photography and pottery (wheel throwing) were offered for the first time to our students in Years 9 and 10. These studio areas proved to be a great success with a great number of students enrolling in these courses. The students clearly enjoyed these art forms as the numbers enrolling in these subjects for 2021 have increased considerably.

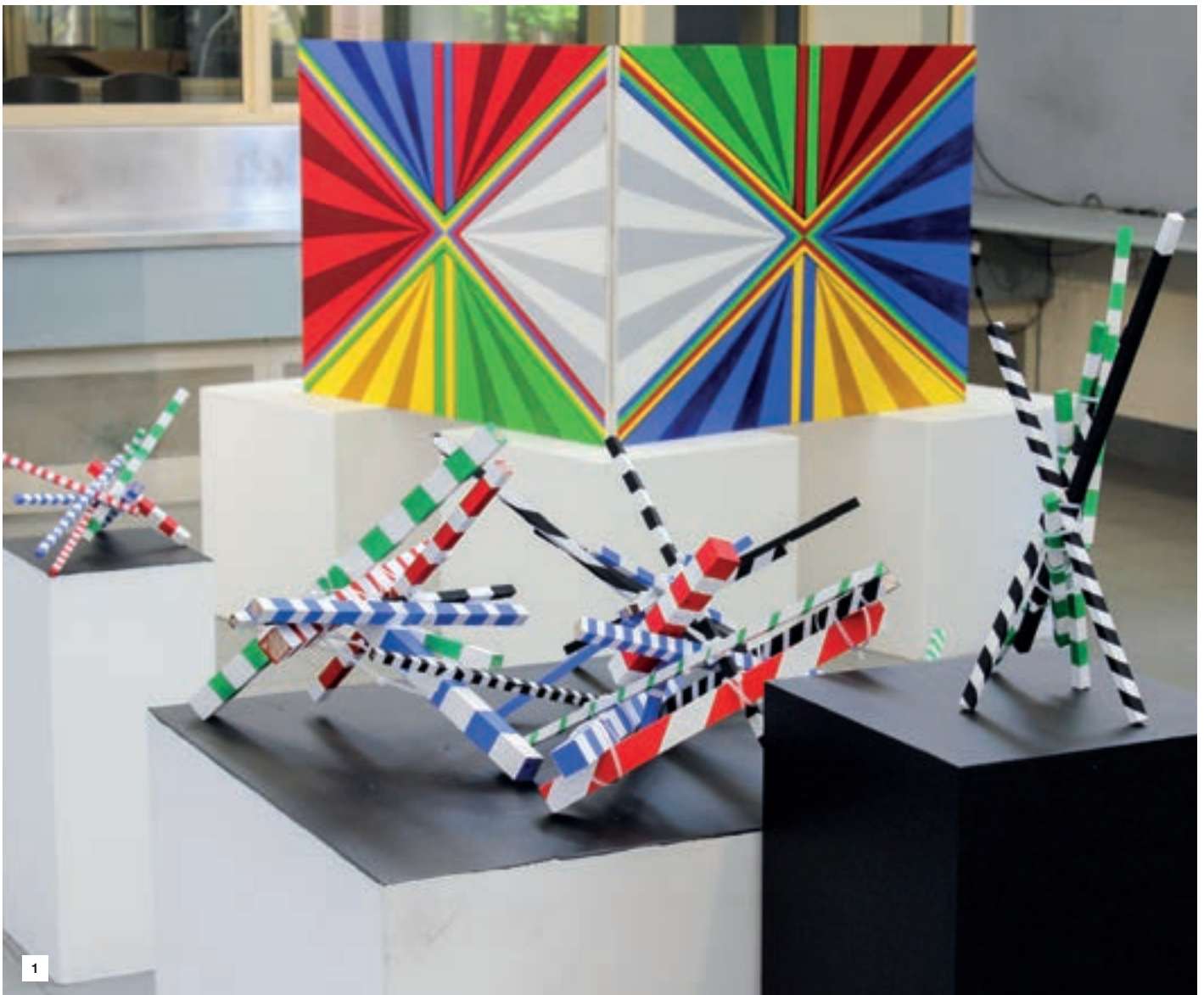

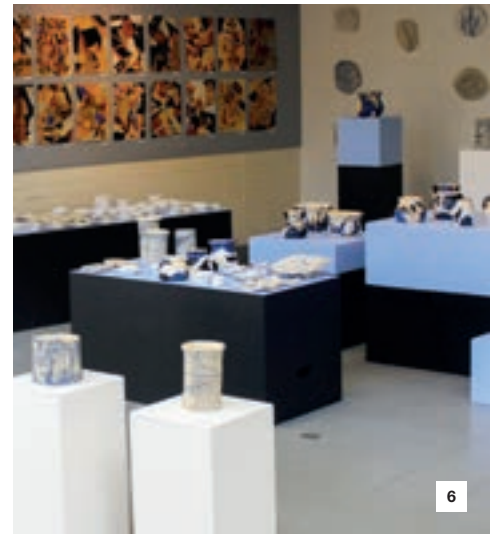

Junior School Art

The Junior School Visual Art Program was filled with incredible art-making throughout the year. Painting, wool weaving, designing, clay making, wire weaving, collaging, print making, dot painting and sculpture making filled the Junior School Art room.

Our Reception boys studied artworks by artists Henri Matisse and Giuseppe Arcimboldo; and our Year 1 boys explored artworks and techniques by artist Vincent van Gogh, John Olsen, Sidney Nolan and Hokusai. Year 2 boys explored Kinetic art by Calder, Klee and da Vinci. Year 3 explored Abstract Art and were immersed in colour, influenced by Spanish artist Pablo Picasso. Year 4 explored Modern Art by Japanese artist Yayoi Kusama and her pumpkins, and contemporary Aboriginal dot paintings. Year 5 explored the American Pop Art movement and contemporary Aboriginal Art, which was represented through clay, printmaking and in acrylic painting. Year 6 explored Escher, Fibonacci spirals, stencil-making and printmaking techniques by Australian artist Margaret Preston.

This year we welcomed Amy Joy Watson as our 2020 Artist in Residence in the Junior School. A renowned Australian artist, residing in Adelaide, students were grateful for the opportunity to learn from her expertise and share their artmaking with her. Amy's artworks often involve finely cut balsa wood to create geometric forms and delicate hand-stitching of segments of her sculptures. These sculptures, created with triangles and geometric shapes, provided the boys with plenty of inspiration.

Amy taught each year level from Reception to Year 6 how to build and create abstract

sculptural forms with an assortment of materials. This enabled every boy to see how Amy creates her artworks and the inspirations she draws from nature and geology. Year 6 students created three-dimensional octahedrons out of plastic and fabric. The boys also experienced making octahedrons with balsa wood. The challenging, intricate processes and techniques of building sculptural artworks produced beautiful results, which were awe-inspiring to the boys.

The Year 5 boys created abstract forms in balsa wood with equilateral triangles. These were painted with a wash of watercolour; the same way Amy creates her colours. The results of the colourful, three-dimensional sculptures were brilliant. Years 3 and 4 students created large, three-dimensional forms with cardboard and painted them with bright colours and patterns. The boys were excited to use hot glue guns, which sparked their creativity and created a hands-on experience in abstract art making. They found the process of building with Amy and her engaging techniques thrilling.

Year 2 boys created landscapes with balsa wood triangles and watercolour washes. Their attention to detail, delicate placement and techniques in watercolour displayed a high level of skill. Mountain ranges, contrasted against colourful backgrounds, formed beautiful artworks. Reception and Year 1 students created imaginative sea creatures with tangram shapes. The boys applied coloured washes on their balsa wood shapes to enhance the woodgrain and arranged each segment with care, until a creature was formed.

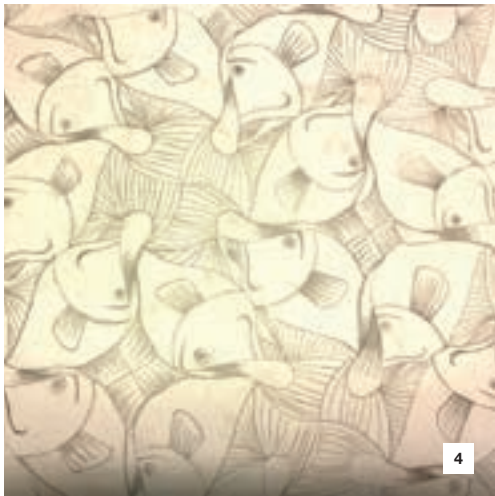

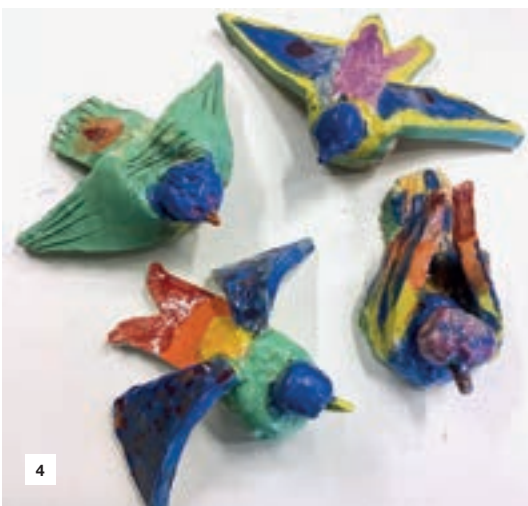
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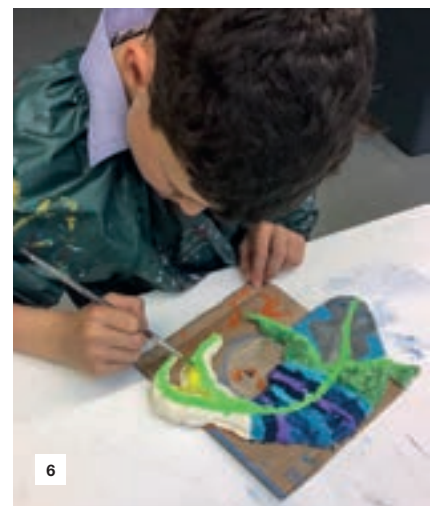

A Christmas Carol by Charles Dickens

In 2020, 26 dedicated Years 7 to 11 Drama students banded together to stage The Muppet's film adaptation of Charles Dickens' classic tale, 'A Christmas Carol'. Students and staff alike spent many after-school hours, over many months, creating a comedic, cartoonish, slightly musical, and very uplifting performance for the St Peter's College community to sit back and enjoy after a humbug of a year.

