From the Headmaster

2021, the second year of the pandemic, brought significant challenge to the SPSC community. Again, our students, staff and families responded with determination and ingenuity to ensure that programs were maintained and opportunities were presented for all boys to achieve. This success and achievement was made possible through the highly professional staff team who take great pride in their vocation and commitment to St Peter's College and our strong shared partnership with all families. We learnt in the first year of the pandemic that disruption caused by cancellation or delay to events and significant occasions for adults is disappointing, yet manageable; in the world of a young student, disruption or denial of access to specific occasions and experiences is far more significant. I remain ever grateful to our dedicated staff team for working creatively to ensure activities proceeded or were reinvented across the full age spectrum to ensure our young students maintained access to our programs.

Our School Captains, Sam Jackson and Rushan Khurram, have played an enormous role in connecting the entire School throughout the year. As an unlikely pairing, their teamwork and commitment to playing to their strengths has seen the flourishing of school spirit during these challenging times and the enhanced connection across varied parts of the School and student body. I commend both their example and service to our community throughout 2021.

The major capital project involving the complete renewal of the School's heritage precinct proceeded throughout the year. It is a credit to all students and staff that decanting of rooms was achieved without a single temporary demountable room being required. Big School Room and Big Quad have certainly been missed yet the promise of new, accessible facilities has brought about much anticipation. Our old scholars will remember rooms 4, 5 and 6 right up to 12 and a half with great fondness. Each of these spaces has been reimagined so that they can be deployed more effectively against modern and flexible pedagogy and practice. With new foundations and underpinning supporting the entire precinct, we look forward to Big Quad sustaining the centre of academia for the next 175 years. The renewal has been a complex and challenging project and I thank staff and students for managing all inconveniences.

As Headmaster I am regularly asked by stakeholders to name the greatest challenge to SPSC. Such a challenge is complacency. Education is changing, our nation and the world is changing, and it is essential that SPSC continues to innovate and develop programs that support our students in a way that they might meet the world with confident eyes. As a school it is vital that we continually look outside our postcode and benchmark our programs and achievements so that we are well placed to meet all future challenges. It is pleasing to see our academic results









place our median student in the top 8% of the nation. Likewise, winning the National Rowing Championship and seeing a number of our musicians selected for national honours sets an appropriate benchmark. The commitment and creativity of our staff team to develop and successfully pilot a new Cyber Studies curriculum for South Australia is further demonstration that SPSC is not complacent about the future and seeks to lift the horizon of the SPSC community and all students in the state.

At SPSC, culture is everything. As a school for boys, it is essential that we overtly normalise the right behaviours in the actions and minds of all our young men and boys. Following the national outcry regarding the issues of consent and relationships in Australian society and the inspiring visit to St Peter's College by Australian of the Year, Grace Tame as part of the Rex J Lipman Fellows Program, a review of of our culture and interactions was initiated. While this review is ongoing, I have been pleased to see a willingness from students to reflect on all conduct and interactions. The School anticipates introducing new and broad induction programs to address this important matter throughout our community.

As we approach the 175th year of the School's operations it is also timely that we reflect on the generosity of those who have come before us. Dating back to the original bequest by the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge when the land for our campus

was purchased and Big School Room was erected, everything we enjoy at SPSC is a gift. In 2021, for the first time, a public campaign was undertaken to promote our strong history of philanthropy and raise funds for a new student scholarship. This campaign saw 700 members of our community give generously to the campaign and establish this new scholarship. I am encouraged by the support of the community to work collaboratively to ensure that access to a first-class education at St Peter's College is broadened to more families.

This publication records only a flavour of the achievements of our students and the wider SPSC community throughout 2021 and I acknowledge the strong partnership between the School and each home that has made all progress possible. I commend the yearbook to you as a record of both the aspirations and achievements of 2021. I thank the graduates for their leadership and passion for both the School and their peers and wish them well in their future endeavours. May they and all other members of our community seek to present a balance of both strength and love in all pursuits beyond the School gates.

From the Chapel

The Chapel continues to play a significant role in the journey of each student at St Peter's College, providing a regular place of prayer, worship, reflection and, impressively for a boys' school, good singing. In their homilies, the chaplains continue to connect deep theology and Bible stories with real-life experiences, including using photos, short videos and music.

The major Christian festivals were celebrated with aplomb this year, with the celebration of Easter being a major cause for joy after the previous year's restrictions. The Rev'd Julie Worrall, Parish Priest of St Chad's Fullarton and Director of Formation (Clergy) for the Anglican Diocese of Adelaide, was the guest preacher on Maundy Thursday in the Senior School. For the major festival of St Peter's Day, the Venerable Sam Goodes, Parish Priest of St Andrew's Walkerville and Archdeacon of the Para region, preached on the spiritual writer Henri Nouwen and encouraged the boys to take the spiritual life seriously. In the Junior School, the Baptism and Holy Communion program (part of the RAVE Curriculum) culminated on the last day of

term in a whole of Junior School Eucharist, which included Baptism and Admission to Holy Communion. This was a wonderful way to celebrate St Peter's Day, as two students were baptised by the School Chaplain and 12 in total were admitted to Holy Communion.

In Semester 2 Alan Barrientos was appointed as the lay Assistant Chaplain (in training) to study at St Barnabas College and to offer himself for ordination as a school chaplain and an Anglican priest. Alan quickly established himself as a friendly, positive pastoral presence in the School.

The Confirmation program in the Senior School was again well received, as the school community welcomed Bishop Denise Ferguson to the Chapel on Wednesday 22 September for a 7.00pm service of Baptism and Confirmation in the Eucharist, with four students being baptised and 14 in total being confirmed.

Father Theo contributed a chapter on spirituality to The Palgrave Handbook of Positive Education. The chapter entitled

'Positive Spirituality' was accepted for publication and is chapter 23. The book has now been published by Palgrave (and also Springer) online as 'Open Access'. The entire book (or just individual chapters) is available as a free download. Simply search The Palgrave Handbook of Positive Education.

From the Deputy Headmaster/ Head of Senior School

Compared to most of the rest of the world, the South Australian school year was not ravaged by COVID-19 restrictions. Maybe we have this ahead of us, but in the bubble of 2021, we have been allowed to celebrate a school calendar full of mirth and muster. It has been a highly successful year in many ways. However, it is fair to say that many of the great things I have seen over the past 12 months have not all been the result of exceptional talent or ability, but simply the outcome of a positive attitude, good character and high effort; attributes accessible to all.

And it would be remiss of me not to acknowledge the 1st XV Rugby team for the generosity of their spirit and support of each other in a difficult season, and for prioritising a training environment that puts the experience and wellbeing of their teammates above performance or results.

Clearly, I have seen some of the best that our student culture has to offer.


It would be easy to assume that one's community is derived from one's place in the world: one's school, one's neighbourhood, one's town. But this

School Captain Speech Day Address

I would like to extend a warm welcome to the Archbishop of Adelaide, The Most Reverend Geoffrey Smith, Chairman of the Council of Governors, Mr Joe Thorp, Headmaster, distinguished guests, parents, staff and students.

Whilst Gillon McLachlan, CEO of the AFL couldn't be here today to deliver his address in person, I would like to thank him for his inspirational video message. There are two great messages from his video that I would like to mention. The first is to know that when you step into any role, there will be insecurities, challenges and doubts, but remember to be yourself, because that's what got you there. And the second is to say 'yes', more often than you say 'no'.

I stand here this afternoon as your School Captain, a previous Year 12 student, a brother, but most importantly, a mate. Our journey at Sancti Petri Schola Collegiata is coming to a close and we have nothing left to do but reflect on the wild ride we have had through these walls and fields.

In 2016, I walked through the Hackney gates for the first time, and began my journey at St Peter's College alongside my little brother Arch. To think that I now have the opportunity, six years later, to walk out those very gates for the last time with him and the 2021 cohort by my side, is something extremely special that I will take with me the whole way through life, and I know standing here, you all feel the same.

This wouldn't be a true student leader speech if I didn't incorporate a quote or two, so here's a quote from a Vietnamese proverb: "When eating fruit, remember the one who planted the tree." Now you're

probably sitting there nudging the person next to you thinking, what is he on about? Well, let's look at the first part of the quote. Let the fruit represent your future success with whatever you choose to do in life, and the rest is just remembering who, how and what got you there. The sacrifice that your parents, grandparents or guardian made to give you the gift of a St Peter's College education is undeniably large, not only in money, but in time and effort. Think about the hours they have spent driving you to and from school or waking up at 5am to get you to sport, or even proofreading your essay five minutes before the final version is due. They made this sacrifice for you, and your future. Not theirs; remember that.

This brings me to my next point.

We have heard Mr Browning, our Headmaster, say, "When you walk through the gates you should feel the weight of expectation on you." Mr Browning, I would like to respectfully disagree with this statement. I believe that it will be when we walk out of these gates for the very last time, that is when we should feel the weight of expectation due to the amazing head start we have had in life. My only other option to St Peter's College was to continue School of the Air, School of the Air or SOTA is where children who live in remote areas. of the country complete school at home. Students receive all their work in the mail at the beginning of each term, laid out week by week. Students then connect with their class teacher in town via a zoom-like call once a day as a whole class. Students then spend the rest of the school day completing work with the help of their governess. No, not like the one off 'The Chase Australia', a

governess is usually a young woman, not long out of school herself who is venturing into the outback for the first time with no idea what to expect. At the end of each week, when the mail plane comes, you send your work back to your class teacher in town. The teaching and learning program stays the same from Reception all the way to Year 12.

So where would I be now if I had not attended SPSC? Well, realistically, I would have probably dropped out of SOTA in either Year 10 or 11 with the majority of my peers. I would have then probably gone and got a trade or would be working as a jackaroo, which are by no means bad options, however, probably the only options I would have had. Instead, I have been fortunate to have been gifted a St Peter's College education which has provided me with endless options to pursue. I am now ready to accept that weight of expectation as I walk out of the Hackney gates for the last time, knowing that the world is my oyster.

Let's put aside the academic side of this education for a second because yes, that's important, but what is arguably more important in my eyes is who you become as a person because of your St Peter's College journey. I am confident that you are all graduating as young men, not older boys. St Peter's College has been a great place for you to take risks, make mistakes and be supported as you grow through the experience. And don't stop taking these risks throughout the rest of your life, because that's how you will achieve greatness.

I agree with Mr Browning that we have been the luckiest group of students in this nation.





As I stand in front of the 2021 leavers, let me reflect on what this year has been. 2021 has been a year of mixed emotions as COVID-19 posed a threat to us while we watched it destroy our neighbours in New South Wales and Victoria. I believe that over the past two years, more than ever in our School's history, we need to be thankful for what we have been able to achieve. Whilst it may not have been what you would call normal, we have been extremely lucky compared with other students; not just in Australia, but world-wide.

We should be thankful that we were able to host our School's Blue & White, we should be thankful for our inter House sports days, and we should be thankful for our virtually uninterrupted learning.

Senior School Leaders 2021






































































SPOC New Members BBQ

Year 6 Report

Year 6 was truly an exceptional community of learners. Students thrived and were stretched with a multitude of learning opportunities. They collaborated, demonstrated curiosity, took risks and grew. We also had a lot of fun along the way.

Students channelled their inner entrepreneurs in Term 2 as they formed businesses to raise money on Anglican Charities Day. They were challenged to best utilise \$20 of capital investment. 
It proved to be an exceptional year filled with excellence in learning, boundless excitement, overwhelming joy and plenty of laughs.



Keys Awards



Adam Goddard

Adam Goddard is an exceptional athlete who has given outstanding service to the School and State. His accomplishments over the past six Athletics seasons are incredible. As old scholar and Saints Athletics Club stalwart Tony Keynes OAM (SCH 1970) remarked when presenting Adam the Tony Keynes Medal at the 2021 Achilles Cup, "In its 150 years of athletic competition, Adam is the best athlete ever to grace the SPSC fields." This claim is hard to deny when reviewing his resume.

Since commencing at SPSC in 2012 Adam has achieved successes at the highest levels of middle distance running, breaking multiple long-standing state and school records. A recipient of the AK Gordon Trophy for the most Outstanding Performance on Sports Day across six consecutive carnivals reflects Adam's dominance across the 800m, 1500m and 3000m races. At the 2021 carnival, in addition to winning the AK Gordon Trophy, Adam broke three records, was awarded the Taylor Medal as the Open 1500m Champion and tied with Joshua White as the 2021 School Athletic Champion.

On the state and national stage Adam has represented the School and State with

pride. In December 2020 Adam competed in the Open Men 1500m at an Athletics SA event and in doing so broke the Under 18 1500m South Australian record with a 3:46.98 winning performance. The previous record had stood for 40 years. This result saw Adam qualify for the World Junior Under 20 Championship in Nairobi, Kenya.

In February 2021, aged 17, Adam became one of the youngest athletes to win a State Open title with a gold medal in the 1500m event. Adam competed in the 2021 Australian National Athletics Championships in Sydney and won a bronze in the Under 20 Men 1500m event and a silver medal in the Under 20 Men 3000m. Adam's world qualifying time and silver medal in the 3000m event saw him selected in the Athletics Australia World Under 20 Championships representative team.

In recognition of his leadership qualities, Adam was named Co-Captain of the Cross Country Team and was awarded colours for his outstanding service to Young House. Adam's commitment and dedication to his sport of Athletics has been an inspiration to SPSC students and the wider school community and his influence will be felt for years to come.



Matthew Roberts

Matthew is an outstanding sportsman and has represented the School at the highest level in both Football and Cricket.

In Football, Matthew has played three seasons at the 1st XVIII level. In his role as Captain he has been both inspirational and revered for his hard-work ethic and competitive nature, always leading by example. A hard-working midfielder with an ability to play forward, Matthew is known for his quality football IQ and for having a keen eye for goal.

Matthew's football talent has been recognised beyond the School where he has thrived in all competitions he's played, including SANFL League matches with South Adelaide Football Club and representing South Australia at consecutive Under 16 national Championships. In November, Matthew was chosen by AFL club the Sydney Swans, with Pick 34 of the 2021 NAB AFL draft.

Matthew played three seasons of Cricket at the 1st XI level. As a batsman, he is aggressive and scores freely on both sides of the wicket. He topped the batting aggregate and averages and was awarded the Charlie Hayward Bat for the Best Batsman in the Intercollegiate Match. Vice Captain of the team in 2021, Matthew earnt the respect of both his teammates and opposition alike. He was the recipient of the Best and Fairest 1st XI Cricketer in 2021 and the Webb Cricket Trophy for 1st XI Fielding in 2020.

Matthew is to be admired for this determination and hard work, on and off the sporting field. As a Prefect of School & Allen House, Matthew has served as an inspirational leader and he received colours for his outstanding service to the House.



Senior School Art

Visual Arts at St Peter's College has a long history of diversity and creativity. Students have the opportunity to create artworks in a variety of studio areas, such as drawing, painting, sculpture, printmaking, photography, ceramics and graphic design. All of these activities take place in our purpose-built Art Centre; a wonderful facility full of natural light and incredibly well resourced with traditional artmaking materials and equipment, as well as high end Wacom drawing tablets and software.

The Art Faculty consistently reaches out to the community and invites artists to work with our students. Internationally recognised ceramic artist, Jeff Mincham, has held Raku workshops, Marra Dreaming Indigenous artists have worked with our junior students, and during Term 4 we welcomed indigenous artist, Sasha Hill, to work with our Year 7 students.

The students spent time with Sasha, learning about song lines and visual storytelling. Using a printout of a place of importance to each student, the boys created their own story, taking inspiration from the aerial mapping technique often used in Aboriginal art. Sasha also discussed cultural appropriation, or the 'stealing' of signs and symbols sacred to Aboriginal people. In response, students

created their own visual narrative using linework, pattern and colour which holds personal meaning to them. Their artworks were joined together to form a large mural and shown in the end-of year Art Exhibition.

Each year we invite an artist to work with our students as part of our Artist in Residence Program. This year, our boys were fortunate to work with Zinia King. Zinia is an accomplished illustrator of children's books and her whimsical approach to drawing imaginative characters captured the imagination of our students. Over the program's three-week duration, students in Years 9 and 10 were inspired to create their own drawings in her style. Their quirky and colourful drawings featured in the Art Exhibition, alongside the Artist in Residence group work, which was an illustration of all the animals associated with the Senior School's House shields.

Art Exhibition

This year's Art Exhibition was very well attended by families and friends as they gathered to enjoy the creations of our Years 7 to 12 Art and Design students. Given we were unable to showcase the work of our boys last year due to COVID-19, there was certainly a sense of excitement and energy during the evening.

I would like to congratulate all the boys who exhibited their work as they once again demonstrated their enthusiasm by employing a wide range of materials and techniques to create a diverse display of artworks and designs.







Junior School Art

The Junior School Art Program had an incredible year of creativity and learning. Reception and Year 1 students explored several different artists including Monet, Matisse and Kandinsky. They experimented with line and colour, textures and shapes, sculpture and mixed media, and clay. All our younger boys immersed themselves in the wonder of art and the many different materials to be used.

Our Year 2 classes explored artists Paul Klee, Brett Whiteley and Alexander Calder, to name a few. Unlimited creativity, construction and problem solving incorporated the use of paper, paint, clay, wool, wire, wood and fabric.

Students in Year 3 embarked on colour design, working with paper, paint, and fabrics. Mixed media sculptures came to life with papier-mâché, and wool and clay formed functional forms with glazes creating vibrant colours.

Year 4 students explored artist William Morris and enhanced their printmaking skills and techniques. Patterns, pumpkins and infinity nets formed inspirational clay sculptures influenced by artist Yayoi Kusama. Human forms were created with wire and metal to reflect Giacometti's sculptures; and clay sculptures, influenced by Picasso, delighted the boy's creativity.

Year 5 students have created hand-built, functional pots with clay coils and glazes; thrown clay on the pottery wheel to create bowls and they immersed themselves in traditional techniques of weaving. Students designed artworks on fabrics, created paintings and drawings, printed, explored wood and mixed media, and were challenged with glass and mosaic that produced beautiful artworks.

In Year 6, students created coil-built clay jars with carved designs, and they explored symmetry and design processes to create rotated printmaking designs. The pottery wheel was a highlight of the year, where boys thew on the wheels. Margaret Preston inspired our lino carving designs and Gustav Klimt inspired artworks with metals.