However, COVID-19 had a very different plan for our production. At first it severely restricted our seating, then it put cast members in isolation, and eventually it sent the whole State into lockdown, mere hours before opening night. The cast and crew were beyond disappointed with this uncontrollable situation but, using the skills we had all gained throughout this unpredictable year, we were resilient in the face of adversity and we adapted. We turned what was meant to be our final dress rehearsal into an impromptu performance for one class, and we recorded the play to share with family and friends. Considering the circumstances, the students presented a great show that brought laughter and joy to the small audience, which ultimately was what we were trying to share in these challenging times.

After this turn of events, the students had every reason to be Scrooge-like and grumble all the way through the festive season. Instead, they chose to see the humour in it all and looked for the positives, such as "the friends they made along the way," as Rizzo puts it. If there's one idea Dickens imparts in 'A Christmas Carol', it is that we must look for the good things in life, like family, friends, and love, and to be thankful for them, not just at Christmas time but all the year round, for without them, our world would be a very dark and dull place. The students embodied this idea, both on and off stage, and I could not have been prouder of them.

Despite the challenges, I feel so fortunate that this was my first directorial experience at St Peter's College, and privileged to have shared it with such talented, funny and kind students, and endlessly supportive staff. Everyone involved in this play became much stronger performers and people and, at the end of the day, that's what the co-curricular production is all about.

Year 12 Drama

The Pillowman by Martin McDonagh

We are all storytellers. We may not put pen to paper, or tap on a keyboard; nevertheless, we all compose stories that define who we are. We create a history for ourselves to be presented and consumed by others. We embellish, embroider and expunge events in order to reveal and explain our 'character'. In Martin McDonagh's, 'The Pillowman', all are storytellers. Like us, their lives are composed of moments that are a blend of fact and fiction. They tell stories that most definitely do not conclude with the phrase, 'and they lived happily ever after.' The darkness of McDonagh's play corresponded fittingly with the COVID-19 virus that plagued us in 2020.

An author, Katurian K. Katurian, is trapped in a totalitarian world of Kafkaesque nightmares. He is the creator of morbid tales that tell of gruesome human cruelty. Katurian (Samuel Harris) is arrested, along with his intellectually disabled brother, Michal (Aaron Godfrey) in connection with the murder of children. Both endure imprisonment and interrogation at the hands of two detectives, Tupolski (Teja Nairn) and Ariel (Jamie Grozev). The play is more than a detective drama, its plot is interrupted on several occasions by Storytellers (Tristan Theseira and Jayden Le) who bring to life Grimm-like fairy tales that reveal facts about the lives of characters.

Samuel Harris presented more than just a tortured and persecuted artist. He adroitly

expressed both the repugnance and love Katurian possesses for his brother. He did not allow the author's victimhood to diminish his ego, and efficaciously presented his hard-fought battle to be remembered by posterity. Aaron Godfrey's performance as Michal was mesmeric. Audiences witnessed a young man who, damaged by child abuse, clings on to his brother's love and must face the horrific consequences of his actions. Teja Nairn, clad in a sombre grey suit, used his stature and commanding presence to dominate the acting space. He interrogated his suspect with a calm demeanour, evidence of his moral certainty. When challenged by Ariel, and mislead by false stories, Nairn presented a cruelty that shocked. Jamie Grozev's Ariel began as a stereotypical thug, but as his story unfolded, he revealed Ariel's humanity, concealed behind a façade of violence. Grozev deftly captured the anxiety of a man who discovers that he, and the man he despises, share much in common. The Storytellers, Tristan Theseira and Jayden Le, served as the presenters of Katurian's imagination. Their considerable talents as actors were on display as they portrayed a range of characters from the author's tales. Whether playing a boy whose toes are amputated, parents who torture their son to improve his writing talents, a Pillowman who sacrifices his life, or a brightly coloured green pig, both young actors skilfully reminded audiences of fears they possessed as children.

Our production of Martin McDonagh's 'The Pillowman' told stories of murder and mutilation, it elicited both muffled laughter and grimaces, and, most importantly, spoke, even if only briefly, of love.

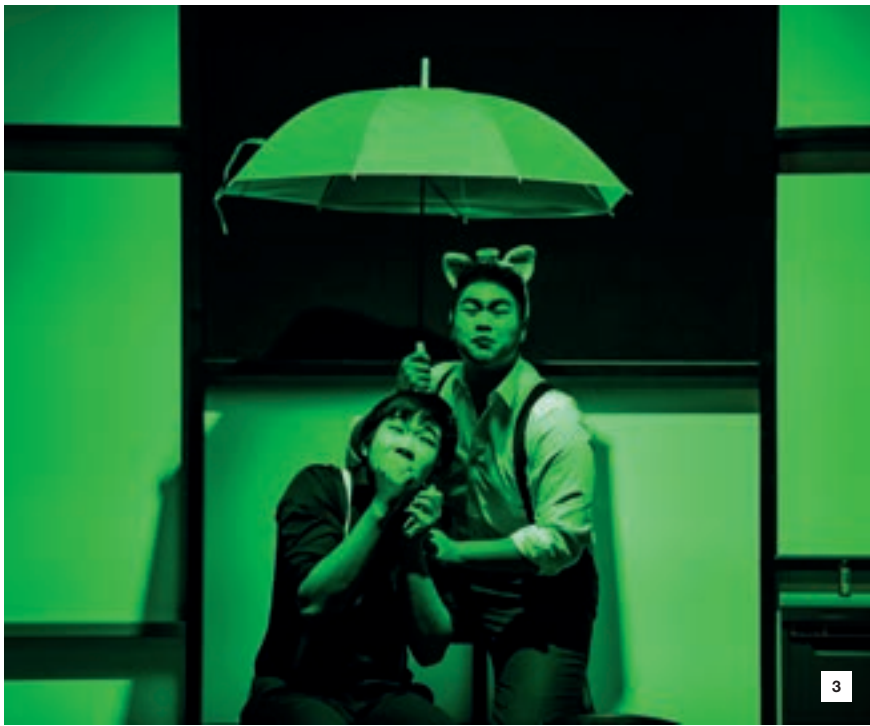

Year 11 Drama

Lord of the Flies by William Golding

In a year such as 2020, I am firstly thankful that the talented students of Year 11 Drama were able to perform in front of a live audience! Not all were so lucky.

William Golding's modern classic, 'Lord of the Flies,' tells the tale of a group of school students who have fled war torn England, only to find themselves marooned on a deserted island after their plane crashes. Fending for themselves, the students are forced to look inside and question the nature of humanity. They can either fall into the dark desperation of the savagery consuming them, or stand up for goodness and truth, simply "because what's right's right!"

This play required the actors to explore some of the more unpleasant qualities that make us human. This was particularly prominent in the noteworthy performance of Josh Wilson as he bravely transformed into the power-hungry, increasingly menacing, Jack. His kind-hearted counterpart, Ralph, was portrayed with great skill and authenticity by Lianos Karapetis, and these two students anchored the ensemble as the leaders of the opposing tribes.

Wilbur Glaetzer had stand-out moments as Simon, mesmerising the audience with his powerful voice and emotional courage. For his dynamic and animalistic physicality as Roger, special mention goes to Alex Karytinis, for truly unsettling audiences with his intensity. David D'Ottavi brought

impressive sensitivity and conviction to the role of Piggy, communicating many of the play's themes with his moral barometer, as he clings to the hope that civil values will prevail. Henry Chipperfield and Hugh Phillips were successful in their 'twin' roles of Sam and Eric, providing moments of comedy and high drama, and tackling the challenges of our multi-level set with enthusiasm. Daniel Feng as Maurice, and Callum Hill-Smith as young Percival, found originality in their supporting roles and should be commended for their creativity. Collectively, the actors tackled the emotional and challenging world of Golding's tale of survival with sensitivity and raw energy.

We were extremely fortunate to have Jack Blackburn in the role of production assistant, who supported his peers and helped to create our powerful set. A huge thank you must go to Ms Zoe Kirkwood, whose artistic talents allowed the dark and shadowy world of the island to come to life. Yet again, the fabulous Jake Nesbitt (Year 10) and James Ritossa (Year 10) added so much to the technical side of the production with their work on lighting and sound. Thanks also to the Art Faculty, especially Mr Scott Russell, Mr Paul Fabbro and Miss Hayley Patton. The creation of theatre is a truly collaborative effort and couldn't be done without these people.

The audience is forced to question what is real.

The Year 10 students were dedicated, passionate and invested in the process from the get-go. We were overwhelmed by their mature approach and their ability to unite as an ensemble and put on a terrific show. The growth and pride in their work was truly moving. They loved performing, and developed a unique camaraderie that is only ever achieved when people are brave enough to express their vulnerabilities and overcome them together. Their performances were mature, considered, detailed and moving.