In Term 3 we celebrated our 2021 Junior School Art Exhibition, 'Picasso, Colour, Curiosity and Cubism'. Our exhibition followed parts of Picasso's life, and the journey of his artworks evolving

through time was a celebration of our creativity, our learning and the influence Picasso's artwork has had on us. The Junior School students in Reception through to Year 6 explored different materials and techniques that Picasso experimented with. Reception students followed Picasso's simplicity of collage, incorporating colour, line and shape to create portraits, and our Year 1 students studied Picasso's 'Seated Woman', emphasising colour, line, and linear overlays. Year 2 students followed Picasso's interest in clay and drawing onto clay, featuring colour, line, shape, and simplicity. Year 3 students studied Picasso's 'Weeping Woman', assembling and arranging facial features to the point of abstraction. Colour and shape enhanced the freedom of creativity as Year 3 students transferred their learning onto clay, creating vessels filled with colour and shape. Year 4 studied Picasso's love of birds with drawing studies incorporating line. Shape, symmetry and assemblage of clay formed beautiful bird sculptures. Year 5 explored Picasso's interest in collage and the assembling and arrangement of multiple materials, found objects, multiple shapes and neutral colours. Students explored collaged artworks with paper and were able to transfer their learning into three-dimensional artworks with wood, card and string. Year 6 students explored Picasso's expression of functional forms with clay; exploring shape and line to represent portraiture.

Our exhibition represented the creativity and diversity of learning our boys achieved. Picasso's inspiring creativity has had a profound impact on the visual arts and the diversity of his work has allowed our students to be immersed in his artistic world.

Thank you to Aarav Kocher our 2021 Art Captain, Miss Angeline Kepler our Reception and Year 1 Art Teacher, and Miss Jenny Counihan our Specialist Art Assistant.








Co-curricular Drama Production

Grease

At the end of 2020, staff from St Peter's College and Walford Anglican School for Girls met to begin the process of staging our traditionally tri-annual musical production (the last of which was four years prior due to COVID-19). After many hours of discussion, the decision was made to perform the infamous hit musical 'Grease'. Despite the contemporarily controversial content of the story, we couldn't go past the fact that the story and its songs were so well known that we suspected many members of our community would be eager to be involved.

And we were right; 45 students from across both schools were cast in the show, with auditions presenting us with many high calibre performers who were clearly 'born to hand jive'. In the months that followed, the students and production team spent many challenging, but entertaining, hours on weekends, weeknights and even weekdays preparing for the impending performances; all 'hopelessly devoted' to putting on a fantastic show.

'Grease' finally made it to the Memorial Hall stage during the first week of June and the overall outcome was outstanding. A testament to this was the staggering 1600 tickets that were booked in total, the numbers growing by the night as positive word of mouth spread. This was because the students - or rather, the stars - hopped into the literal and metaphorical 'Greased Lightning' and kicked their performances into overdrive on opening night, not taking their foot off the pedal until the final curtain call. The tenacity and talents of our leads constantly filled me and all who knew them with pride: Oliver Hamilton (Year 9) as the smooth Danny Zuko, Noah Browning (Year 11) as the cool Kenickie, Will Fitzgerald (Year 11) as the adorably dorky Roger, Joey Fitzgerald (Year 8) as the sweet songbird Doody, Will Lawrence (Year 10) as the cheeky Sonny, Daniel Spiby (Year 10) as Randy, Griffin Bierlein (Year 11) as the endearingly nerdy Eugene, Tom Parkinson (Year 9) as the slick Vince Fontaine, and Henry Sawers (Year 10) as the heavenly Teen Angel. The ensemble's energy and efforts were excellent, enhancing the big musical numbers with volume, visually and audibly. The crew's strength and attention to detail, and the band's practically professional sound is what truly brought it all together - without them, the show wouldn't have been the 'systematic, ultramatic, hydromatic' machine it was.

As a result of the fervour, focus, and fun of all involved, the cast, crew, and band received a flood of flattering feedback from our audiences, from both in and outside of our school communities. But this wasn't the best thing the Grease gang received from this experience; as with most musical productions, the best thing to come out of it was the long-lasting friendships and memories made, with students and staff, even now regularly keeping in touch and catching up, and fondly reminiscing the experience – as the song goes, 'we'll always be together.'

To all students and staff involved in this production, whether you were onstage, backstage or in front of the stage: my gratitude to you for your support and effort, whether it be big or small, simply cannot be expressed in words. You are the reason Grease had groove, had meaning, and had massive success, and for that I will be forever thankful that this was my first and final musical at St Peter's College.














Senior Drama Production

She Returns

In 1990, the year of Friedrich Dürrenmatt's death, the Swiss playwright wrote a letter referring to Switzerland as a 'prison'. The country's supposed neutrality during World War Two was a topic that preoccupied him throughout his career. The Swiss feel free in the prison of their neutrality. There is only one problem. Seen from outside, a prison is a prison.

When 'She Returns', our adaptation of Der Besuch der alten Dame, was written in 1956, the war that tore apart Europe was still a fresh and painful memory. Dürrenmatt used his tragicomedy to tell of the temptations of material gain, moral compromise, and revenge. These temptations entrap individuals, and it is their struggles within prisons they build themselves, that take audiences on a journey that commences with laughter and concludes with tragedy.

'She Returns' is a parable concerning a poverty-stricken European town, Güllen (a name evoking 'liquid manure' in German), and how its destiny is tied to the fate of one man. Alfred Schill, a shop keeper, is forced to come to terms with his past actions and face their consequences. The power of money, to both rescue and corrupt, is made visible when Claire Zachanassian returns to her birthplace.

Wilbur Glaetzer's Claire was both a victim with the heroic determination of Medea, who seeks to control her own destiny and attain the satisfaction of retribution, and a ruthless vamp who preys on men. In full command of the stage, Wilbur demonstrated his ability as an impressive performer. He was able to capture the satisfaction of a woman who was once a commodity and who is now as dangerous as her escaped pet panther. Alex Karytinos successfully portrayed the complexity of Alfred Schill. The popular shop keeper slowly transformed before our eyes as he faced sins of the past, became aware of the town's betrayal and the power of materialism, and confronted the inevitability of his execution. Alex's many skills as a performer were tested by the demanding role, and the result moved audiences.

Josh Wilson (Mayor), Hugh Phillips (Priest), Lianos Karapetis (Teacher), Henry Chipperfield (Painter), David D'Ottavi (Doctor) and Rajiv Paranavithana (Policeman) represented the inhabitants of Güllen. Each struggled with the temptations of capitalism, as embodied by the gifts of Claire Zachanassian. Whilst some found the abandoning of Alfred Schill a necessary and rewarding action, others struggled, before finally relenting and accepting the fact that the death of one man was required. Each actor should be commended for his masterful presentation of motives and justifications.

Claire's retinue, Callum Hill-Smith (Boby, the butler), Noah Browning and Jack Blackburn (the eunuchs, Koby and Loby), and Karim Hennes and Ben Hewson (her carriers, Toby and Roby) successfully added to the surreal nature of Dürrenmatt's comedy and its darker hues. Betrayal followed betrayal until the audience faced the inevitable consequence of tragedy and began to recognise the heroic qualities of Alfred Schill.

'She Returns' remains a modern classic of the stage and 2021's senior students demonstrated why it is a story that still speaks to us today. The moral questions it provokes have no easy answers. The playwright reminds us that justice does not always guarantee happiness or a story that concludes with the words, "and they lived happily ever after."

Year 11 Drama

I think comedy is a very misunderstood art. In our busy lives, riddled with chaos and conflict, it is easy to dismiss the comic as a buffoon; a fool. The desire to make people laugh can feel frivolous and futile in times of despair and hopelessness, like in a COVID-19 world. But as we have seen, the often understated importance of comedy grows, in fact, most prevalent in these times – it is when we are at our lowest that laughter can bring us closest together. And through boldness and absurdity - telling jokes that appeal to the aspects of the human experience that we are too scared to talk about in our day-to-day lives - where we are able to validate our deepest, darkest fears and laugh them off. Micallef's comedy reeks of a wit and purveying sense of nonchalance that is infectious to the engaged viewer. In Micallef's world, nothing should be feared, and everything should be laughed at. His plays that we performed, 'Exodium', 'The Entertainers' and 'Faust and the Furious' shamelessly poked fun at Old Testament tales, celebrity chaos and selling one's soul to the devil, which left audiences craving more.

I was fortunate to work alongside an ensemble of immensely talented actors. As always, Noah Browning (Year 11) and Will Fitzgerald (Year 11) were a privilege to work alongside. They performed with a passion and enthusiasm that was a joy to watch, and they displayed the dramatic range of seasoned professionals. Will's portrayal of an Aussie-accented Elvis Presley and boozed-out Frank Sinatra was inspired and gut-wrenchingly funny. He put his unique spin on iconic figures that are known and loved, and delivered a performance that was truly memorable. Noah's performances were quirky and defined, and he delivered a dramatic versatility that showcased his immense skill as a performer, notably culminating in his performance as Faust, the geeky South Australian chiropodist who is tempted by the devil to sell his soul. We were lucky enough to have two newcomers, Ned Carney (Year 11) and Eric Tang (Year 11), who shared our passion for the theatre

and performed with grace and maturity, delivering performances that became audience favourites.

Thanks must be given to our set designer, Miss Zoe Kirkwood, as well as the tech crew for their support throughout. Senior School Music

After 2020 diminished opportunities for music performance, 2021 saw a return of most of our annual concerts to the calendar and our students were able to engage in a full range of opportunities in Jazz, Classical, and Contemporary performances throughout the year. The first performance for 2021 was our fun and festive outdoor Alfresco Concert, which had been the first concert cancelled in the wake of COVID-19 in March 2020. For many students, this was the first opportunity they had to perform since the end of 2019. We saw several new appearances in this concert with the establishing Drumline beating us into the evening, and the Senior Concert Band performing their debut march.

With Generations in Jazz postponed for another year, we saw the introduction of the SA Schools Jazz Festival. The St Peter's College Big Band competed in Division 1, taking out a gold award and third place in the South Australian event.

Victoria also held a similar competition, partnering Division 1 bands in South Australia to include awards for the All-State Jazz 'Superband', which highlighted significant performances of individual musicians within their performances at the competitions. The following students received these awards:

- Eton Williams (Year 12) was awarded Outstanding Soloist and Lead Alto Saxophone in the Superband.
- Aiden Donnevert (Year 12) was awarded a place in the trumpet section in the Superband.

In addition, the new Vocal Jazz Festival was introduced for jazz choirs to perform and compete. The following students achieved awards:

- Charlie Wells (Year 11) Best Soloist (scat/improv)
- Tom Oldfield (Year 12) Best Soloist (written)

One other notable achievement from the SA School Jazz Festival was the St Peter's College Jazz Band taking out a gold award and third place in Division 4.

We saw the return of our Concert Bands in the 'Concert Band Showcase' in Memorial Hall. This concert introduced the first performances from our Year 7 Apprentice Innovations curriculum. Students involved in this curriculum learn a new band instrument and rehearse in a concert band for their learning in Year 7 Music classes. The Year 7 students of 2021 reflected on this as one of their major highlights for their music learning, with some of them never having performed on a stage at all, let alone in front of an audience of more than 500 people.

The String and Orchestra Concert, put together by Ms Sharon Campbell, provided a beautiful afternoon of musical performance from our Junior and Senior String ensembles and orchestral groups.









A highlight of this concert was Grieg's Piano Concerto in A Minor, performed by Alexander Rouss (Year 12) with the School's Orchestra. Alexander is commended on his efforts in learning and preparing this concerto to the highest level, while also taking on duties as House Captain of Farr and Music Vice-Captain in addition to Year 12 academic subjects.

Due to the snap lockdown at the beginning of Term 3, our highly anticipated Music Festival was postponed until Term 4. The Music Festival, which in the past has included all our Senior Ensembles and some Junior Ensembles in a showcase-style evening, took on a new, unprecedented, and pioneering format. Rather than have each group play individually, why not have EVERYONE playing altogether at the same time? The 'Let Me Entertain You Music Festival' formed an almost 200-piece festival orchestra and choir assembled from

a large range of our Senior School ensembles. With arrangements of pop, rock, disco and modern music arranged specifically to our festival orchestra and choir, the boys put on a one-hour show that will have a profound impact on their music education and time here at St Peter's College. A huge thanks to all our arrangers, Mr Maksym Grynchuk, Mr Julian Ferraretto, Mr Matt Amy and Mr Nick Mulder, who created unique and professional arrangements for our students that wowed the audience in what was an extravagant evening of entertainment.

These are just some of the outstanding performances and achievements of the students for 2021. There were many other exciting moments throughout the year, including the choirs singing for the first time in Da Costa Dining Hall in the Voices of St Peter's concert. The setting and acoustics of the hall provided a new and fresh environment for the choirs, directed

by Mr Andrew Chatterton. Our Junior and Senior Chamber ensembles, led by Ms Irina Lioubimova, won first and third place respectively at the Adelaide Eisteddfod in the Junior String Ensemble and Senior String Ensemble competitions. We look forward to the many more performances and achievements of the students of St Peter's College in 2022.

Senior School Chinese

Humanities

The Humanities Faculty continued to demonstrate a spirit of resilience and adaptability during 2021. As part of their curriculum, the Years 10 to 12 Geography students participated in the Australian Geography Competition. The competition involves over 65,000 students from nearly 700 schools across Australia. Students complete 50 multiple-choice questions based on Global Geography. The results this year were outstanding, with 15 per cent of students finishing in the top 5 per cent of the state and Campbell Craig earning first place in South Australia in the Year 11 Competition. Campbell will participate in the Australian Geography Competition Finals on the Gold Coast later this year and compete to represent Australia in the International Geography Olympiad to be held in Europe in 2022. In the Year 12 Competition, Josh Watson and Guy Strong finished equal first in the senior section. This maintains the strong record of National Geography Olympians and national finalists coming from St Peters College.

In Term 2, Year 8 History students participated in a Medieval Faire where they started with a medieval feast in Da Costa Dining Hall before joining in a variety of activities including catapult building, medieval dancing and 'gluckhaus' the German Lucky Pig game. Additionally, with the easing of restrictions, Humanities students were able to engage in a variety of excursions from trips to SA Water, the South Australian Museum and sustainability gardens.

In Term 3, approximately thirty boys in the Middle Years signed on to The Apprentice Program. Teams of three had to use their creativity and innovation to complete tasks, such as making an

advertisement for 'The Widget', convincing a pizza company owner to create a new flavoured pizza and designing a new school bag. The boys were enthusiastic and energetic and gave some fantastic presentations. Three teams managed to evade elimination (being 'fired') to progress through to the grand final, where they had to give a live pitch to a panel of judges, trying to convince them that St Peter's College should merge with one of the nearby girls' schools. Maths

2021 has been a year of growth and change in the Mathematics Faculty. We welcomed Miss Sally Xu, Ms Lauren Fleming, Mr Joab Mead, Mr Joel Baker and Mr Zac Savage into our teaching team.

There has been significant focus upon continued development of online teaching resources and practices in the event of lockdowns. In the one lockdown that occurred, we saw staff and students working collaboratively to ensure that everyone transitioned successfully and that students continued to learn effectively.

As part of the stage-not-age protocol, the accelerated program has expanded in 2021 with Year 10 Advanced classes renamed Year 10 Accelerated as they undertook Stage One Pre-Mathematical Methods. The Year 9 advanced students have successfully studied both Year 9 and 10 Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) curriculum and are ready to undertake Stage One Pre-Mathematical Methods in 2022. The Year 11 students who have undertaken Stage Two Mathematical Methods in 2021 have enjoyed the course and have been highly successful.

Additionally, as part of the stage-not-age protocol, we continue to offer Year 10 General Maths and, under Mr Joab Mead's instruction, the students have enjoyed the study of mathematics and experienced solid achievement. Mr Mark Bruce continues to lead the General team in Years 10 to 12 and collectively the team helps students to find achievement in our subject. The students are to be commended for their commitment to pursuing success.

In working to provide support for all students to achieve their potential in their study of Mathematics, we have run a trial of a software called MangaHigh. Teachers of Years 7 to 9 Standard and Standard Extended classes have had the opportunity to trial the software with one of their classes to become familiar with its applications. Game-based learning is the foundation of this program. This trial will be expanded in 2022 to all classes of Years 7 to 9 Standard and Standard Extended students.

More broadly, 2021 saw a national review of the ACARA Mathematics curriculum for implementation by 2023. Part of the review has seen the imbedding of computational and algorithmic thinking in the content. To ensure timely delivery, Ms Louise Firth and Mr Brian Wong delivered a trial of Grok Learning in their Year 7 Advanced classes during Term 4. The students completed a course online and then applied the skills they developed to an investigation. The students were enthusiastic in attending to this new form of learning.

Personal Development

The Personal Development Faculty consists of the subject areas Health and Physical Education, Wellbeing, and Religious and Values Education.

Health and Physical Education

Within the Health and Physical Education Department, 2021 was a year of change as we aligned our practice with the Australian Physical Literacy Framework and built a strong connection with the Athletic Development Department. In practical units, students learnt through and were assessed on three core domains: Physical, Cognitive and Social/Psychological. The elements within these domains drive the learning experiences students undertake in each unit and enable deeper connections with specific outcomes so that students can learn through, within and about movement.

As part of the School's philosophy of developing each boy's athletic potential, students have Strength and Conditioning sessions within the curriculum from Years 7 to 10. These sessions are tailored for each particular year level and supported by our highly qualified Athletic Development staff.

From Year 9, students can also elect to study a range of different specialised subjects within the department. This includes Sport Science in Year 9, and five different electives in Year 10 including a Health Science course. Students can experience the use of a range of technology within our Athletic Development

space and are provided opportunities to learn from outside providers. Students then transition into our senior electives, which include Physical Education, Health and Wellbeing, and IB Sports, Exercise and Health Science.

This year, our Year 7 students studied an Indigenous games unit in partnership with Flinders University and this was a valuable experience for boys to learn a practical unit through the eight ways of learning developed by Dr Tyson Yunkaporta.

Wellbeing

In Wellbeing, all students in Years 8 and 10 are engaged in a curriculum focused on Wellbeing theory and practice. In lessons, the focus of the taught curriculum was on building resilience through the application and practice of Positive Education principles.

In Year 8, students learnt practical life skills, including coping skills and empathy, how to deal with thoughts and feelings, and explored the role of gratitude to enhance positive emotion.

In Year 10, students further developed stress management skills by exploring mindfulness, engagement and flow. They learnt how to apply the science of character strengths to live a meaningful and purposeful life and put this into practice by relating the learnt skills to their 21-Day Journey in the Flinders Ranges.