Senior School Music

When the COVID-19 global pandemic struck, it sent the world into a panic. We were asked to cease teaching Music classes face to face and we were clearly devastated to put all our ensemble rehearsals on hold. The St Peter's College Music Faculty expeditiously put our heads together to work out how we were going to keep ensemble music alive while our students were in isolation and lockdown. Through many discussions, trouble shooting and creative planning, our Big Band, Recording in Isolation project. was born to engage approximately 350 students who had been participating in our Senior School ensemble program. This is what we did:

- **Step 1.** Each student in the ensemble program was issued with an AKG Lyra microphone.
- **Step 2.** Our students accessed Google Chrome and set up a BandLab account on their MacBooks.
- **Step 3.** Our sound engineer and ensemble directors then invited students to collaborate on specific individual projects via BandLab.
- **Step 4.** We created guide tracks (recorded by our instrumental staff and students), instructional videos and, through group instructional sessions with our ensemble members via Zoom, our students were equipped to initiate recording their own individual tracks remotely, whilst recording videos of themselves playing. They then emailed their large videos files to be prepared for editing to our production team via WeTransfer.
- **Step 5.** Our sound/video engineer was able to access students' individually recorded parts via BandLab and, by adding their videos to the production, the mixing process began.
- **Step 6.** The first ensemble to start recording was our most senior Big Band and Small Jazz Vocal Ensemble. Due to the COVID-19 situation at the time, they were faced with disappointment when their favourite event of the year was cancelled. Preparation for the national Generations in Jazz, Stage Band and Vocal Ensemble awards came to a grinding halt, which they had been rehearsing for with vigour and excitement.

The first of Big Band's recordings was a jazz standard called the 'The Song Is You' composed by Jerome Kern and Oscar Hammerstein, and arranged for Big Band by Mark Taylor. The second recording was a set piece for Generations in Jazz 2020 Stage Bands division 1 called 'Scar for Charlie' composed by Vanessa Perica. The third recording was 'Elijah Rock' arranged by local Adelaide musician Luke Thompson and recorded by our Small Jazz Vocal Ensemble.



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Big Band's repertoire was recorded remotely, featuring Mr David McEvoy as guest pianist, directed by Philip Walsh with sound and video editing by Brett Taylor (Pilgrim Arts). Small Jazz Choir was recorded remotely, directed by Julian Ferraretto with sound and video editing by Brett Taylor (Pilgrim Arts).

All our participants are to be congratulated for their hard work and efforts in engaging in and getting this complex job done. Through engaging in this project, our students were able to thrive in their performance level whilst keeping ensemble music alive. In many cases this was the first experience many of our students have had recording themselves play. The outcome of this project has established a completely new way of listening, seeing and hearing music in this context, and will connect with audiences in a different way to a live performance. Recording in isolation was powerful for

our students in staying connected with their like-minded peers, and feeling part of something bigger than just themselves, alone in isolation. Thus, enhancing positive relationships in their life and perceiving a deeper meaning in what they do; providing a sense of achievement and involvement in something greater than themselves.

When Martin Seligman talks about thriving, he uses the word 'flourishing' and his Perma model of happiness involves positive emotions, flow, positive relationships, meaning and achievement. It goes to show that through diligence, grit and resilience, we can continue functioning and indeed flourishing through any crisis the world throws up.

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Junior School Music

Junior School Music has continued to provide the younger students at St Peter's College with many varied performance opportunities. Despite the challenges of 2020, every boy in every year level performed in a concert. Those in a co-curricular band, choir or ensemble also had many opportunities to perform.

The Junior School Music team is very grateful and appreciative of the unwavering support from the School leadership, especially as delivering a Music Program was faced with a plethora of challenges towards the close of Term 1. In modified forms, instrumental lessons were maintained. All bands, ensembles and choirs continued to rehearse, perform and record. In the absence of concerts, each and every assembly became a concert within itself, which included two to three groups performing.

The Years 5 and 6 Annual Concert simply could not happen in Term 2. Elements of this event were transferred to the Junior School Music Showcase held at the close of Term 4. Every student in Year 5 was part of a massed choir and presented a stunning medley at the Rewind Concert, which featured music from the 1960s and 1970s. On the xylophones, 5P and 5S performed 'Venus' by Shocking Blue, and 5L and 5B performed 'Surfin' USA' by The Beach Boys. All of this repertoire was arranged specifically to suit the skillset of our students and backed by a band of professional musicians. The Year 6 students presented their dance items after working with a professional choreographer throughout Term 4. In addition to this, there were performances from Chamber Choir, Chamber Strings, Years 5 and 6 Choir, Guitar Ensemble, Percussion Ensemble, Swing Band and Junior Concert Band.

The Years 1 and 2 Concert under the expert direction of Ms Katie Carey, presented Songs from Broadway, which demonstrated music education at its very best, featuring singing, dance, and body percussion all bundled in with joy and a true love of learning.

The Year 3 students were guided into the world of strings under the watchful eye of our new Strings Coordinator, Mrs Sharon Morley. The Year 3 Concert, which showcased the Year 3 Strings Program, was moved to Memorial Hall this year, resulting in a heightened and rich performance experience for all.

In Year 4, all students were involved in the Band program. The buzz amongst this cohort gained more and more momentum as the weeks passed. Record numbers of students from Year 4 also opted to join the Preparatory Concert Band from Term 3, which extended their learning and accelerated their progress even further. The Year 4 Concert was also relocated to Memorial Hall and ended with the students combining to perform 'When the Band Goes Marching In.' I am pleased to report that an extremely high percentage of Year 4 students have opted to continue with their instruments in 2021.

Reception students performed a newly devised Nativity, compiled by Ms Carey and the Reception class teachers. The Nativity, through song, dance and drama, brought to life the meaning of Christmas. ELC classes showcased their skills at the Christmas Celebration, which was superbly coordinated by Ms Sheryle Yorston.

Junior School Music is a very busy place. We have around 30 instrumental staff visiting us weekly, over 300 individual lessons taking place every week, over 12 ensembles rehearsing each week, along with concerts, assemblies and events galore. There are ongoing instrument repairs, endless allocations of sheet music, method books, timetable changes, costumes for concerts, timetable changes, correspondence to parents, negotiations with class teachers, room bookings, and the list continues. Our Music Administrator, Ms Anthea Charlton, does an incredible job managing and maintaining all these vital aspects of Junior School Music and we give an enormous thanks to her.

The Junior School Music team look forward to continuing to provide exceptional learning through music in 2021.

Junior School

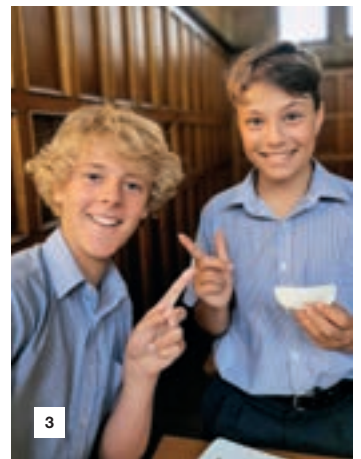

The past 10 years have seen an explosion in the amount of material that young people read. I know you're thinking "What is he on about? My boys never read books!" But that's not what I'm talking about. What I'm talking about is the internet.

Students receive more information in a day than people 100 years ago did in a year! And they are reading it all on their phones or devices. The constant need to update and check, and be 'in the moment' is a constant pressure for students, and it drives other behaviours - like not reading novels!

In the English Faculty we have been looking to address these needs for the students, in particular the need for students to be able to read critically, and not be susceptible to fake news and other internet hyperbole. It is an enormous challenge, but also our most important challenge, as making students critical thinkers is key to making our students great citizens and better learners overall.

I would like to thank the team for all their work this year. Our new staff, Ms Shelley Laing, Mr Tom Higgins, Ms Nia O'Loughlin and Ms Karen Petterson have become part of the team so quickly and effectively. Thank you for supporting each other and the students throughout the difficult year that was 2020.

Humanities

2020 was an unprecedented year, with resilience, adaptability and change being central themes.

Although many of our excursions were cancelled, Humanities subjects continued to thrive as students sought to gain a deeper understanding of the world of work, investment and tertiary choices. As an example, nearly half of all Year 11 students study Economics. For Geography, this was evident in the number of students who entered the Australian Geography Competition, which attracts over 65,800 students from 699 schools across Australia. The results for this year were outstanding, with 28 percent of our students placed in the top 20 percent of Australia.

In addition, Guy Strong placed in the top one percent of South Australia for Year 11 and is being considered as a potential member of the Australian team for the 2021 International Geography Olympiad in Istanbul, Turkey.

Members of the Historical Society led Year 7 Humanities classes on Tours of the World War I commemorative sites of the School. Students completed a worksheet to accompany their tour to sites such as Memorial Hall, the Gallipoli Oak and the Jury Fountain. The School also learned that Shreyas Khanna (Year 11) had received an honourable mention for his entry in the Simpson Prize. This follows his award of the Premier's ANZAC History Prize in 2019.

In Year 11 Legal Studies, Alec Padfield, Jonathan Davies, Alistair Sarah and Harrison Mintz participated in the South Australian Schools Constitutional Convention where they had the opportunity

to learn and share their views on the Australian Constitution with members of parliament and university professors. As a result of his outstanding work, Harrison Mintz (Year 11) was selected to attend the 2021 National Schools Constitutional Convention in Canberra.