Religious and Values Education

The Religious and Values Education (RAVE) course continues to increase our students' awareness of the spiritual aspects of life and to see them as an essential and necessary part of who they are. At each year level there are topics that explore the person of Jesus Christ, the Biblical texts, philosophy of religion and world religions. Students are provided opportunities to engage intelligently with Christian, and more broadly, religious thinking and to engage carefully and critically with them, builds important and necessary life skills. Knowing how to articulate a point of view and to interact with a variety of differing opinions, while honouring and respecting each person, is critical to our students' ability to understand and relate to a variety of people and backgrounds, perhaps more so now than ever.

In March this year, the Year 12 IB Physics class launched a high-altitude balloon to measure the atmospheric conditions up to an altitude of 34 km (100 000 ft). The students had to design and plan the mission, which involved setting up the sensors and coding an Arduino to take all the measurements. There was also the issue of tracking the balloon throughout its flight and finding it upon its landing. The flight was a great success, the balloon and data were retrieved and the students used the data as part of the climate change topic.

The Science Faculty had tremendous success again this year with Darren Nguyen (Year 10), Gunin Singhal (Year 10), Alexander Grice (Year 11) and Nicholas Koh (Year 11) all being awarded High Distinctions in the Physics Olympiad, the top 10 per cent Physics students in Australia. Alexander Grice also achieved a High Distinction in Chemistry and has accepted an offer to attend the ANU National Chemistry Camp in January.

In Chemistry, the Royal Australian Chemical Institute's Titration Competition is designed to encourage secondary students who enjoy Chemistry, particularly its practical side, to develop their scientific skills and understanding. In 2021, Year 12 students Sachin Ravindran and Thomas Byun, and

School Vice Captain, Rushan Khurram, were invited to compete at the national level, conducting a three-hour experiment at UniSA, and were awarded silver. Students also took part in the International Chemistry Quiz with two Year 12 students receiving a High Distinction Excellence award. Xian Huang (Year 12) missed out on 100 per cent by only one mark, meaning he is in the very top national percentile. Tom Hosking (Year 12) is in the top one per cent of students in the state and the top two per cent of students in Australia. Darren Nguyen also scored 100 per cent in the Year 10 paper, only one of two students to do so in South Australia. The following students achieved High Distinctions in this competition:



Spanish

Spanish ab initio is an exciting and challenging course designed for students with no prior knowledge of the language. Students explore five prescribed themes, which include a range of topics from Hispanic festivals, holidays, urban and rural living, school life, health and social questions to name a few. In just under two years, our students are able to communicate clearly and effectively in Spanish and they can articulate the similarities and differences between cultures.

To engage with authentic articles from the Hispanic world, we regularly use a variety of online resources such as YouTube or Newsela. Producing oral recordings and creating videos in Spanish is another essential element to develop language proficiency. Students have created presentations about a significant person from history, a weather forecast and a country fact file.

The Spanish Film Festival in May at the Palace Nova is always a highlight, which is followed up by writing a film review in the language. The annual Spanish lunch and the Languages Soccer Cup are also events the students thoroughly enjoy.














Art and Pottery Clubs

We had our busiest year to date with our Art Club and Pottery Club. The unique opportunity for students to immerse themselves in art and creativity before school and at lunchtimes provided boys with a harmonious atmosphere and inspiring environment to spark their imagination, curiosity, wonder of techniques and knowledge of skills to create artworks.

With two full classes, the Year 6 Pottery Club on Thursday and Friday mornings was very popular. Boys enjoyed throwing on the pottery wheels, and gaining different skills and techniques in every lesson. Basing their knowledge in traditional Japanese techniques, students were in awe of the precision and perfection of the vessel form. Discussions in glazes, geology, clays,

castings, slab forms and coil building broadened the boys' knowledge of pottery. They enjoyed the challenges of the precise techniques and control required to form all the different vessels, cups, and teapots. Skills were acquired by throwing 'belly' pots, 'neck' pots, handles, spouts, lids, and 'ripple' pots. Students were fascinated with the styles of functional forms. The techniques they acquire from the Pottery Club provide a life-long knowledge of pottery and the ceramic industry and art form.

An enormous number of boys enjoyed Art Club which provided creative platforms through drawing, painting, weaving, beading and construction. Different tables were set up with tasks, ideas, and topics for boys to choose, which allowed students from Years 3 to 6 to explore and create.

Each new theme and different project that was introduced each term, sparked enjoyment, curiosity and a wonderful feeling of achievement as each project was completed. Chinese Society

In 2021 the Chinese Society conducted many interesting and engaging Chinese cultural activities under the strong leadership of Co-Captains Xian Huang (Year 12) and Ryan Mah (Year 12). There were two big social events jointly organised by SPSC Chinese Society and Seymour College. The celebration of Lantern Festival, hosted by Seymour College, involved over forty boys and girls. Our School hosted an early Mid-Autumn Festival Celebration, which was attended by 70 students and 11 teachers from both schools. Both social events were culturally rich, relaxing and wonderful, and also gave students from both schools an opportunity to form friendships and enjoy each other's company.

In Term 1 the Chinese Society successfully held a Chopsticks Challenge. In this challenge, students of different origins and ages came together and demonstrated their chopstick skills in a very challenging game. Students were asked to use chopsticks to pick up jellybeans and red/green beans from one plate and place them on another. They had two minutes to complete the task and whoever transferred the most beans was the winner.

In Term 2, the Chinese Society's emphasis was delivering the knowledge of Chinese culture to all Senior School students. Future Problem Solving

Future Problem Solving (FPS) is a research-based, academic program that teaches problem solving strategies, collaboration, critical and creative thinking, and effective communication.

This year, students participated in Scenario Writing, which is a component of the multifaceted FPS program. Students developed short stories related to one of FPS's five annual topics (Youth in Competitive Sports, Wearable Technology, Human Environmental Impact, Personalised Medicine, and Terraforming).

The stories students created were 1500 words and set 20 to 30 years in the future. Although the stories created were fictional, they were fuelled by discussion and research around the logical outcome of actions or events taking place in the world.

To prepare students for the challenges of the 21st century, FPS teaches them to think critically, creatively, and futuristically. The Scenario Writing component strives to help students enlarge, enrich, and make their images of the future more precise, while honing their creative writing skills. The competition provided students with an opportunity to develop skills through the following aims to:

- Think more creatively and positively about complex social issues
- · Develop an active interest in the future
- Improve communication skills (oral, written and dramatic)
- · Develop a variety of research skills
- · Think critically, analytically and creatively.

As part of the competition, students submitted their essays and these were then graded by the competition organisers. Despite many strong entries, Darren Nguyen (Year 10) was the sole representative in the national finals having been shortlisted as a finalist in the first round. Darren is to be commended on finishing in third place with his submission on Personalised Medicine.

FPS is a unique co-curricular opportunity that enables students to imagine inventive and original solutions to problems that are yet to truly exist. It is an exercise in mental agility and creativity that is both rewarding and thought provoking in equal measure.

Indigenous Education Program

Walking through the Junior School with Uncle John can only be likened to accompanying a rock star. The chorus of 'Hi Uncle John' from all angles is testament to the strong connection students have made with him, his storytelling and sharing of his culture. From making links to connection to Country at the ELC and Reception Mud Day to a Year 6 unit on migration, Uncle John has enriched student learning in 2021 instilling respect and awe of the oldest living culture in the world. The Indigenous Education Program has welcomed a number of guests to St Peter's College to strengthen curriculum links this year, including Sasha Hill - Noongar Yamatji artist, Kira Yaltu Bain – Ngarrindjeri Kaurna Language teacher and Dom Barry – AFL footballer.

National Reconciliation Week 2021 focused on 'Reconciliation in Action, More than a Word'. The student Reconciliation Committee, led by Chirath Lekamge (Year 12), created an artwork symbolising the School's commitment to Reconciliation with over 500 fingerprints of students from Years 7 to 12. The Junior School acknowledged National Reconciliation Week with a flag raising ceremony and Smoking Ceremony led by Uncle John, flying the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander flags in the Junior School for the first time. The flags and artwork remain highly visible in the School as ongoing reminders of our Reconciliation journey. The Indigenous Round remains a highlight of National Reconciliation

Week at St Peter's College. This year, teams came together for an Acknowledgement of Country led by the winter Sports Captains across all sport fixtures and year levels.

Coordinated by Mr Mark Coventry, St Peter's College hosted the Anglican Schools Student Leadership Workshop with a focus on reconciliation this year. An inspiring day of discussion and planning around racism, current affairs, and respect saw students from more than 10 different schools collaboratively plan actions for their Reconciliation Action Plans.

A successful orientation program welcomed new Indigenous students and their families at the start of 2021. St Peter's College continues to offer scholarships for Indigenous students through The Smith Family.

Maths@Saints

In 2021 Maths@Saints continued to provide opportunities for students to engage in and challenge themselves with a variety of mathematical opportunities. This included the weekly lunchtime sessions facilitated by David Martin in Mathematics. and old scholars Angus Ritossa (HWD 2019) and Eric Zhou (FLL 2019) in the Informatics Program. Other activities included extra subject support for all students, Maths Quiz Nights, Junior School extension run by Maths@Saints Captains Nicholas Koh (Year 11) and Xander Grice (Year 11), Maths@Saints Musters and participation in a variety of state, national and international competitions.