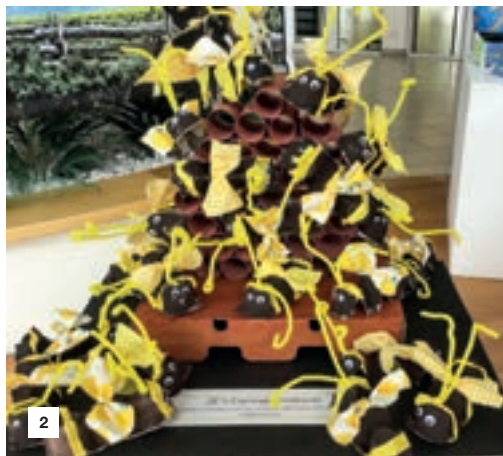

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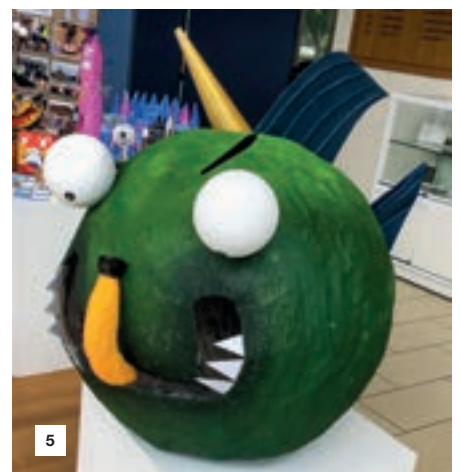
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Miller Library

Libraries are “no longer just bookshelves full of books where students can browse and borrow but are centres where all modern technical resources are used in the pursuit of knowledge.”

This visionary sentiment, highlighting the changing roles of libraries, are the profound words of the Reverend John Miller, whose namesake proudly adorns our walls. As Headmaster of the School from 1961 to 1978, Miller’s legacy is perhaps best remembered through the opening of the Miller Library in 1977. His notion that, “true scholarship and a good library” go hand in hand has been the guiding force behind our resources, services and activities for the past 43 years.

It is with quite a bit of amazement to reflect on the fact that St Peter’s College has had a library in some respect since 1900. Even amidst the disruptive, unpredictable year of 2020, Miller Library has persevered in keeping the 120-year library spirit alive. This was achieved most notably through our celebration of Book Week. Utilising brainteasers, puzzles and optical illusions to bring the ‘Curious Creatures, Wild Minds’ theme to life, students were challenged to take apart and put back together the numerous wooden and metal puzzles on offer, as well as engage with an entire wall of illusions that were guaranteed to test and confuse the mind.

Other noteworthy events include our Banned Books display. The showcased books, with an interactive element highlighting when and why they were once banned, challenged or censored around the world, was met with enthusiasm from the students. Similarly, our Term 3 activity, Blackout Poetry, was wildly popular. This style of poetry involves blacking out words from an already printed text using a marker and then using the remaining words to form a new, original poem.

In addition to our newly implemented fortnightly magazine, ‘Novel’, Miller Library has also embarked on a project to research and publish eBooks about our rare and early imprints collection. Collaborating with students from the Historical Society, books dating back to 1540 or as valuable as Gould’s Birds of Australia are available to the students for them to research and write about.

The Reverend Miller could not have been more correct when he stated that, “a library must depend for its success on the ability and devotion of the librarian.” It is with this in mind that Miller Library welcomed Ms Katherine Hicks as Acting Head of Library Services. Ms Hicks has over 10 years of experience in school and academic libraries and will continue to steer the library in new directions. Another staffing change to the library involved the welcoming of a new Library Technician this year, Mr George Becker. Mr Becker’s recent completion of a Master of Information Management in addition to his voluntary work as a Prison Librarian have earned him a unique and invaluable skillset that will benefit the library for years to come.

From our new digital magazine service to our extensive collection of eBooks and ever-increasing fiction and non-fiction titles, Miller Library strives for student engagement and we are thrilled to see the love of learning and enthusiasm within our space continually increasing.

Maths

The Mathematics staff acted in a professional manner during the lock-down periods, keeping students up to date using a variety of technological means to ensure their learning was not diminished. In Years 7 to 10 this was aided by the use of the Cambridge online books, which allowed tasks to be set and examined remotely.

Students requested acceleration in Year 10 SACE Stage One Mathematical Methods, which we were pleased to be able to provide in Semester 2 via a Tuesday evening lecture and tutorial. Many of the students have thrived in this program and are looking forward to undertaking Stage Two Mathematical Methods in 2021.

Our Year 12 class rose above the challenges of 2020 to produce an exceptional set of results. The effort these students put into their studies was extraordinary and should be commended.

We look forward to continuing to innovate in educating the students mathematically, and extending them to the best of their abilities with problems and challenges that will inflame their love of Mathematics during 2021.

Personal Development

Health and Physical Education Wellbeing

It has been a year of change and initiation in Health and Physical Education (HPE) with the introduction of a range of new electives in Years 9 and 10, a new SACE course and increased collaboration with the Athletic Development department, led by Stuart Mitchell. Students had the opportunity to learn applied skills in the Sport Science field through specific subjects in Biomechanics, Physiology, Human Performance and Analytics, and Coaching and Health Science, which involved presentations, the use of new technology and visits to the University of South Australia. Assignments were designed around higher order thinking and the use of data and performance to enable learning to be relevant. Year 12 students participated in a Triathlon and were engaged as coaches of Junior School co-curricular sporting teams for their major assessment.

With the forced shutdown of practical lessons due to COVID-19, the department developed an online strength and conditioning program through TeamBuildr and OneNote. All students from Years 7 to 10 engaged in a program supported by qualified strength and conditioning professionals to keep active, and to learn about functional movement and lifelong physical activity. In 2021, this approach will be expanded to focus on a sequential development of movement competency, which will seek to improve each and every student's physical literacy.

The 2020 year was one of challenge, yet also considerable ingenuity which has shaped how HPE will be delivered into the future. The close synergy between Athletic Development, Sport and HPE is the natural progression towards students learning in, about and through physical activity.

In Wellbeing lessons, the focus in the taught curriculum was on building resilience through the application and practice of Positive Education principles. In Year 8, students learnt positive skills, how to deal with thoughts and feelings, and explored the role of gratitude to enhance positive emotion. In Year 10, students further built stress management skills by exploring mindfulness, engagement and flow, and learning how to apply the science of character strengths to live a meaningful and purposeful life.

Religious Education and RAVE

Students study Religious and Values Education (RAVE) from Years 7 to 10, in addition to Stage 1 Religious Education in Year 11. In 2020 a stage, not age, approach was undertaken with the Stage 2 course. A combination of Year 11 and 12 students studied Religious Education, which was successful in the first year of its implementation. These courses focus on the nature and importance of religion, and give students opportunities to explore and question the relevance of religion, particularly Christianity, in today's society.

Science

In early March and August, we rented a state-of-the-art scanning electron microscope, which had a magnification factor of up to 10,000 times. The microscope was used by Biology and Physics students across all years. Although the best images came from lower magnifications, Figure 1 is an image of a pollen basket full of flower pollen, taken by a Year 11 Biology student.

One of the toughest competitions in schools is the Australian Science Olympiads. These examinations take place in June and test the skills of students in exceptionally challenging ways. This year we entered students in the Physics, Chemistry, Earth and Environmental Sciences, and Biology categories. The following students achieved a High Distinction, ranking them amongst the top 10 percent of entrants:

- Alexander Grice (Year 11), Physics
- Zihao Wu (Year 11), Physics
- Eric You (Year 11), Physics and Chemistry

Xian Huang (Year 11) achieved a High Distinction in Physics, Chemistry, Earth and Environmental Sciences and Biology. To place at this level in four disciplines is an outstanding achievement.

Tom Hosking (Year 11) achieved a High Distinction in Chemistry. Tom was invited to the Summer School in January, in preparation for the International Chemistry Competition. This invitation places him in the top 16 in the country.

Nic Koh (Year 10) was invited to summer camps in Physics, Maths and Informatics. Being selected as one of the top 16 students in Year 11 for one subject is quite an achievement. Achieving this in three is outstanding. Doing this as a Year 10 student is amazing.

In Term 4, every student in Years 7 to 10 sat the ICAS exams, which is an international competition in Science. Our results were outstanding, with 62 students achieving Distinctions, placing them in the top 10 percent, and a further 11 students gaining High Distinctions, which were only awarded to the top 1 percent of those who competed. The High Distinction recipients are:

- Year 7: Lachlan Siow
- Year 8: Tristan Lowe, Alexander Koh
- Year 9: Max Wang, Hieu Pham, Gunin Singhal
- Year 10: Alexander Grice

For the first time in 2020, our students were awarded medals for the highest score in the assessment in SA and NT in all four school years. The medal winners are:

- Joseph Fitzgerald (Year 7)
- Siyu Cai (Year 8)
- Darren Nguyen (Year 9)
- Nicholas Koh (Year 10)

In November, we were fortunate to take seven 10-inch reflecting telescopes to the Year 8 camp. The mostly clear night skies allowed students to look at Saturn's rings

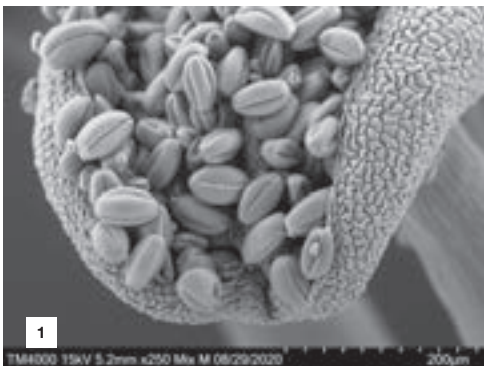
and moons, Jupiter's storms, Mars' polar ice caps and the nebulae in Orion and Pleiades.

Finally, we concluded the year with the 5th Annual Year 7 Science Rocket Car Challenge on the tarmac outside of Memorial Hall. Forty-eight groups of students competed in the challenge and points were awarded for car design and top speed. Despite some early wind, the conditions were ideal for rocket car testing and the cars achieved speeds well in excess of 100 kilometres per hour in under a second. The winning team triumphed with a top speed of 160 kilometres per hour. The winners of the trophy are Oliver Nugent (Year 7), Lachlyn Vuong (Year 7) and George Quigley (Year 7).