St Peter's College students achieved outstanding results in Mathematics competitions in 2021. 144 students participated in the Hamann School Mathematics Competition, with Xian Huang (Year 12) and Darren Nguyen (Year 10) achieving first place in their respective divisions. 327 students competed in the Australian Mathematics Competition, with the following students achieving the national prize in their division, placing them in the top 0.3 per cent of the country: Tao Wong (Year

5 competing in the Year 7 division), William Carrigan (Year 8), Yitong Liu (Year 9), Darren Nguyen (Year 10) and Nicholas Koh (Year 11). Following this success, Darren Nguyen also achieved a High Distinction (top five per cent) in the Australian Intermediate Mathematical Olympiad.

The Informatics Program continued to experience success with 147 students across the whole School competing in the Computational and Algorithmic Thinking Competition. 11 students achieved High Distinctions, placing them in the top one per cent of the country. Following this success, students engaged in the Oxford University Computing Challenge for the first time, with a notable first place by Xander Grice in the Senior Division. Students also developed their programming skills in the UNSW ProgComp and Australian Informatics Olympiad.

Nicholas Koh's notable achievements in national competitions in 2020 saw him compete in a number of invitation-only events in 2021, including the Australian Invitational Informatics Olympiad, Asian Pacific Mathematics Olympiad, FrenchAustralian Regional Informatics Olympiad, Australian Mathematical Olympiad, Australian Mathematical Olympiad Committee's Senior Contest and the International Mathematical Olympiad Selection Exams.

In the State Law Society Competition, the team faced strong opposing teams from St Peter's Girls' School, Cedar College and Walford Anglican School for Girls in exceedingly closely decided legal battles. The team led by Year 12 students Chamith Waragoda, Jonty Davies and Harry Mintz, saw fantastic opening and closing statements from key barrister Alexander Rouss (Year 12) and solid performances from the team's star witnesses James Loftus (Year 12) and Eton Williams (Year 12). The Mooting team demonstrated a strong sense of collaboration and

Students were able to participate in civil negligence and criminal cases during the round robin competition. The Grand Final was a rematch held

Additionally, the long-standing senior W H Irwin Public Speaking Competition, an opportunity for students in Years 11 and 12, to showcase their abilities, was held early in Term 4. Finalists, Year 11 students, Nathan Choi and Rajiv Paranavithana, impressed both the judges and their Year 10 audience with highly emotive prepared speeches and impactful impromptu responses to the topic 'Life on Mars'. Robotics

2021 was a hugely successful year for Robotics in the Junior School.

Year 4 classes investigated earthquake producing machines and designed buildings to withstand them, and constructed and coded rowing boats. Additionally, they filmed a scene to tell a short story, and their final project was to create a working gym with exercise machines, and 'people' performing exercises. Most of the projects were created with minimal construction guides.

Year 5 classes continued to set up the space exploration of Mars, coding their robots to carry out important tasks. Year 6 classes had open-design projects where they created some of the following tasks: a pivoting safety fan, a scissor lift, a cherry picker, a showground ride or an artbot. All projects required both engineering and coding skills and there was an impressive range of models.

The co-curricular aspect of Robotics continues to flourish, and we had a busy and extremely successful year.

SPSC hosted the State RoboCup Junior Competition for the second year with outstanding results in the Primary and Secondary divisions. 32 SPSC teams competed in a field of 100 teams. The boys and their robots did an amazing job on the day, coming first (Charles Nauven and Brayden Xu Year 6) and third (Hunter Di Blasio and Yifei Ren Year 6) in Primary Rescue, first (Easton Papps-Burford and Oscar Sounes Year 4) and third (Rupert White and Joshua Nguyen Year 5) in Standard Sumo and first in Secondary Rescue (Edward Gross and Aidan Du Year 8). This was our second year of competing in the secondary competition and the boys managed to halt Seaton High School's tenyear winning streak.

Due to COVID-19 regulations, we also hosted the SA chapter of the National Competition. This was our first attempt at the Secondary Rescue competition and Edward Gross and Aidan Du won the national event with Lochie Siow (Year 8) and Evan Nguyen (Year 8) runners up. We did not place in the Primary Division, but we


had our best results over the past four years finishing in fifth, sixth and seventh (Daniel Cao (Year 6) and Dan Nguyen (Year 6), Tao Wong (Year 5) and Charlie Camp (Year 5), and Charles Nguyen and Brayden Xu).



Service Learning

If Coronavirus has taught the world anything, it is that what affects one of us, affects us all. The forces that unite us as human beings can be simultaneously wonderful and fragile. Welfare organisations have reported an increased demand for their services and support, as many individuals face the financial and emotional consequences of enforced shutdowns or redundancy. Organisations such as Foodbank and Anglicare continue to face challenges in serving the Adelaide community at a time when their own donations have been radically reduced.

Sony Camp

Our boys in Year 11 were paired with Year 11 students from Wilderness and cared for 16 children with a disability for three days and two nights. Our guests, who ranged between eight and 14 years of age had varying degrees of developmental challenges, some relatively mild and others more significant. The selected students from both schools completed training in the months prior to the camp but, in many respects, the reality of what our students encountered couldn't be taught, but rather relied on their pragmatism, inner strength, sound judgment and human intuition. The camp was based in the St Peter's College Boarding House with students living in and making use of the School facilities. The 2021 camp also involved our guests experiencing the Blue & White with the set-up for our Senior students remaining in place for the Sony Camp.

In the words of Year 11 student Casey Van Heuven, "Sony Camp gave me the invaluable opportunity to understand what children with a disability go through daily, and the enormous toll this takes on parents and family when it is a normal part of their everyday life. It was an invaluable opportunity to give back."

The Sony Camp has become an important event on the St Peter's College calendar and provides an authentic opportunity for our students to understand the realities and complexities of life. While the camp involves a core group of Year 11 students taking responsibility for the care of our guests, it is the generous support and engagement of our wider community that makes the camp a success. Special thanks must go to the many staff who volunteered their time to help run the camp, and our Mission Guild for providing gift hampers to the families of the children involved in the camp. Finally a mention must be made of a very special team of Year 12 students in Oliver Beadman, Tobey Ledger, Ned Gauvin, Yash Patil and Darryl Chu who returned after their involvement in the 2019 camp to live-in and help ensure the camp was a success.














Year 10 Outdoor Education

The Year 10 Journey, the culmination of the Pushing the Boundaries Outdoor Education experience at St Peter's College, returned to the Flinders Ranges in 2021. We successfully implemented a new journey model involving the whole cohort being on program simultaneously on rotation around a circuit - with Wilpena Pound used as our base camp.

Over 21 days, eleven groups bushwalked sections of the world-renowned Heysen Trail from Blinman Pools, through Parachilna Gorge, to Wilpena Pound, and with spectacular views through Bridle Gap. Navigation skills were challenged with off-track walking sections. The journey was broken up with two to three days of cycling along the Flinders Ranges with Bike and Mawson Trails. A highlight for many, was the abseil from Rawnsley Bluff. There was also time to stop and reflect during the extended solo experience; focusing on the journey so far, the things for which we are grateful, and goal setting for the remainder of the experience.

Themes of challenge and perseverance are at the forefront of the Year 10 Journey. Faced with the enormity of the journey ahead, the Year 10 students quickly fell into the routine of being self-sufficient, setting up and packing up their campsite on a daily basis. Camping out under hutchies (tarp shelters) was a new experience for many, and students were put to the test when we experienced several wet and windy evenings, which is unusual for the Flinders Ranges.

The beauty of the Year 10 Journey lies in everyone experiencing similar challenges but at different stages. These times of challenge are a powerful means of building bonds and strengthening relationships. It is an excellent accomplishment to participate in the 21-day Journey, and the Year 10 students are to be commended for their commitment to one another and unfailing positivity.
















Year 8 Outdoor Education



The effects of the 2019/2020 bushfires were still very evident on the environment and community. Seeing the extent of this natural


disaster and the regrowth that has occurred was a significant experience for all.

Badminton

There was no break for the Badminton program over the summer holidays in the lead up to the new school year. Seven weeks' worth of holiday training for both Junior and Senior School students, a comprehensive coaching course for our coaches and the inaugural St Peter's College Badminton Championships all occurred before Term 1 had even began.

164 students participated in Badminton in the Senior School in Term 1 across 17 teams. It was a successful term with all teams contributing to a 78 per cent win over the 76 matches played. Following a number of closely contested matches in the Open A division, it was the SPSC Open A Blue team who clinched the SAAS Open A Shield.

On Thursday 25 March, SPSC hosted Prince Alfred College for the 31st Badminton Intercol match. Our first team proved too strong, winning the match 11-1. This was an excellent performance from the boys and capped off a very successful and eventful term of Badminton.

Throughout terms 2 and 3, students who were keen to continue with their training were given the opportunity to do so. The off-season always provides an opportunity for students to focus on developing the technical side of their game without the distraction of interschool competition.

Towards the end of Term 3, our first team successfully defended their School Sport SA Open Boys State Knockout Badminton title defeating Marryatville, Glenunga and Norwood Morialta in the final. This was the third consecutive win for SPSC in this event.

In Term 3, another new event was added to the Badminton calendar: the St Peter's College Open Badminton Championships. This event attracted the strongest players from other schools to participate in an individual tournament at SPSC and provided a great opportunity for our students to pitch themselves against more challenging opposition on home turf.

In the absence of Year 12 students in Term 4, the Badminton program comprised 135 boys across 13 teams. Over the 71 matches played, our teams won 49 of them, a 69 per cent win. Term 4 saw the introduction of new leaders to the program with Tommy McDonald and Bingqi An being appointed as Captain and Vice Captain respectively. Our Year 8/9 boys also won the School Sport SA Year 8/9 Boys State Knockout title defeating Glenunga, Adelaide High and Aberfoyle Park in the final. This was the third time in four years our boys have won this event.

Unfortunately, no national carnivals were hosted by Badminton Australia in 2021 due to COVID-19 and hence no St Peter's College students were able to be selected for state representation.

Basketball

Senior School Basketball

The SPSC Basketball Program had an excellent year in 2021. For the seventh consecutive year we were the largest school Basketball program in the state, consisting of a total of 27 teams and 236 students across the Senior, Middle and Junior schools.

Preseason

Led by their new Captain, Thomas Mestrov (Year 12), and Vice Captains, Ben Korte (Year 12) and Will Tremaine (Year 12), the Open 1st squad began their preseason early in Term 1 with the goal of finishing at the top of their pool and qualifying for the state tournament. The Middle 1st squad trials commenced shortly after, with 28 students competing for 18 spots. Year 9 students Dhruv Joshi, Alex Kourani and Ben Northcote quickly emerged as the squad leaders. In preparation for the season, both squads spent one lunchtime session a week in the weights room, pushing themselves to develop their fitness under the guidance of our Strength and Conditioning Team.

Senior School tryouts were held in the final week of Term 1. Both our Senior and Middle School players were divided into four squads and introduced to their new coaches. 2021 saw the introduction of a standalone Year 7 competition. Senior School teacher and long serving coach, David Scott, oversaw all 26 students, dividing them into four even teams.

The Term 1 holiday camps provided a terrific opportunity for all SPSC Basketball players to prepare for the upcoming season. Over 90 students from Years 3 to 12 participated in the camps, which took place on the first three days of the holidays. North Adelaide's all-star forward and SPSC coach, Tobias Dowdell, ran the majority of the sessions, which involved students rotating through a variety of skill building stations before playing competitive games.

The season

In their first year playing against a similar age group, our Year 7 teams were outstanding. Across each of the teams the boys won 19 out of 25 games, displaying great promise for years ahead. Our Middle School boys made huge strides throughout the season with many of the squads increasing their training time by half an hour. Our top four Middle School teams capped off the year with some very competitive games against PAC, in which SPSC had one loss, a draw and two wins. A big congratulations goes to our Middle 1s; the boys had a terrific season, winning 8 out of 9 games.

Our Open Boys were very competitive in each of the five competitions they played in. We featured three teams in the Senior 2 competition, which was won by our Senior 2 Red team, with a stellar record of seven wins and two losses.

Our top three Open teams (Open A, B and C) had superb seasons. Open C finished with a record of six wins and three losses, which included five straight wins in Term 2. After losing their first game to Sacred Heart College, our Open B Team went seven and one to finish second in the competition behind Trinity College. They capped off their year with a two-point win over PAC. The Open A Team achieved their goal of qualifying for the state tournament. The boys played outstanding defence all season and were a dynamic offensive team. They won a number of tight games against teams that were favoured to beat them, including Cabra Dominican College, Concordia College and Nazareth College, to finish top of their pool.

The final competition of the season was the Harry Long
Tournament, a Year 6/7 tournament named after the former
Principal of Mannum Primary School. After two weeks of tryouts,
10 students were selected for the SPSC team. The boys played six

Season 2020/21 was a historic season for the St Peter's College Boat Club with many milestones achieved. For the first time in the Club's history over 200 students from Years 8 to 12 competed in the local regatta season and the Year 7 Learn to Row Program.

The culture of the Boat Club continued to build and remains the focus with on the water achievements the icing on the cake as an outcome of following and believing in the process.

After March, sport has looked different due to COVID-19 but we approached the new season with an attitude of getting on with things with a coaching group ready to adapt quickly to ensure the students could experience a full season. Determined to not miss out on any opportunities due to disruption made for fantastic results throughout the season; but these results were not without their challenges.

The senior squad had a challenging Term 4 in 2020 with some of their own expectations not being met. They remained calm under pressure knowing that we were building towards March/April.

The intermediates and juniors had record numbers in each squad boating up to eight quad sculls each weekend. This resulted in depth and a challenge for the coaches to find the fastest combinations towards the end of the season.

The South Australian State Championships in Term 1 2021 provided a platform for all

squads to show the Rowing community the benefits of a big program with many boat classes having St Peter's College crews finish first and second and, in some races, first, second and third.

The highlight of the State Championships was the 1st VIII creating history by becoming the first all schoolboy crew to win the 1st Grade State Men's VIII race against club men's crews. They did so in one of the fastest schoolboy's times of 5:52.8; it was a fantastic race!

The Head of the River on Saturday 20 March was able to proceed with a crowd as close to normal, due to a committed effort by all schools to pool their resources to facilitate the regatta. The SPSC community was outstanding with many members getting behind the event and in particular James Sarah providing, by way of sponsorship to Rowing SA, the staff and materials for set up and pack down of a perimeter and internal fencing to ensure the event could proceed under a SA Health approved COVID-19 Management Plan.

Unlike the 2020 Head of the River, the 2021 regatta was a full program providing a sigh of relief for all and the first opportunity for most parents to watch their sons row. The depth of the program was on show and all squads had great results with a total of 16 wins. Many crews also finished second and third with all athletes to be congratulated on their efforts on and off the water. The day concluded with the annual Head of the River dinner held at the Adelaide Show

Grounds with over 350 guests celebrating season 20/21.

The 1st VIII and the next four highest ranked seniors committed to attending the Australian Rowing National Championships on Lake Barrington in Tasmania. To reach the destination with COVID-19 border restrictions constantly changing, a charter flight was organised to provide a safe direct flight with a quick exit if needed. All remaining seats were filled by representatives of other schools.

It was an historic week for the Boat Club and School in Tasmania with the 1st VIII winning the National Championship Schoolboy VIII (Barrington Cup) race for the first time. It was the first time a South Australian School had won the event since 1968. It is also worth noting that the 1st VIII is the only crew to have won the State Championships 1st grade Men's VIII, Schoolboy Head of the River 1st VIII and Barrington Cup in the one season.

A big thank you to all the coaches, parents and the wider School community for all the support in a truly historic season under difficult conditions. We now look forward to season 2021/22 which will see 100 years of Head of the River celebrated. The first regatta was contested on the River Torrens between Adelaide High School and St Peter's College in 1922.



We also sent seven players to the South Australian High School Squash Championships in August. Our players continued to impress with their efforts and outstanding sportsmanship on and off the courts.


Thank you to all players, teaching staff and specialist coaches for another successful season of Squash as we look forward to seeing the development of our players continue in 2022.

Volleyball

2021 was another fantastic year for Volleyball at St Peter's College. Still operating under the cloud of COVID-19, we were fortunate to get through the entire summer season without missing a single game; an achievement that seemed unlikely at the conclusion of 2020. Participation and enthusiasm for the sport continues to grow, with team numbers at maximum capacity in both the Middle and Senior years.

The return of old scholar Pierce Cordes-Harvey (HWK 2020) as the newly appointed 1st VI coach made a significant impact, not only in the development of the 1st VI, but across the whole Volleyball Program. In Term 1 Pierce got to work creating a culture of professionalism and discipline by lifting the training standards and keeping the boys accountable. This shift in methodology paid huge dividends on court, with the teams' development taking a fast track over a relatively short period of time. Nominating to compete in the Open A1 competition for the first time, the team regularly held their own against the top Volleyball schools in the state. Following the Term 1 season, the 1st VI team was entered into the SAVSC (Schools Cup) mid-year, where they again pushed some of the premier Volleyball schools to the limit over the duration of the competition.

The Middle Years Program saw a fair share of changes over the year, with new coaches coming in and out of the program. Despite these changes, the on-court results could not have been stronger, with the Middle A Team going

undefeated in Term 1 to round out the 2020-2021 summer season. The start of the 2021-2022 summer season would again bring significant personnel changes, with the inclusion of new coach Noah Wilson to assist Pierce across the Senior and Middle vears programs. The introduction of the senior coaches to the Middle Years program has helped bridge the gap between the two groups and allowed for some fundamental foundations to be laid in the early years. Coupled with the knowledge and assistance of veteran coach Mr Mark Colsey, the Middle Years Program has made a huge developmental leap forward, which in turn will have a flow on effect in the Senior Years Program in vears to come.

Unfortunately, the opportunity for the 1st VI to compete in the Australian Volleyball School Cup on the Gold Coast was cancelled last minute due to COVID-19 border restrictions. A disappointing end to the year given all the hard work the boys put in, but a golden opportunity to continue building and developing skills in the lead-up to a big 2022.

Volleyball has never looked better at St Peter's College and is heading in a positive direction next year and beyond. I look forward to seeing the continued development of the students on and off the court next year. I would like to take the opportunity to acknowledge and thank all of the coaches and team managers for their commitment and hard work throughout 2021. The program would not be as successful or enjoyable without your efforts.