Spanish

Picking up a new language in Year 11 is a challenge to be embraced. Spanish Ab Initio topics range from leisure activities to environmental concerns and from human ingenuity to social issues. Students develop their skills in listening, speaking, reading, writing and grammar. In just two years, students with no prior knowledge of the language can understand and create their own texts on a range of themes.

The students engage with authentic videos about the cities of Sevilla, Bilbao and Madrid, and learn about animals in danger of extinction. No cultural experience is complete without tasting some tapas, and in Term 3 the students enjoyed a Spanish lunch of gazpacho, paella, patatas bravas and churros con chocolate for dessert.

Technology

2020 was an incredibly successful year in the Technology Faculty. The flexibility and resilience of both staff and students as we negotiated the remote learning restrictions due to the global pandemic was extraordinary. Due to the practical nature of many of our courses, significant time away from the classroom would have been very difficult for students to complete projects. Fortunately, we only missed a relatively short period of time and, upon resumption, students made the most of the opportunity to be back in the technology environment.

Digital Technology

Digital Technology introduced two new electives in 2020. Both electives, Game and App Development and Building a Computer, were very popular with the students. The Game and App Development elective allowed students to investigate the 3D gaming world. They developed their skills in 3D modelling and programming in C#.

The Building a Computer elective introduced students to the inner workings of a computer and recreated this using the Raspberry Pi microcontroller, which was set up as a web server, security camera, integrated development platform for Python programming, and a database running MySQL.

Design Technology

Each year, the Rotary Club of St Peter's invites the Design Technology department to nominate students to receive the Creativity and Design Excellence Award for their work during the year. In 2020, the three recipients were Rhys Godfrey (Year 12) for his superb 4x4 utility box produced in Stage 2 Material Products class, and Sam Golding (Year 11) and Austin Hushen (Year 11) for their projects developed as part of the Stage 2 Integrated Learning class.

Art/Technology Show

Unfortunately, the 2020 Art, Design and Technology Exhibition was cancelled at late notice due to COVID-19 restrictions. Both students and staff are to be congratulated on their preparations for the event and we look forward to resuming this special event next year.

Future Problem Solving

Future Problem Solving (FPS) is an international education program for students that focuses on the development of creative and futuristic thinking skills. Through the imagining of future social concerns, participation in the program fosters the enhancement of skills, such as problem identification and the consideration of positive solutions to those problems.

Through thoughtful engagement, FPS aims to give young people the skills to design and promote positive futures for the society in which they live.

In short, students who participate in FPS develop skills through the following aims:

- To think more creatively and positively about complex social issues
- To develop an active interest in the future
- To improve communication skills (oral, written and dramatic)
- To develop a variety of research skills
- To think critically, analytically and creatively

This year, the students had a variety of social concerns to consider. The future scenes included international travel, sleep patterns, gamification, living in poverty and de-extinction.

In 2020, St Peter's College successfully participated in one of the FPS options available to students: scenario writing. Our national results were very strong.

Darren Nguyen (Year 9) competed in the middle division for his scenario, 'The Meaning of Life' within the gamification problem. Gunin Singhal (Year 9) wrote an expansive response entitled, 'The Fate of Humanity' exploring the consequences of medication engineered to keep people awake and alert. These students must be commended on directing their own learning and submitting creditable responses to the future scenes given.

Future Problem Solving is a wonderful opportunity for students to imagine the world they would like for their future. As action follows thought, this could be their first step to making their imaginings a reality.

Public Speaking

Unfortunately, due to COVID-19 the state-wide public speaking competitions were cancelled in 2020. Fortunately, every year at St Peter's College we hold two public speaking competitions. I would like to thank Mr Thomas Higgins for his help in judging this year's competitions.

All Year 11 and 12 students are invited to compete for the St Peter's College Reverend W H Irwin Memorial Prize for Public Speaking. This year marks the 72nd year of the competition, which has been conducted annually since 1948. Its previous winners include former South Australian Premier John Bannon AO. While the field was small in 2020, we heard some excellent ideas in both the six-minute prepared speeches and the shorter impromptu section. This year, the winner was Xian Huang (Year 11).

Years 7 to 9 students are invited to compete for the Arnold Reid Prize for Public Speaking. The prize is named after an old scholar who attended the School from 1912 to 1915 and established the Arnold Reid Prize for Public Speaking. Although first awarded in 1945, the competition was not contested between 1981 and 2009. Fortunately, the competition was re-established in 2010.

Students who have demonstrated flair and interest in public speaking are invited to participate. After making a choice from a range of topics, students prepared a six-minute speech and then delivered a three-minute impromptu speech. Whilst this year's field of contestants was small, the quality of speeches was extremely high. Our congratulations go to this year's winner, Bingqi An (Year 9).

Historical Society

The Historical Society reformed in 2020 to meet the constraints of COVID-19. The focus has been on the School's history, allowing the small but active membership to use the resources available on our grounds to develop some valuable and ongoing projects. We were lucky to be able to hold our introductory open tour of Old School House in February just before the first lockdown, and Society members also managed to meet with Ms McKinnon-Matthews, School Archivist, to tour the standing exhibition in Athelney House.

When the redevelopment of the Big Quad was announced, Andrzej Czechowicz (Year 10) and James Loftus (Year 11) met with the Headmaster, Mr Browning, to initiate a specific research of the Big Quad history, using the School and State archives for information. The intention is to present the findings of this research at a School Muster early in 2021 to explain the Big Quad's history to students and staff. The Big Quad Presentation will then become part of the School's archival collection.

Another major ongoing Society research exercise is the construction of an investigative e-book based on the 'Journal of Captain Cook's Voyages' published by G W Anderson in 1789, which is currently held in the Miller Library. Miller Librarian, Mr Becker, is mentoring the members involved in this project. What a great opportunity this gives those involved, to increase their research and publishing skills.

Society members again led Year 7 classes on guided tours of the School's WWI commemorative sites. This has become an annual exercise, designed to help students and staff become more familiar with their School's environment and history.

The Society has met every week, when possible, throughout the school year and used this time to discuss many topics of interest. James Loftus also gave a superb open dissertation entitled, 'Genghis Khan - Good or Evil?', which covered historical and current perceptions of this historical figure. Eighteen students and staff attended, and the resulting discussion was both lively and informative.

The current leadership group aims to increase both membership numbers and activities in 2021 and, given the enthusiasm and pro-active nature of the current group of student members, the future of the Historical Society is in excellent hands.

Indigenous Program

To begin the 2020 school year, all staff attended a Cultural Awareness session with Paul Vandenberg from the Port Adelaide Football Club. The session focused on building an understanding of Aboriginal culture and issues that many Aboriginal people face today. On the first day back, all staff and students gathered to acknowledge the commencement of the school year with a Smoking Ceremony led by Aboriginal leader Uncle John Lochowiak. It was a wonderful sight, having our school community share in such a special ceremony.

Our Indigenous Youth Leadership Program (IYLP) with The Smith Family has commenced. The IYLP offers scholarships and leadership opportunities to young First Nations Australians, with a focus on youth from communities in very remote areas of the country or regional communities. The IYLP supports scholarships for First Nations students to attend approved secondary schools, day and boarding, government and non-government. In addition to helping First Nations students achieve their educational aspirations, the IYLP supports the development of a pool of positive role models and future leaders, to inspire other Aboriginal students and illustrate the successes that can be achieved through educational attainment. With this new partnership we will continue to develop our Indigenous Education Program's orientation, wellbeing and pathways to ensure our First Nations students have a successful education at St Peter's College.

For the annual Indigenous Football round between St Peter's College and Rostrevor College, our First Nations students and 1st XVIII Captains worked in conjunction with Aboriginal artist Sasha Hill to create and paint the design of the Football jumper. The finished artwork beautifully represents our First Nations students and their culture, the School, its values and community. The artwork also pays respect to the School's history and the future ahead.

To support the launch of our 'Kurna Word of the Week' project we were fortunate to engage with Kurna language teacher, Kira Yaltu Bain. Kira is one of only four Kurna language teachers in the world and is passionate about reviving the language. Kira spent time in Junior School classes, with the Senior School student Reconciliation Group, and with staff at an after-school language session. As part of NAIDOC Week, Uncle John Lochowiak spent time in each of the three ELC classes, a relationship that extended throughout 2020. The ELC staff has developed fantastic learning opportunities for our youngest students regarding Indigenous Education, which created some great storytelling moments when Uncle John visited. From a curriculum perspective we have partnered with Flinders University to deliver a Year 7 cross-disciplinary unit for HPE and RAVE. The unit of work will involve students learning about Aboriginal culture and the Aboriginal game Parndo will be taught using First Nations pedagogies. Flinders University will provide professional development to our teachers and will complete a research paper to be published.

We look forward to hosting our first Indigenous orientation program in 2021, when we will have new and returning First Nations students and their families stay in the Boarding House prior to school commencing.

Maths@Saints

Maths@Saints has continued to provide opportunities for students to develop their skills, understanding and enjoyment of Mathematics at all levels of ability throughout 2020. This includes providing additional subject support, facilitating students to participate in a variety of state, national and international competitions, as well as more informal opportunities such as inter-school quiz nights and extension activities.

After achieving outstanding results in Australian Mathematics Trust competitions, Nicholas Koh (Year 10) was invited to attend the Australian Mathematical Olympiad's School of Excellence at the end of 2020 to further develop his skills. A noteworthy achievement was Nicholas being the highest ranked South Australian in a number of these invitation-only events.

Old scholars Eric Zhou (FLL 2019) and Angus Ritossa (HWD 2019) have been instrumental in the continued success of the informatics program, which is proving popular amongst students who are interested in using their programming skills to solve challenging coding problems. With 40 students participating in the Computational and Algorithmic Thinking (CAT) competition, 15 received a Distinction or above. This was followed by the Australian Informatics Olympiad, with six students achieving medals, including Seb Birdseye (Year 8), Alexander Koh (Year 8), David Taylor (Year 8), Casper Cai (Year 8), Xander Grice (Year 10) and Nicholas Koh (Year 10).

Despite the challenges of 2020, the Australian Mathematics Competition continued to be a benchmark event. Students performed commendably across the Senior School with 16 students achieving High Distinctions. Of particular note were Joseph Fitzgerald (Year 7), Yitong Liu (Year 8), Darren Nguyen (Year 9) and Nicholas Koh (Year 10) who were awarded prizes for achieving scores in the top 99.7 percentile of participants across the nation. Joseph and Darren were also awarded Best in State for the highest scores in South Australia in their year level.

Despite an initial postponement, the Hamann Mathematics Competition once again provided students with an opportunity to demonstrate their reasoning and problem-solving skills. Seven students from St Peter's College achieved scores which placed them in the top 10 students in South Australia from their respective year levels. These students received certificates and prizes at an awards ceremony hosted by the Mathematical Association of South Australia in September.

Mooting

The St Peter's College Mooting tradition continued again in 2020, albeit a unique version of this co-curricular activity, given the unprecedented year. The South Australian Law Society and the University of Adelaide Mooting competitions were both cancelled due to COVID-19 restrictions.

The Mooting team demonstrated their flexibility, adaptability and dedication by focusing on the House competition. The House Mooting teams, comprising students from Years 7 to 12, were able to challenge themselves and develop impressive legal arguments involving both civil and criminal law cases. The House teams were randomly selected to represent either the prosecution or the defendants during the round robin competition. Every House participated, and every student had the opportunity to take on different legal roles including barristers, solicitors, witnesses, judges, associates and sheriff's officers. The teams prepared and presented their cases before judges from the Adelaide legal community, including former students and local solicitors.

Co-Captains Lachlan Jenkins (Year 12) and Jonathan Davies (Year 11) enthusiastically supported the Mooting team in order to help the students develop their legal skills. The Co-Captains were able to work with the younger students across the Houses to help encourage them throughout the season. The four-round competition resulted in a close battle between Short House and Farr House in the Grand Final. The competition included an impressive cross-examination by Farr's Alexander Rouss (Year 11) of Short House's unwavering star witness James Loftus (Year 11). In the end, the 2020 House Mooting Championship was presented to the well-deserving Farr House Mooting team.

Robotics

In 2020, the Robotics co-curricular program was offered to students in Years 7 and 8 for the first time. Over 100 students from Years 4 to 8 participated in the Sumo or Rescue disciplines of RoboCup Junior.

The first event was held early in Term 3, where the 13 Years 7 to 8 teams competed against each other to qualify for the State Rescue Competition, followed by a similar event for the 12 Years 5 to 6 teams.

The third event allowed our 13 Years 4 to 5 Sumo teams to battle it out to represent St Peter's College in the State Sumo Competition.

St Peter's College hosted the 2020 State Competition and our 15 Rescue (nine primary teams and six secondary

teams) and six Sumo teams were fierce competitors on the day. Two teams reached the quarter finals in Sumo but, unfortunately, neither made it into the semi-finals. In the Primary Rescue, four teams finished in the top ten and Alden Au (Year 6) and Vipul Pabbathi (Year 6) finished first after the three minor rounds. Alden and Vipul competed in the finals and just missed out on the first-place trophy. In the Secondary Rescue, five teams finished in the top ten with the fifth team finishing in 11th place after the minor rounds. Edward Gross (Year 7) and Aidan Du (Year 7) were ranked second. Both teams competed in the finals and finished third and second respectively. Six teams qualified for the National RoboCup Competition that will be held in Adelaide in 2021.

It has been a hugely successful year for the Robotics co-curricular program. With over 110 Junior School students already nominated for 2021, along with the Years 7 and 8 teams, plus those who have qualified for nationals, we look forward to a frantic and exciting year in 2021.

Tournament of Minds

Tournament of Minds (TOM) provides senior students the opportunity to solve authentic, open-ended challenges that foster creative, divergent thinking whilst developing collaborative enterprise, excellence and teamwork.

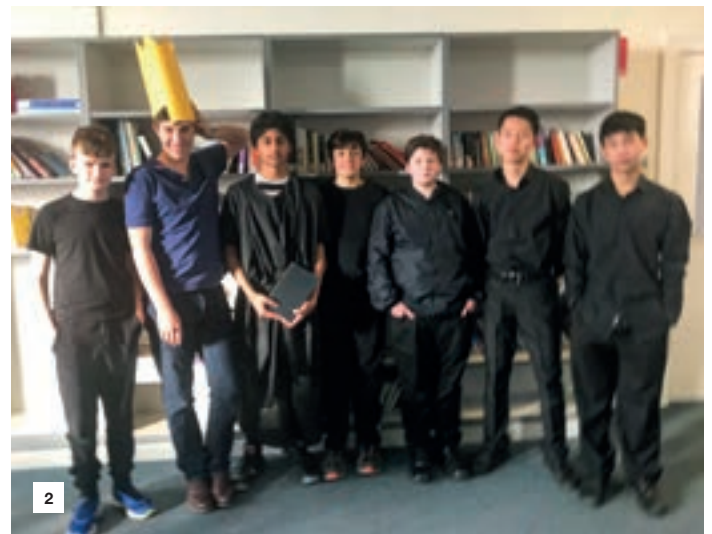

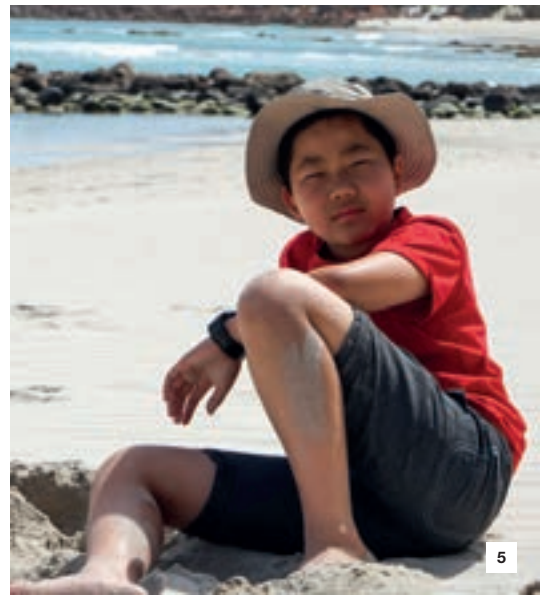

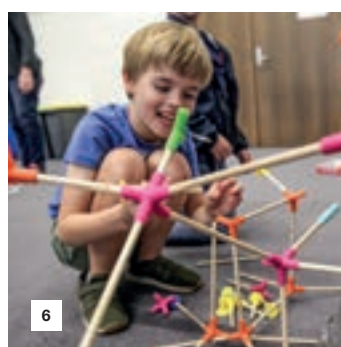
In the morning, the students ate breakfast before competing in a game of tug-of-war. This was a great test of their strength and teamwork and the students thoroughly enjoyed the experience.

Badminton

2020 was a challenging year for the St Peter's College Badminton program, but remained very successful in many respects.

The year began with a block of holiday training throughout January. This provided all Badminton students the opportunity to develop their overall game in preparation for interschool competition in Term 1. It was extremely pleasing to have more than 50 students, of all different ages and experience, attend these sessions.

The Badminton program catered for 150 students in Term 1, resulting in a total of 16 teams being fielded across both middle and senior interschool competitions; the most the School has ever had. It was also the first time the School had entered three teams in the Open A competition, further highlighting the quality and depth of the program. St Peter's College started the first half of Term 1 comfortably winning a large proportion of the 49 team matches played before the Adelaide Cup long weekend at the beginning of March. With a total of 56 matches still to be played, including the 2020 Intercollegiate fixtures, the season came to an abrupt end when all interschool competition was cancelled due to COVID-19. This was a bitterly disappointing end to the season for all involved, but fortunately the 2020 Badminton Intercol was rescheduled for later in the year.

With COVID-19 restrictions in place and the School's Head of Badminton, Stuart Rowlands, stuck in the UK, members of the Open A squad took to Zoom for training sessions for several weeks. A combination of online strength, cardio and footwork sessions ensured the students maintained some level of fitness in preparation for their return to the courts in June. During this period, Open A students were also fortunate to have an online Q&A session with England's number one men's singles player, Toby Penty. This was a unique learning experience for the students with Toby offering detailed responses to the boys' questions regarding his experiences in the sport.

By Term 3 the Badminton program was back in full swing with the exciting addition of a Development Squad session on Thursday mornings to supplement the Performance Squad sessions already offered to Open A team members throughout the off-season. The aim of these sessions was and will remain to provide additional opportunity and support to students showing talent and potential in Badminton to continue their development all year round. To consolidate the program's overall pathway, for the first time the

School offered Junior School Badminton sessions to Years 5 and 6 students in Term 3. These sessions were extremely well received by the Junior School community, with over 50 students registering for the program. The Badminton program will aim to continue offering Junior School students the opportunity to try Badminton from an early age, and for students who connect with the game the chance to develop their skills on an ongoing basis.

At the end of Term 3, our top five to six students in both the Open and Year 8/9 categories competed to become State Knockout Champions having qualified for the final earlier in the term. Our Open students managed to retain their title from 2019, beating Norwood Morialta High School 6-2 in the final. This feat was replicated by our Year 8 and 9 students who defeated Aberfoyle Park High School 8-0 to regain the title having lost to Glenunga in the 2019 final. This is the first time the School has held both the Open and Middle School State titles at the same time. Both of these teams should be congratulated on this achievement and for the sportsmanship and level of play they displayed throughout the competition.