Full credit to these boys who clearly enjoyed their involvement and have shown rapid development; six of whom gained state representation. Mr Michael Gilmore

April 2022 sees the conclusion of the extraordinary teaching career of Michael Gilmore at St Peter's College. Michael Gilmore, MSG, joined the School at the commencement of the 1985 school year. He was appointed to teach in Palm House which, at the time consisted of four classes: Grades 1 to 4. Michael taught the Year 4 class. He was the first male 'mistress' in Palm House and fascinatingly, his reports were printed with the title, Form Mistress Grade 4. Among his many duties were teaching Physical Education to the Grade 1 class and setting the fires before school during winter. It was during this time that Michael was first appointed as Rowing Master for one year and was known to the senior rowers as 'The man from Kindy land'.

In addition to Rowing, Michael ran the photography club in the Preparatory School as a co-curricular activity. This was the era of real celluloid film and using chemicals to develop the photos. Pin hole cameras were made from items such as milo cans to take the photos.

In 1988 it was decided that Michael would lead the Preparatory School Boarding House in the near future and consequently, he moved from Palm House to the Preparatory School to take a Year 6 class. Michael had expressed an interest to teach overseas and Dr Shinkfield determined that Michael should get this experience before he commenced in boarding. Mid way through 1989, Michael and his wife, Shauna, along with their three children all aged under four, left for the UK to teach at The Bedford School for a year. Michael's role at The Bedford School was to teach middle school Geography and coach in the Rowing Program.

Upon his return to SPSC he taught a Year 5 class and moved into the Preparatory School Boarding House at the start of 1991, taking over from long time Housemaster Barry Morrison. In 1991 Michael also inherited the role of Preparatory School Chess Master from Barry. All boys in Year 5 were formally taught how to play Chess and competed in interschool competitions on Friday evenings run in the Preparatory School Library.

During his time in the Preparatory School, Michael regularly teamed up with Brymore Martin and Peter Smith to take the Grade 5 boys on their annual camp to Geralka in the Southern Flinders Ranges. These camps were always great fun for all involved with the boys in tents and the masters in luxury caravans.

At the end of 1994, there was a sudden change of direction for Michael, when the mantle of Rowing Master again fell into his remit. Additionally, and as a sign of the high regard in which he was held, the Headmaster, Richard Burchnall, decided to move Michael from the Preparatory School to teach in the Senior School, leave the Preparatory Boarding House and join one of the two Senior Boarding Houses, Wyatt & Allen, as an Assistant Housemaster. Michael and his family moved residence from the Prep Boarding House to one of the Palm Place cottages with this change. Boarding duty and the Rowing Program resulted in very long days because the senior rowers trained at Snowden's Beach at Port Adelaide. To keep him extra busy during winter, Michael was also appointed as co-ordinator of Chess in the Senior School. It was a bit of a relief when in 1996 David Bishop was appointed as the new Master-in-Charge of Rowing and Michael could just focus on coaching.

At the end of the 1995 School year, Michael Muecke retired as Housemaster of Wyatt & Allen House, and Michael was appointed his successor. Along with Housekeeper Gail Dalwood, Michael led the House meticulously with good programs and structures that kept the boys active and engaged. With declining numbers in boarding, the School decided to amalgamate the two boarding houses, School House and Wyatt & Allen House. Significant building and renovations took place in Wyatt & Allen to accommodate the merged Houses, including the purposebuilt Year 12 wing which set new standards in boarding facilities, the Supper Room, staff residence and basketball court, all of

which Michael oversaw. As Head of the new House, Michael's job was to bring together the two very different boarding house cultures and form a new House called School & Allen, commencing in 2003. With this change, Michael instituted a stronger pastoral care program that saw more teaching staff join the House as Mentors, and many inter Mentor competitions and activities being instituted, many of which are still running today.

During his time in the Boarding House, Michael helped with the development of boarding associations both in SA and nationally. He was for a time, Chair of SPCTA, Chair of Boarding SA, President of the Senior Common Room and involved in the early days of Yalari. In 2007, Michael accompanied a group of boys on the tall ship, 'The One & All', sailing from Adelaide to Sydney for a planned display in Sydney Harbour for the APEC Conference.

At the end of 2011, Michael moved on from boarding after 21 years of service. In 2012, he was appointed Year 8 Coordinator, responsible for the transition and integration of all boys as they commenced in the Senior School. The Pentreath Building was refurbished and in 2016 the Years 7 and 8 boys moved in under Michael's watch. During this period, Michael was Acting Assistant to the Head of Senior School, on two occasions.

Michael's other co-curricular responsibilities have included Senior School Exploration Society, Senior School Chess and Senior School Cross Country, revealing the richness of Michael's involvement and his range of talents and interests while at St Peter's College. Michael's appetite for history and incomparable knowledge on the School's history, saw him lead frequent old scholar tours of the campus where he would inform and regale them with stories of the School.

A regular spectator at school sporting events, Michael was often seen travelling around the School by bike to ensure he would get to all activities. He was renowned for his vocal support of teams and individuals, with his legendary and effortless hollering of 'Come on, blue!' being heard in neighbouring suburbs.

On the academic front in the Senior School, Michael mainly taught in the Humanities. He taught History to Years 8 to 10 students, Geography to Years 8 to 10, RAVE to Years 8 to 11, Science to Years 8 and 9, Classics to Years 8 and 9, Personal Development

to Year 8 and Drama to Years 8 and 9. Michael's teaching style was valued by his students due to his piquant delivery, application of numerous visual resources, use of anecdotes in his narratives, great story telling based around 'I can remember when...' and his jocularity. In many ways, he entertained the students while imparting valuable academic and life lessons.

Michael was also one of the first teachers 'lured' into teaching the new SACE compulsory subjects, Stage 1 Personal Learning Plan and Stage 2 Research Project. He took to these subjects enthusiastically. Michael's Research Project classes achieved numerous outstanding results and merits, a testimony to his ability to motivate and engage with the boys in a challenging subject.

A much admired and valued colleague who could always be relied on to provide a humorous perspective on any situation, Michael has a unique ability that endears him to all. He will be greatly missed. We thank Michael for his dedicated contributions to boarding, teaching and the School over the past 37 years – a truly remarkable achievement. We wish him and his family well for the future.

Mr Garry Grosvenor was appointed as a Geography and Humanities Teacher for Years 7 to 12 in 2001, but during his time at St Peter's College his teaching responsibilities extended beyond the Humanities to Religious and Values Education for Years 7 to 11, Business Enterprise for Years 9 to 12 and aspects of the SACE and School Personal Development programs. Garry held the position of Head of Geography Studies in the Senior School for a number of years, and he was responsible for coordinating the IB Geography Program, often teaching this course concurrently with the SACE to ensure that any interested student was able to complete senior Geography studies, whatever his preferred academic approach.

The application of Garry's years of experience, coupled with his thoughtful consultative approach, greatly assisted the operation of subject and faculty matters, especially during times of pedagogical and curricular change. His abiding interest in teaching has always been directed towards the needs and engagement of the student, whether it be in academic disciplines, sport or pastoral concerns. In the classroom, his principled and positive approach has been particularly directed towards finding inspiration for those boys for whom academic pathways are challenging, a purpose often augmented by expansion of the classroom into the more conducive environment of outdoor excursions reflecting the application of education to the real world. In the co-curricular program, as both coach and coordinator in senior Hockey, Tennis and Cricket, Garry's management focus has always centred on the development of fair play and team spirit. In return for such equanimity, he has

earnt the respect and support of students, coaches, colleagues and parents across all levels of the Middle and Senior years.

At the very core of who Garry is, is a heart for the welfare of others, both students and staff. When he commenced at SPSC, he was a mentor in Farr House. In 2003 he. his wife Sarah and their family moved into Athelney House to live as a Boarding House Assistant/Mentor with School & Allen. In 2007 he became the Head of Short House while remaining as a Boarding House Assistant and Counsellor. Whilst working in this role he also coordinated the Yalari Indigenous Program, a role he held until he finished working in Boarding in 2013. In 2016 Garry completed 10 years as Head of Short House and immediately became a mentor in MacDermott House, demonstrating his commitment to remain engaged with the pastoral care of our students. Giving Day

On Thursday 17 June, St Peter's College held its inaugural Giving Day. Due to the overwhelming support of the entire St Peter's College community on this day, the 175-Year Anniversary Scholarship was established.

Benefaction has played an enormous part in developing and sustaining the School since 1847 and Giving Day marked an important turning point in the School's philanthropic journey; a day in which the collective support of the community saw record funds raised to provide talented and promising students, regardless of circumstance or background, the opportunity to access a St Peter's College education.

On Giving Day, all donations were doubled by our generous lead donors. Over 700 plus members of our community donated to help those less fortunate, from our most senior donor, Dr John Skipper AM (HWK 1938) who turned 100 this year, to our youngest donor, a Year 1 student.

Through the support of our community, we exceeded our target of \$750,000, raising in excess of \$840,000 to enable more students to benefit from the exceptional academic, co-curricular and service learning opportunities on offer at St Peter's College.

Since 1869, scholarships have added depth and value to our community and have changed the course of many lives. In response to Giving Day, members of our community shared inspiring stories about the life changing impact of a St Peter's College scholarship. From the Maddern family for whom an Entrance Scholarship, awarded in 1908, changed the trajectory of five generations of their family, to The Hon Bruce Debelle AO, QC (SHT 1956) and The Hon David Bleby QC (DAC 1958) who simply would not have been able to attend St Peter's College without a scholarship. Their stories have been inspirational in our quest to create further scholarship opportunities.

Thank you to our community of old scholars, parents, both past and present, staff, students, and the wider community for supporting this important endeavour and for making a positive difference to future generations.