Term 4 started unconventionally and with a lot of excitement surrounding the rescheduled 2020 Badminton Intercol. St Peter's College entered the match as strong favourites and, on this occasion, the students more than lived up to expectations, defeating PAC 11-1. Congratulations to all students involved in this Intercol, for which everyone was extremely grateful to be a part of given the possibility it may not have happened. This marked the end of the Badminton journey at St Peter's College for all our Year 12 students and the handing over of the batten for our leadership positions. The School would like to thank Austen Lindsay (Year 12) for his contribution to the program as Badminton Captain in 2020.

In the absence of Year 12s, 133 students across 13 teams formed the Badminton program in Term 4 2020. A total of 60 team matches were played over five weeks, with St Peter's College winning 40 of them. Prior to the final weekend of matches, summer sport competition was unexpectedly cut short for the second time in 2020 due to COVID-19. Fortunately, Senior School students had completed all five rounds of their matches by this stage and the Middle School teams only missed their 6th and final round. Unlike Term 1, the students were able to continue training at school until the end of the term.

Basketball

Preseason

The St Peter's College Basketball program was, once again, the largest school Basketball program in the state. With 19 teams in the Senior School and eight in the Junior School, the 2020 program comprised of 244 students from Years 4 to 12.

The first group to hit the floor were our Open 1st Squad. They began with Monday morning trainings in Term 1 under the guidance of new coach, Tim Odell. Our Middle 1st Squad were next with their new coach Helder Borgas and Mr Lucas holding them accountable for executing a fast-paced offence and aggressive full court defence. In the Junior School, our Year 3 skills sessions also commenced in Term 1. 34 Year 3 students learned the fundamentals of dribbling, passing and shooting throughout a six week program.

With COVID-19 delaying the season, many of students turned to our remote coaching tutorials to work on their skills, which included beginner, intermediate and advanced online videos. As restrictions eased in Term 2, students commenced with on court sessions, involving small group, non-competitive skill building sessions every day after school.

Official trials commenced in Week 7 of Term 2 with our Open and Middle School players being moved into four different squads. In the final weeks of Term 2, each squad was divided into two teams and had the chance to get to know their coaches and become familiar with their new teammates.

The Season

In the shortened, eight game season the 19 teams came away with an overall winning

percentage, displaying strength in both the higher and lower competitions. Each of the teams made a significant improvement and were commended by their coaches and managers for their work ethic at training, and competitiveness during games.

Congratulations to our Open 1st team. The students were one win away from qualifying for the State Championships. The Open 3rds are to be commended for a stellar season under the guidance of coach Tobias Dowdell. They showed their discipline and cohesiveness in a tight win against PAC during the final Intercol game. Well done to our Senior 1 Basketball team, who spent the entirety of their season competing against many of our opposing schools' best teams. It was a superb season for both our Senior 2 Blue and Senior 3 White teams. Both teams quickly gelled and ran away with a series of wins. Our Middle School teams had an outstanding finish to the season, going undefeated in their Intercol games against PAC.

The St Peter's College Boat Club 2019/20 season was another extremely successful one on and off the water, with all 177 students playing a key role in the success of all crews. Off the water, the students continued to hold themselves to a high standard in the classroom, other sports and co-curricular activities.

From the beginning of Term 4 2019, the start of the Rowing season, until the Head of the River on March 21 2020, students and coaches remained focused on the process of ensuring each student/athlete was able to progress individually whilst raising the standard of the whole squad.

They came away with convincing wins in the 1st VIII, 2nd VIII and 1st IV. The 3rd VIII finished third in the 2nd VIII race and 2nd IV finished fifth in the 1st IV race.

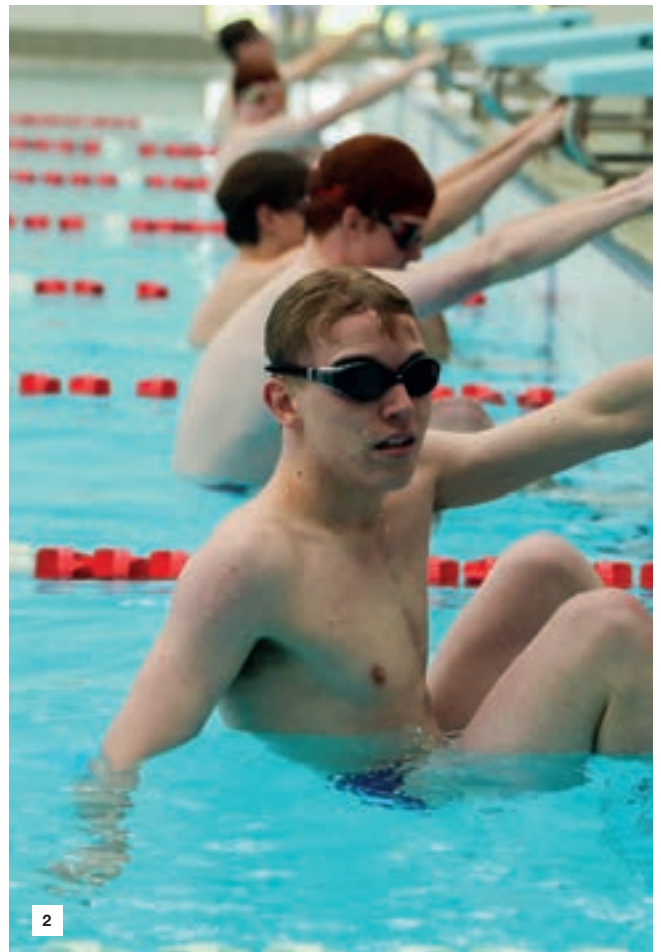

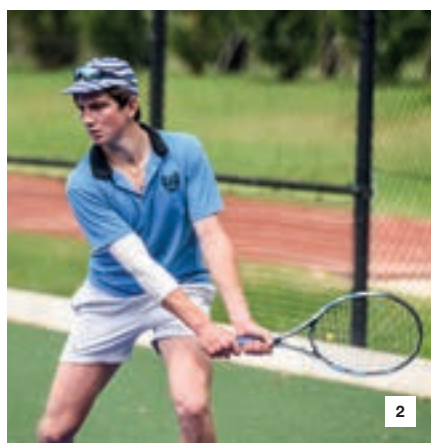

Water Polo

Water Polo continues to flourish with 140 students participating in the sport in 2020 and 13 teams representing the School on a weekly basis in Terms 1 and 4.

Unfortunately, COVID-19 resulted in an early finish to the Term 1 competition, with only four rounds played. Term 4 saw the resumption of full training and matches with the results for the year shown below.

The Middle Cs, which comprises Years 7 and 8 students demonstrated a genuine love of the game and were keen to play. They rapidly developed their skills under the expert guidance of coaches Graeme Litster and Sam Potter.

We had strong interest from Year 9 students for the Middle A and Middle B Water Polo teams this year with a significant number of students turning out for trainings and matches. The Middle As were undefeated throughout Term 4, while the Middle Bs faced some more challenging scenarios. Regardless of the outcome of the games, our students developed as players and showed commitment and resilience. The students thrived under the guidance of Nick Maddern, who encouraged camaraderie and enjoyment of the game.

The Open B1, B2, C1 and C2 teams wholly committed to trainings and matches throughout the season and it was pleasing to witness their growth in fitness and skill, thanks to the expert coaching of old scholars Jack Cleary (HWD, 2018) and Jack Duggan (FLL, 2018). The Open B1 played eight games, convincingly winning five. The last game of Term 4 was intense until the dying minutes in which the students took the win against PAC 11-9.

The Open C1s were consistent in their approach, taking four wins, including an enthralling match against CBC 8-4. The Open C2s showed courage throughout.

The Open A2 team played in the Open A competition against other schools' First teams and can be proud of their competitiveness. The first half of the season played in Term 1 saw a record of one win, one draw and three losses, with the highlight the come from behind win against Pembroke A1. James Hosking (Year 12) defended well in goals, whilst Lucas Langley (Year 11) and Lachie De Cesare (Year 12) were constant offensive threats. Ben Belperio (Year 12) and Alex Andreyev (Year 12) played solid team defence, whilst Ned Mintz (Year 11) and Harry Mintz (Year 11) improved their skills and understanding of the game.

Term 4 saw a number of younger players like Henry Stewart-Rattray (Year 11), Aleksandar Dobrijevic (Year 9) and Hamish Scott-Young (Year 9) win a promotion to the team. In a short season, the team had another win against Pembroke and four competitive losses.

The Open A1 team played their rescheduled Intercol match at the start of Term 4. The team was not at full strength due to Year 12 students studying for exams, and injuries to key players resulting in a loss to PAC. The students' level of commitment and sportsmanship was outstanding. Training sessions have taken on an increased focus of tactical development led by coach Matt Martin and the students are looking forward to 2021.

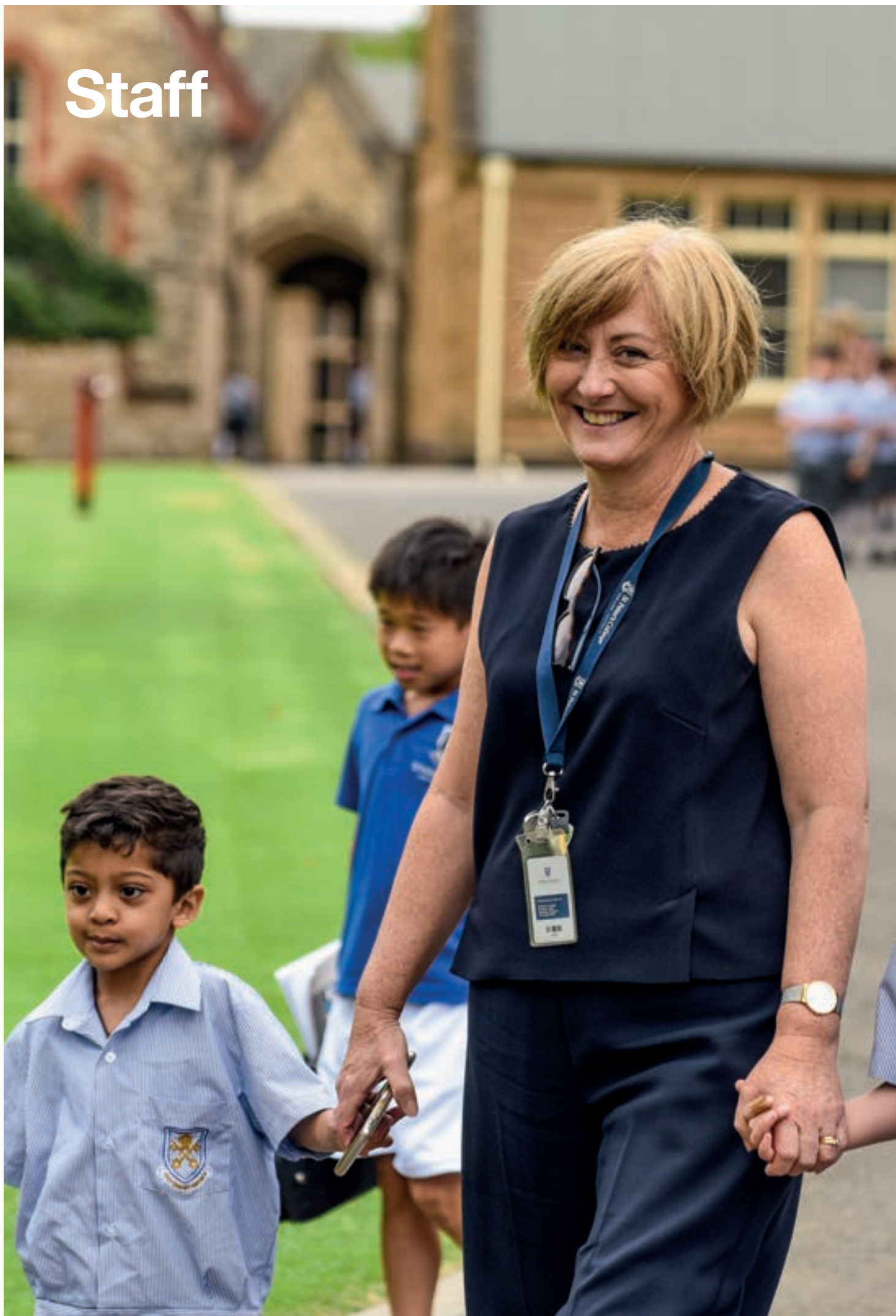

Sally Bartz

Mrs Sally Bartz joined St Peter's College from Northfield High School in 1985 as one of only two women on the Senior School staff. Appointed by former Headmaster, Dr Tony Shinkfield, she leaves the School, five Headmasters and two acting Headmasters later, having made an extraordinary contribution over 36 years.

There were very few women on the staff when Sally joined in 1985. One French teacher had come and gone; she was only allowed to teach, and have recess and lunch, in Memorial Hall, as the common room and general classrooms were no place for a Lady! On Sally's arrival, the female staff included Annette Chalmers, Head of Library, and Fran Conroy, also formerly of Northfield High School.

Sally is a wonderful History teacher, passing on her love of History to her students through courses such as Classical Studies, Ancient History, Modern History, Australian History and Australian Studies. She was on the State Design Panel for the development of Australian History and Australian Studies and set and marked exams for what was the PEB, then PES, then SABSA (now SACE) from 1976 to 2002. She was also the Supervising Examiner for Australian History for 11 years. Sally was Head of History for many years and was also Head of Faculty for Humanities from 2006 to 2016. What a wonderful contribution Sally has made to History for our School and State alike.

Sally is passionate about Australian Studies, and designed a wonderful Year 11 program for the School that helped boys discover not only who they are, but just as importantly, why they are as they are. The program also explored the First Australians

and their culture and a 'time travelling' experience through the Art Gallery of South Australia. To see, through the art of the period, how Australians' perceptions of themselves and their country changed, from early settlement right through to today, was a great experience.

Sally was patron of the Historical Society from 2001 and through her efforts and the members of this group, many tours of the School have been organised to teach the School's history to Years 7 and 8 students.

Sally's qualities as a teacher are encapsulated in this past student's observations: "School was never much joy for me, I struggled to focus and engage with subjects. When I first had Mrs Bartz in Year 8 she treated me with respect, dignity and kindness. She was able to capture my attention with engaging lessons on history, which I enjoyed immensely. She put her students first and understood her students and their needs. Her passion for history has instilled a lifelong passion for me; I continue to read and watch all things history."

Sally's care and generosity of time and spirit did not end with her students. She was a wonderful mentor to existing and new teaching staff, always touching base to ensure they had all of the materials and guidance needed for the various courses they taught. Before there was Google, staff tapped into Sally's extensive knowledge, and if she did not know the answer, she would certainly find it!

Sally was Committee President of the St Peter's College Teachers Association from 1991 to 1994 and was always an active member of this group. She was calm and organised, and recorded everything!

Joining Hawkes House at the beginning of 1993, Sally has been a wonderful mentor to the boys in her Hawks House mentor groups over the past 28 years - surely a record for association with the one House?

On the co-curricular front Sally was involved with Hockey, Tennis and annual Athletics judging for 36 years. Sally was a Senior As Tennis coach from 1985 until 1992, then Mid As coach until taking over the Tennis Coordinator's role in 2019. In winter, Sally could be found at the Hockey pitch. Sally engendered a passion for sport in all those who were lucky to be under her tutelage. She also sang in the Chapel Choir with students and staff who shared a passion for church music, from 1985 to 2001.

Her passion for education was also recognised in 2015 when she received an Australian Council for Educational Leadership Medal for service for education.

The St Peter's College ELC is influenced greatly by the Reggio Emilia Approach and at the heart of that is a poem written by Loris Malaguzzi, entitled The Hundred Languages. Throughout Sheryle's time we heard her speak the languages of kindness, student advocacy, progettazione, diplomacy and professional development.

Through Sheryle, students, staff and parents have had the privilege of working with an incredible educator who has been an essential member of the Junior School Leadership Team.

We wish Sheryle all the best in her future endeavours and know that there will be students who graduate from Year 12 into the 2030s who will remember Sheryle as being there at the starting line of an incredible learning journey.

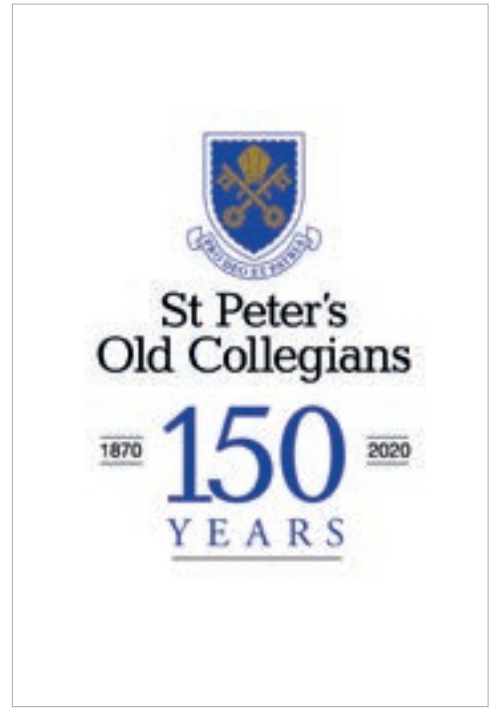
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SPOC Sport

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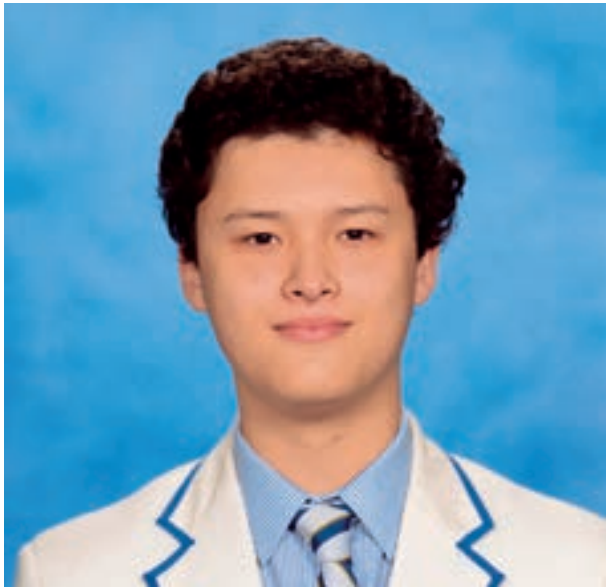
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Rhodes Scholarship



Matthew Goh (YNG 2015) was awarded a Rhodes Scholarship to study physics and mathematics at Oxford University in 2020. Matthew becomes the 42nd Rhodes Scholar to graduate from St Peter's College.

Matthew started in the St Peter's College Early Learning Centre in 2002 before graduating in 2015 as the Proximae Accessit. He studied the International Baccalaureate and obtained a score of 43 (an ATAR of 99.95). Along with the Robley Prize for the Proximae Accessit, Matthew left the School with many distinctions including School Prefect, the Order of Australia Association Student Citizenship Award, RR Stuckey Prize for Mathematics, German Prize and the Ella Roe Prize. Matthew played an active role at School and was a member of the Historical Society and Future Problem Solving and placed first in the world in the International Scenario Writing competition in 2015.

After graduation from St Peter's College, Matthew studied at the Australian National University (ANU) where he was awarded the University Medal and completed a Bachelor of Philosophy (Honours) in Theoretical Physics.





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
